
School and community were continually interlaced by events during the 1966-67 school year. MCHS influenced and was influenced by changes in the community. School groups and individual students participated in the Regatta Parade and Regatta festivities. Farm-City program, community sponsored oratorical, art, and writing contests, and a Jazz Festival held in honor of Mr. Frank Klein. Directly bearing upon the classroom, the enlargement of the library affected MCHS students by providing increased facilities for study and research.

While the community underwent the off-year congressional and local elections, students expressed their ideas through mock balloting and a referendum on the voting age. In the same month, the teen center opened providing another place for teenage recreation.

In November the school and community experienced the sad loss of Mayor Markt Lytle. Mayor Lytle was serving his second term as mayor.







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In the school year 1966-67, change brought awesome meanings and implications. We students returned to Madison High last fall to confront a broader curriculum, a larger faculty, and prospects for physical school enlargement. Fall 1966 heralded local, state and national elections, which culminated in significant political realignment. Internationally, U.S. commitments in Southeast Asia prompted increased consternation among all Americans concerning the necessity of war and eventual U.S. goals for world leadership.

We of the "now generation" are poised at the threshold of an era, the like of which has never been seen. The struggle of Man vs. Machine—the ultimate battle against the inevitable "phaseout" has begun. It is a time for decision, a time perhaps for a bit of soul-searching. #### Plantation, April atmosphere is prom motif




"TREACHEROUS WITCH BETRAYER," shrieked Sandy (Candy Combs) as she argued with Morgan LeFay (Sally Renne).

#### Royalty reigns over athletic events






#### scholastic maturity






CLASS OF 1967 anxiously awaits the beginning of the evening's ceremonies.




SENIOR CLASS PRESIDENT Charlie Thompson leads the class in the tassel-turning ceremony officially making the class MCHS Alumni.













#### **ACADEMICS**

For six periods of the day on Mondays through Fridays, students at Madison wear down hundreds of pencils, erase countless errors, and use large amounts of notebooks, typing paper, and mimeographed tests. Engaged in a seemingly endless four years of study, students daily attempt to corner bits of knowledge.

Indeed, there was "something old, something new" in the MCHS English department this year.


Mr. Wharton and Miss Lockard came to Madison High this year, joining the veteran staff. Mr. Wharton assumed some of the freshman English duties and coached the debate team, while Miss Lockard contributed her services to English teaching and library work. Alterations broadened and enriched available resources. New books and filmstrips were introduced in the reading lab to replace their worn counterparts.

In the speech section, a novel means of expressing oneself through poetry arose, the idea of reading to the background of music. Some of the English classes in all grades employed ENGLISH 2600 and ENGLISH 3200, pilot studies in grammar usage based on immediate student reinforcement.

Such diversified changes complemented customary courses of study in the English department, and increased emphasis on student writing. Also, group studies of outstanding novels helped provide an extensive literary background for students.




COLORFUL TRANSPARENCIES enliven the practicality of the overhead projector. Mrs. Moore uses the projector as an aid to grammar instruction.

The MCHS social studies department dealt with in-depth studies of shifting interhuman and international relations. Sophomore world history classes traveled to Louisville in December to tour the Speed Art Museum. Approximately fifty seniors from the civics and governments classes journeyed to the Indiana General Assembly, February 7.


On the local level, students attended Public Affairs Forum dinners as representatives of MCHS.

#### Quest for knowledge in math and science

On foundations built by Pythagoras, Descartes, and Euclid, the mathematics classes continued to advance to a goal of greater understanding of principles in math. Taught by Mr. Harrell and Mr. Wilson, general math students reviewed arithmetic and studied various kinds of graphs. Consideration of problems pertaining to family income and community activities developed the students' practical mathematical skills.

Mr. Dougan and Mr. Imel instilled Algebra I students with knowledge of set theory, signed numbers, equations, and inequalities. In Algebra III, Mr. Wilson and Mr. Imel emphasized equations in three unknowns, the theory of guadratic equations, the binomial theorem, and logarithms.

Students in Mr. Buckle's, Mr. Dougan's, and Mr. Dunkerton's geometry classes used a variety of geometric figures in their study of lines, angles, triangles, parallel and perpendicular lines, circles, and arcs. Seniors taking advanced mathematics investigated trigonometry, analytic geometry, calculus, and statistics.

#### stimulates the student exploring new frontiers

The science department faculty took on a new appearance this year with the advents of Mr. Imel, Mr. Yarber, Mr. Turpin, Mr. Keach, and Mr. Miller. The new instructors taught in the fields of physics, chemistry, biology, and earth, science.

Physics students studied the behavior of matter and energy with regard to thickness of molecules, wave action, periodicity, and wave lengths.

Besides learning about the uses of matter and the change it undergoes, chemistry students studied atomic structure. Laboratory experiments helped explain the chemical properties of matter.


Students dissected worms, frogs, and pigs in biology classes to observe anatomical features. Several students traveled to grade schools in the area to instruct children in science projects.


Earth science learners sought to become more familiar with their natural surroundings through field trips.





Mrs. Willis was appointed as the first language department chairman of Madison High School. Other innovations consisted of new fourth-year French and Spanish classes and thirdyear Latin class which extended the studies of foreign cultures and civilizations.

Several new teachers joined the language department this year. They included Mr. Keach in the German department and Miss Creech and Dr. Walling in the Spanish department. Since Dr. Walling is an immigrant from Cuba, his students profited greatly from his instruction and personal experiences.

Latin students continued their studies under the direction of Mrs. Moore and Mrs. Wood. Although Latin is non-existent as a spoken language, it is still very important as a basis for the romance languages.

The language lab also played a vital part in the teaching of languages. It offered the students the opportunity to hear foreign languages spoken by natives of the foreign countries and it also provided a chance to practice proper pronunciation.

Art students at Madison materialized their interpretations of MCHS and the Madison community by molding with clay, constructing with cardboard, sketching, and painting with water colors, ink, and acrylic and tempera paints. Mr. Chapman and Mr. Combs in the beginning and intermediate classes, and Mr. Knoble in the advanced classes, combined actual construction with art history and field trips to study methods of painting, sculpture, and architecture.

Art students displayed their works on school bulletin boards and on the walls. At Historic Madison, Bob Sexton won first place in an art contest sponsored by the Women's Club.

In the music department, the addition of music theory to the curriculum made it possible to have a music major. Theory students played scales, learned to identify chords and intervals by ear, and studied forms of music composition.

In band and choral club, musicians studied, practiced, and performed contemporary serious music as well as standard composition. Both groups were involved in performances at routine and unusual civic and school events.

#### Practice advances competence in business

The peck-peck and ring of typewriters, the clatter of adding machines, and the hasty solitude of shorthand notetaking typified the ever-moving commercial department of MCHS this year. Students, many of them future business men and women, coupled a command of fundamentals with speed, efficiency and accuracy.

Beginners' typing courses were designed to instill a knowledge of good typing techniques according to the touch system of typing. This course emphasized term papers, outlines, and other typed works required in school. Second-year students demonstrated proficiency in different categories of office typing.

Proper transcription and interpretation were the mode for first and second-year shorthand students. Students memorized brief symbols and business phrases. Competency emerged as a desirable goal to the trainees as they learned to take more difficult dictation.


Bookkeeping apprentices indexed and computed their way through several phases of record-keeping. Furthermore, they punched and otherwise learned to operate adding machines, calculators, duplicators, and transcription devices.





Industrial arts courses such as woodworking, general shop, auto mechanics, general metals, and mechanical drawing stressed such things as design, the use of power and hand tools, concrete construction, welding, and metal working. MCHS industrial art students constructed gunracks and skate boards, loosened and tightened parts of engines and motors, and refinished the old **Miss Madison**. In general, they learned by changing the pattern, the size, the mechanics, and the shape of things.

Field trips to industries in the Kentuckiana area supplemented shop and classroom teaching through the study of contemporary manufacturing methods. Also, the acquisition of six new electric and four oxyacetylene welding machines made possible six additional weeks of welding.

#### Mechanical repair is vital to agriculture

The Agriculture-Related Occupation Program combined with the more conventional courses this year to produce a fuller farming curriculum.

The latest program, new in Indiana, was introduced in Jefferson County last fall. Four students from Madison High, under the direction of Mr. Harmon, spent a total of five hours in class each week and an additional ten hours per week in on-the-job training in different aspects of farming at Irwin Farmers' Store. Mr. Harmon


taught the third-period class here and commuted to Southwestern High School, where he conducted another session. Enlargement of the class next fall testifies to the initial popularity of the new course.

The new agricultural class complemented and extended the scope of Mr. Spicer's farming courses, emphasizing farm equipment sales and service.



Distributive Education, a relatively new course, received greater emphasis this year. In an expanding program, planned working arrangements were co-ordinated with classroom study relating to the distributive occupations. One essential characteristic was mutual planning between the school and employer.

With Mr. Smith as teacher-co-ordinator, each senior student benefited from classroom instruction pertaining to his particular work in the local co-operating business organizations. To improve efficiency, each employer supervised on-the-job training for the students. 


The activities for the boys included basketball, volleyball, football, softball, calisthenics, and tennis. These sports developed team spirit among members.








## Thespian Society enacts stage productions



Under the sponsorship of Mr. Spicer, the Future Farmers participated in quality contests with clubs from neighbor schools. The judging covered


public speaking, parliamentary procedure, livestock, crop and soil quality.









monitoring a class during a test.








#### **SPORTS**









Connersville, North Vernon, Greensburg, Jeffersonville, and Shelbyville.






"Moto's Men" grappled to a third-place finish in the Brookville Invitational Tournament. In post season action the Cubs finished seventh in the Bloomington Sectional.






### Roines dominates intramurals














### **ALBUM**


This book has tried to picture the things that have caused Madison High School to be different and the things that have made 1967 a special year, as all other years were special, too.

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
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
