




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Madison Consolidated High School is a six-year-old building graduating its 104th class in 112 years of existence. It is located in the 157-year-old town of Madison in the state of Indiana, which is celebrating its sesquicentennial. But MCHS is not floundering under the weight of tradition. It is alive, vital and growing. In the year 1966 MCHS welcomed Mr. Meredith Thompson as principal, approximately one hundred students from Dupont High School which just consolidated with the Madison School Corporation, and Helmut Englehardt, a German exchange student through the Youth for Understanding program. For the first time third-year French was offered so that those wishing to major in it could do so. The Business Department added a new club to the MCHS extracurricular scene, Business Leaders And Secretaries of Tomorrow, better known as BLAST.

1966 was a year of searching and awakening for the students, a year of ambition and fulfillment for the faculty, and a year of hard work and accomplishment for the administration. For many, 1966 may be just another year; but for the 227 seniors, it will stand out as one of fulfillment, achievement, hard work. To the student body, the year will be remembered as one filled with memories of football games and basketball tourneys, of Miss Cub and Homecoming Queen ceremonies, of semester exams and pop quizzes, of study halls and pre-test cram sessions.

In the years to come the year 1966 will conjure up visions of the flowers that she wore to the prom, the happy grins of the team and fans when MCHS won its tenth straight basketball sectional, and the bonfire that blazed in celebration. The sound of the first bell in the morning, the fire alarm buzzer that surprised even Mr. Thompson, the music blaring at the sock hops, and the cheer block yelling the team to victory will mingle to form a pleasant memory in a few years. At odd moments the tastes of the renown cafeteria food, of popcorn at the basketball game, of the French pastry from the Junior-Senior Prom will haunt the senses of the many MCHS graduates. A few events, accomplishments and honors will remain in the minds of the MCHS seniors and will stand out in the background of a blur of activities and become the . . .

In honor of Conner K. Salm's 36 years of service



When Conner K. Salm died this spring, MCHS lost not only a principal who served for 36 years, but also a friend and a gentleman who molded the lives of the many students who had the opportunity to go to school under him and the many people who came in contact with him in other capacities. When Mr. Salm retired in 1962, the present senior class was entering MCHS as freshmen, but his ideals and beliefs affected the students more than they may ever realize. In the planning stages of the hilltop high school, he fought hard to win the facilities he and his staff felt were necessary for the best possible physical plant for education. He sincerely believed that education played a large part in preparing individuals for their contributions to the world so that it would be a better place for those who follow. He supported the MCHS sports program in putting the emphasis on sportsmanship having served several terms on the I.H.S.A.A. Board of Control. Conner Salm's presence will be missed at MCHS, but he has left his mark on the lives of the men and women who will take his place. It is to the memory of Conner K. Salm that we dedicate the 1966 MAHISCO.







Academics

The classes of Madison High School represent two differing, yet concurring goals in learning. During the four high school years, the student is consistently exposed to those subjects which provide a firm foundation on which to base future learning experiences and to the subjects which allow the student to expand his scope of understanding and gain valuable skills.

Every student becomes familiar with the studies of the more formal and basic subjects of social sciences, laboratory and theoretical sciences, and English. The social sciences instruct the student to reason through a series of logical steps and reach conclusions based on hypothesis and experiment. English instills the principles of sound rhetoric, enabling the student to communicate his experiences with others.

Language, business, fine arts, industrial arts, and home economics, rather than create a founda-

tion for learning, are intended to build upon an established base. Language studies increase the span of the student's understanding of people of foreign countries with foreign cultures. Commercial courses prepare the student for a career in the expanding world of business. The fine arts courses build an appreciation for art and music through instruction and participation. Industrial arts ready the student for a skilled position in a society whose growing demands for such skill are constantly growing. Home economics instructs the student in the methods of creating an attractive, liveable home environment.

The courses offered at Madison are of a diverse nature. They provide a foundation for continued education and widen the concepts of the student's mind, providing him with the knowledge essential to success in a modern world.









Hi-Y develops Christian fellowship.










Golfers chalk up improved season




Bill Flint attempts to line up a putt on the Madison Course.


