
















Another highpoint of the ceremony was the announcement of the superlatives, who were elected by the seniors to represent their class.






Madison Consolidated High School's Class of 1968 received diplomas May 26 during a ceremony in the Connor K. Salm gymnasium.


Daily life at MCHS centers around the classroom. The faculty and administration combine their efforts to make learning an experience rather than a task for the students.




Spanish classes used the audiovisual equipment extensively. By seeing films and listening to tapes of dialogues, the students were better able to speak and understand the language.

The study of phonetics and spoken French, served as the basis for beginning French students. In the more advanced classes, students concentrated on reading and writing the French language.

First year Latin students, under the direction of Mrs. Wood, learned the basics of the ancient language. The second year students studied not only the language itself, but also Roman history and Cicero.


German students began their studies by learning to count and conduct easy conversations. Second year pupils learned writing skills and the third year classes employed independent study.



MCHS offered a full curriculum to all students interested in the scientific field. A newly introduced course, physical science, served as a prelude to chemistry and physics. Although it was mainly a methods course, involving experiments such as separating compounds and finding volume, it was supplemented by textbook reading.


The behavior of matter was of prime interest to chemistry and physics students. Through laboratory exercises and classroom lectures, the students delved into the chemical and mathematical aspects of science.


Beginning with a detailed study of plants, young biologists advanced to dissecting animals. Independent projects highlighted the advanced course.

Learning about the physical features of the world was the primary objective for earth science pupils. Plastic models aided in the explanation of the forming of the earth's crust.

Working with theories and equations, senior math students solved problems in analytic geometry, trigonometry, and calculus. This advanced course terminated a four-year academic program that included one year of plane geometry and two years of algebra. An introduction to algebra, and general math, was also presented to interested pupils.

Commercial arithmetic pupils encountered problems dealing with bonds, interest, and commissions. Shop math offered a course in measurement, formulas, and other skills required in factory jobs.

The music and art department correlated with one another to show the connection of the two departments. Art students, while listening to music, expressed themselves by painting on canvas.





Holiday and civic programs added to the music students' curriculum during the 67-68 year.



"Sugar and spice and everything nice" were the basic ingredients for a successful year in the Home Economics Department during the 1967-1968 school year. Under the direction of Miss Horn and Mrs. Rider, students learned new cooking techniques,

fashion designs, first aid procedures, and efficient budgeting. In addition, Home Economics V and VI included courses in family relations and child development, housing, and consumer education.

The MCHS Business Department strived to better prepare students for the business world. Two years of typing, two years of shorthand, a year of bookkeeping, and a year of business machines was offered.

New equipment was one of the additions to the department. With more modern facilities, students received additional aid.

Shorthand students benefited from the electronic classroom. The electronic classroom equipment included headsets, receivers, and tapes. With this equipment, the students were able to increase their speed and accuracy.

The dictaphone which consists of tapes, earphones, and a control pedal, was employed by typing students. When dictation became too fast, it was brought to a standstill until the typist could continue.


Students enrolled in Business Machines used the Skill Builder and Printing Calculator for the first time. These machines helped to broaden their understanding and efficiency.











# Industrial Arts and Vo-Ag add new courses to old curriculum

For those students interested in making farming their career, vocational agriculture was offered. Because of the increased interest, a new building was added to give the students the advantage of new equipment and more space.

The first course of Vo-Ag developed the individual's knowledge of soils and the relation of crops to the soil. Shop work involved woodworking and the daily maintenance of farm machinery.

Second year students learned about the feeding, breeding and veterinary care of livestock.

Another facet of Vo-Ag, agriculture and sales, gave students an opportunity to work in agricultural businesses in the area. Parents, local businessmen and students co-operated to make the program a success.

Woodworking, general shop, automechanics, general metals, and mechanical drawing were all a part of the growing program in industrial arts. Each course was designed to give the student a sampling of the type of job he may someday choose as a profession.

In woodworking, students learned to design, construct and put the finishing touches on the projects which they made during the year. General shop gave the pupils knowledge which could be applied to many home jobs.


Auto mechanics offered the opportunity for pupils to work on the repairing of cars.





### Phys Ed classes strive for physical fitness







Throughout the year, the language lab assistants strived to make the language lab easier to work in. Helping students learn the correct way to operate the tapes was one of their first duties.


After each class period, the aids inspected each booth to make sure everything was turned off and the books were in proper order. In addition they aided the teachers in running the tapes and rewinding them.




Modeling the most up-to-date fashions from a local dress shop, BLAST members staged a free style show early in the spring for junior and senior girls.







The Cub's victory was celebrated later that evening at the Alumni dance.







Of prime importance to the administration of any school is the physical fitness of the students. Authorities realize that sound bodies are as important as sound minds in the development of capable human beings.


















Working to unite all the athletes, the Letterman's Club undertook numerous activities.







Whether it was working on projects, taking tests, or simply making decisions, the 1967-68 school year meant ACTION for the underclassmen at MCHS.

The juniors entered a float entitled "How in the World Can We Lose?" in the Homecoming parade. They also conducted a magazine sale in the fall to raise money for the prom, which they held on May 4 in honor of the seniors. College-bound juniors took the National Merit Test in February and the Scholastic Aptitude Test in May.

In February, the sophomores took the National Educational Development Test, which pointed out their strengths and weaknesses in achievement. The highlight of their year came in April when they ordered class rings. Twelve sophomores served refreshments at the Junior-Senior Prom in May.

Besides electing their first slate of class officers, the freshmen were also initiated as new members of numerous clubs. Their testing included an I.Q. test in November.


