For the first time, the faculty and students undertook to produce a famous Broadway musical. *Oklahoma* was chosen, and the entire school began work on the difficult production.

The famous musical takes place at the turn of the century in Oklahoma, which was then a part of Indian territory. The story, which is in turn a comedy, a drama, and a romance, centers around the attempts of Curly and Will to win the love of Laurey and Ado Annie. Their efforts are hampered by Jud Fry, a mean and sullen farm hand, and Ali Hakim, a smooth talking peddler. Aunt Eller attempts to keep everyone happy, and some complicated and humorous scenes are the result.

The production as a whole was termed a complete success. It was hoped that the tradition of presenting a musical would be continued.

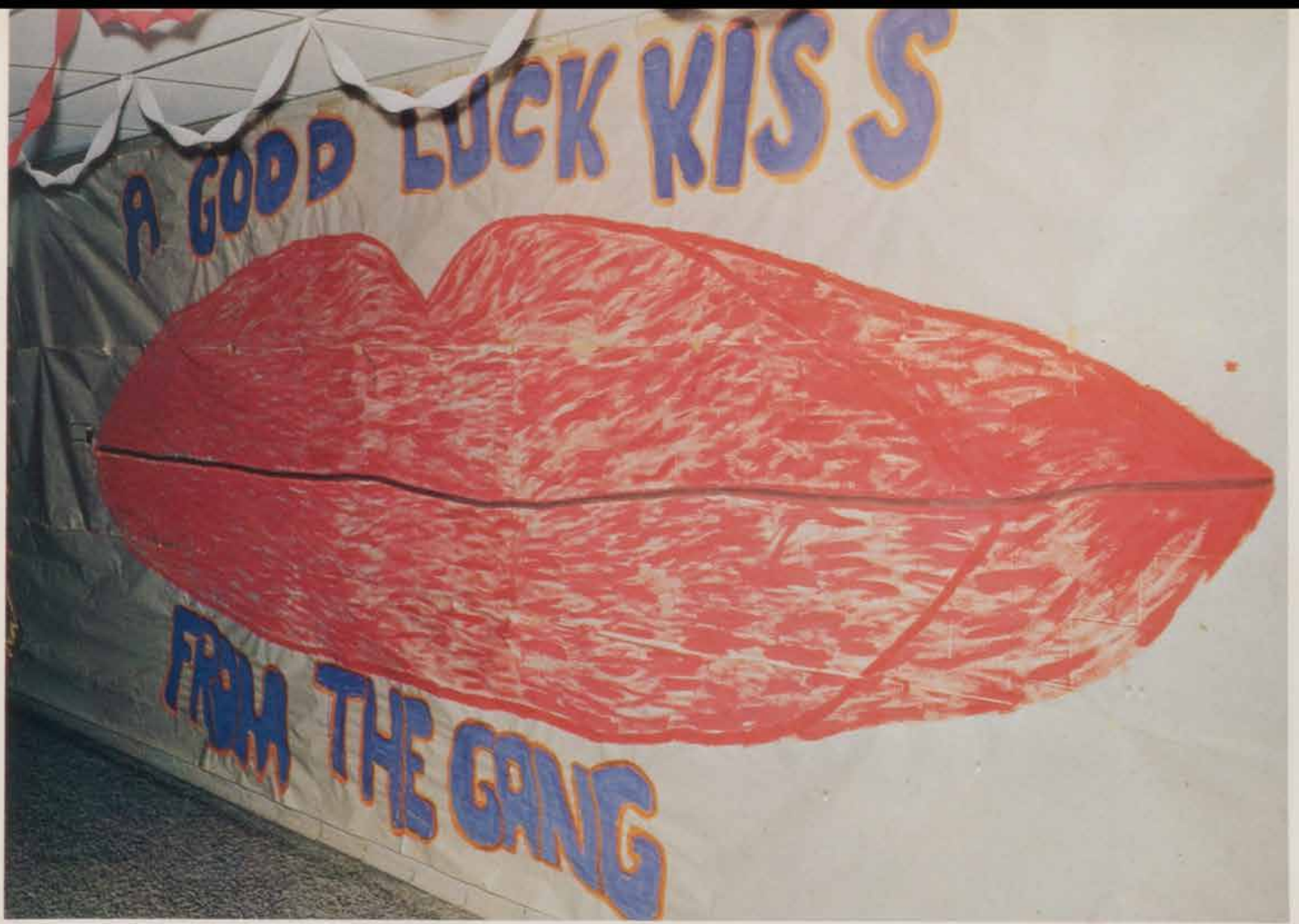

Boosting Cub spirit during sectional week, Lana works on a senior mural.

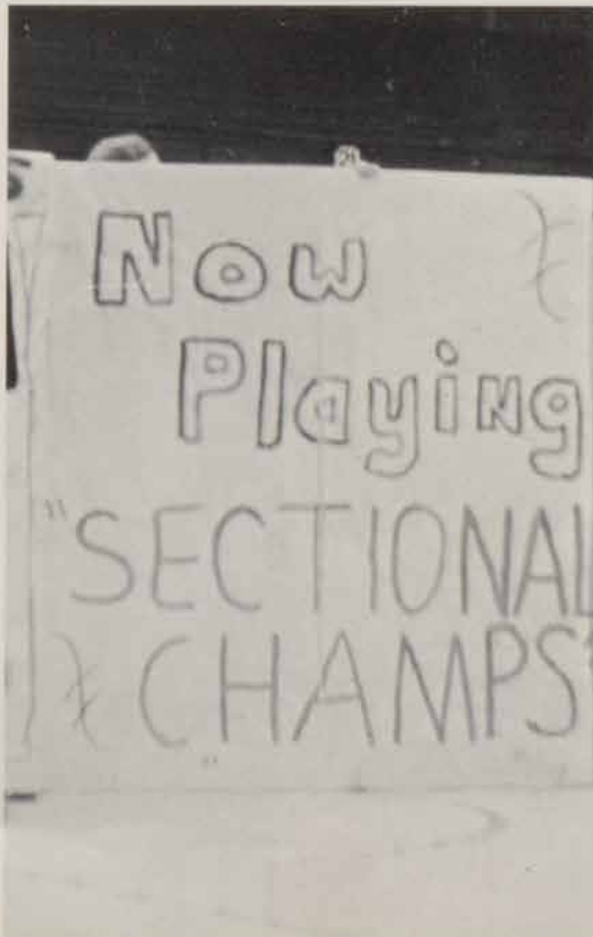

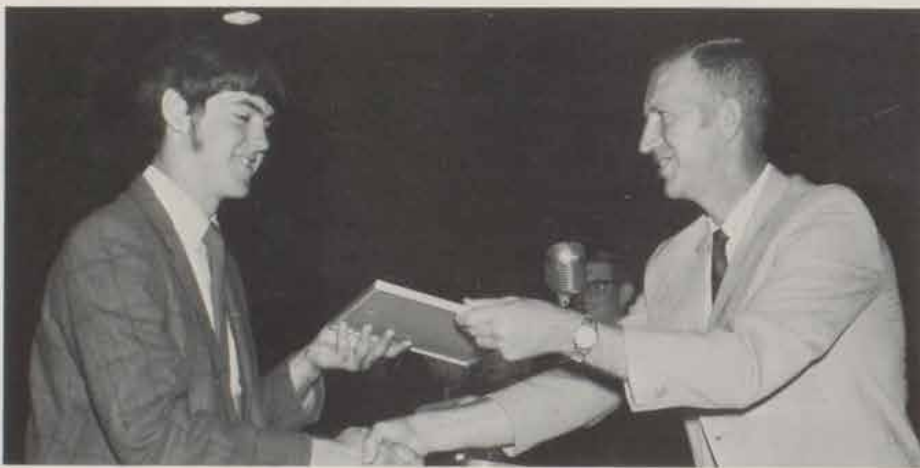

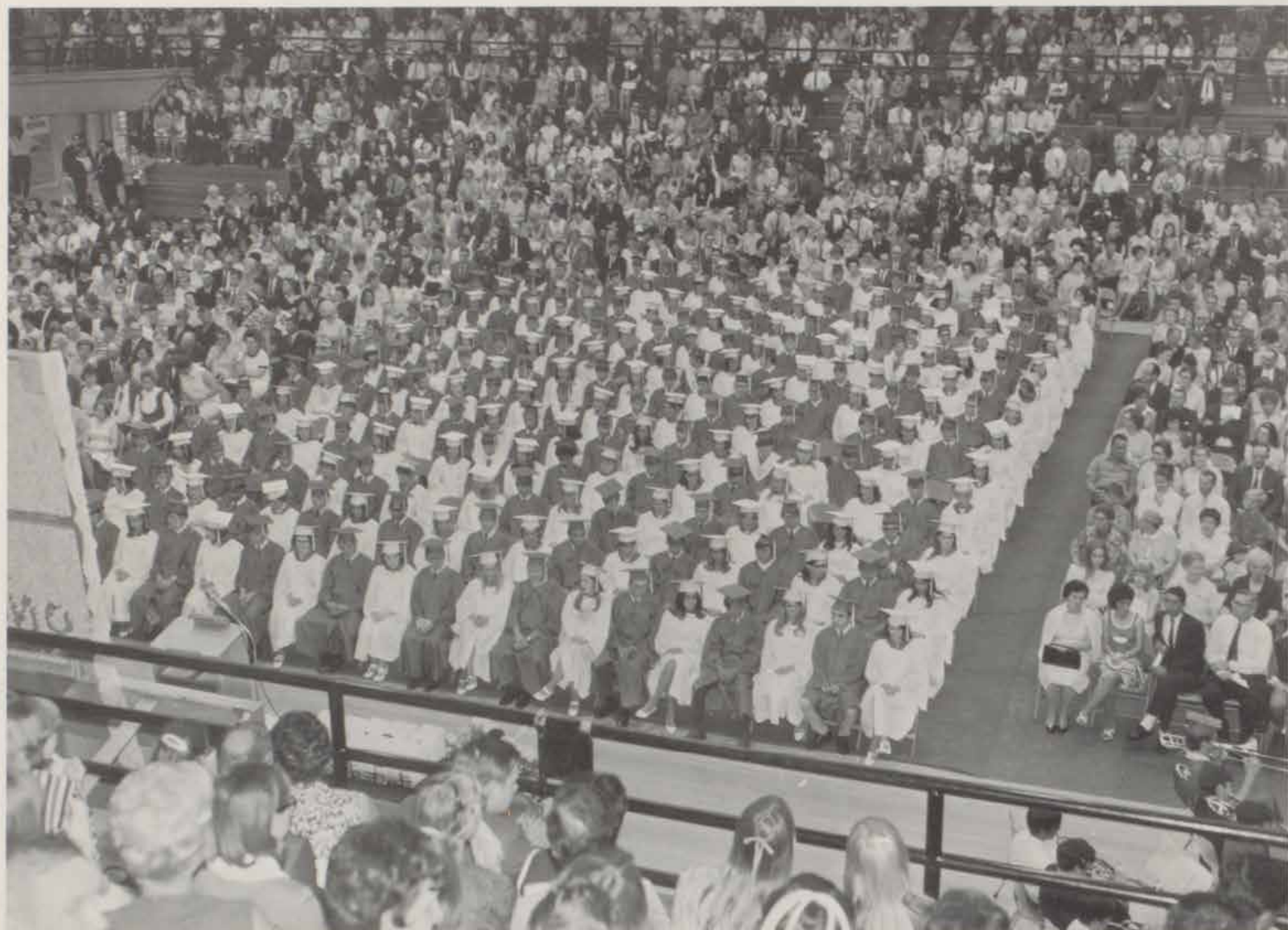

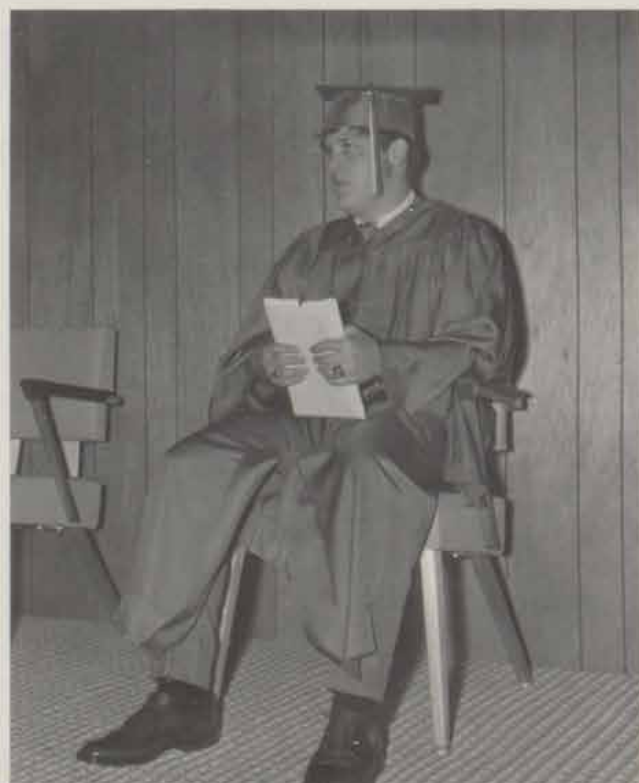

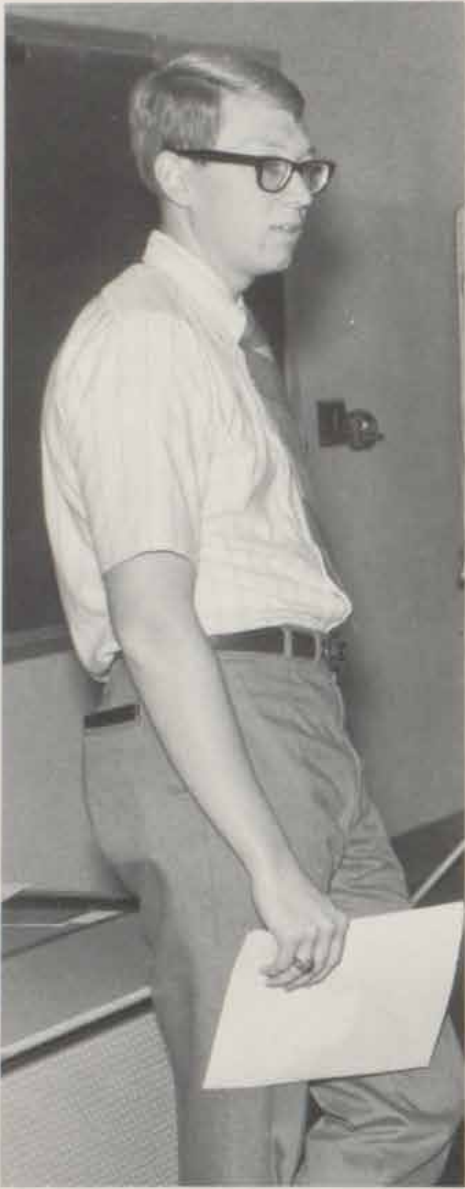

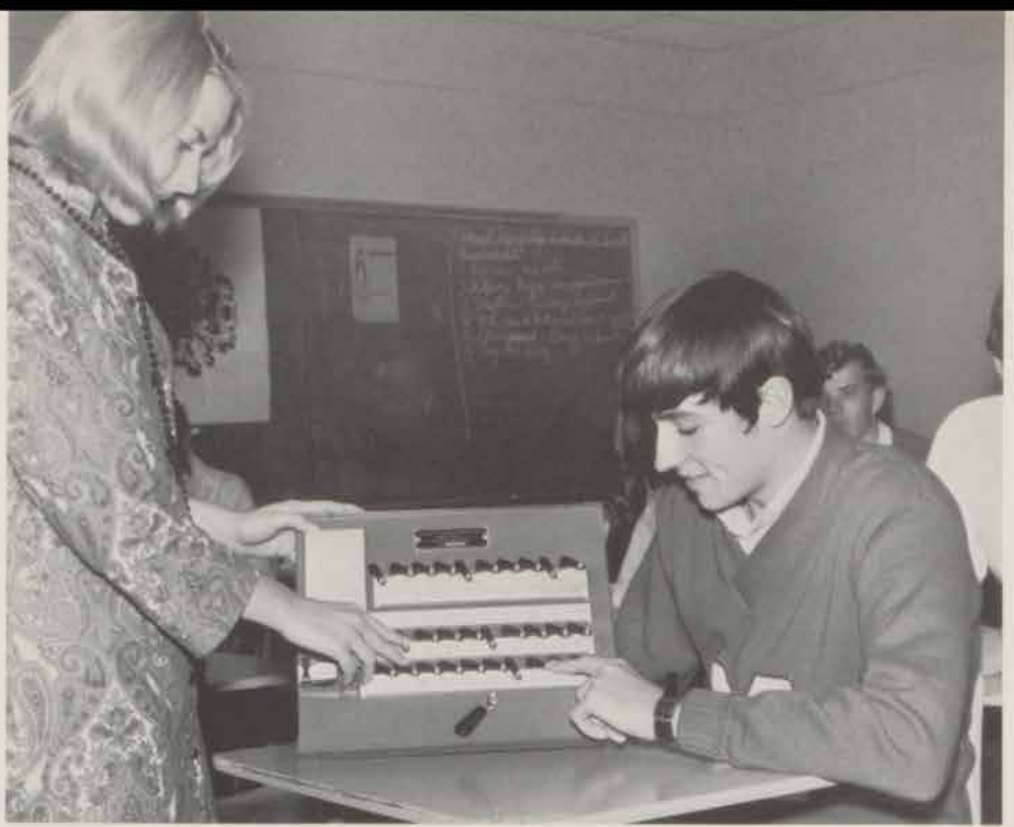

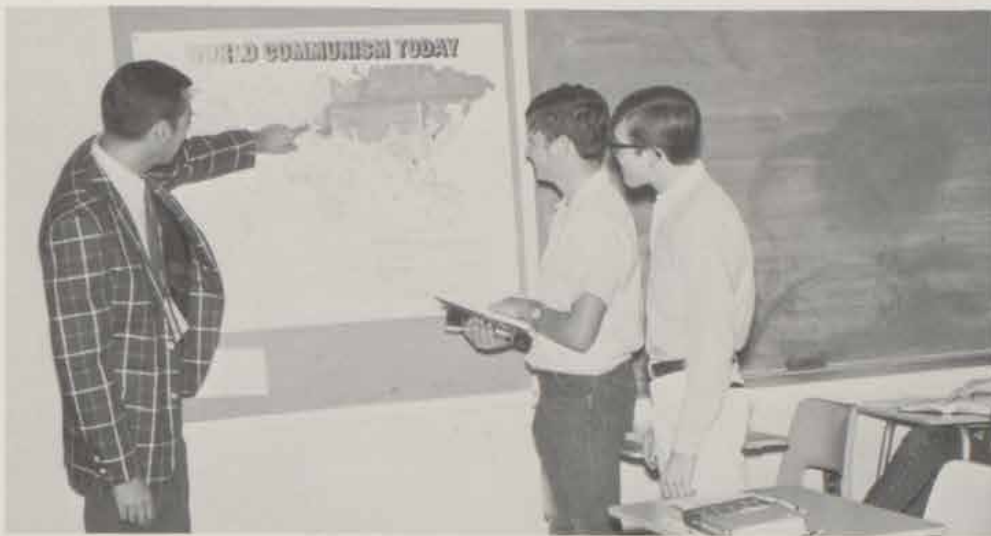

Student Teachers Enlighten Social Studies Area



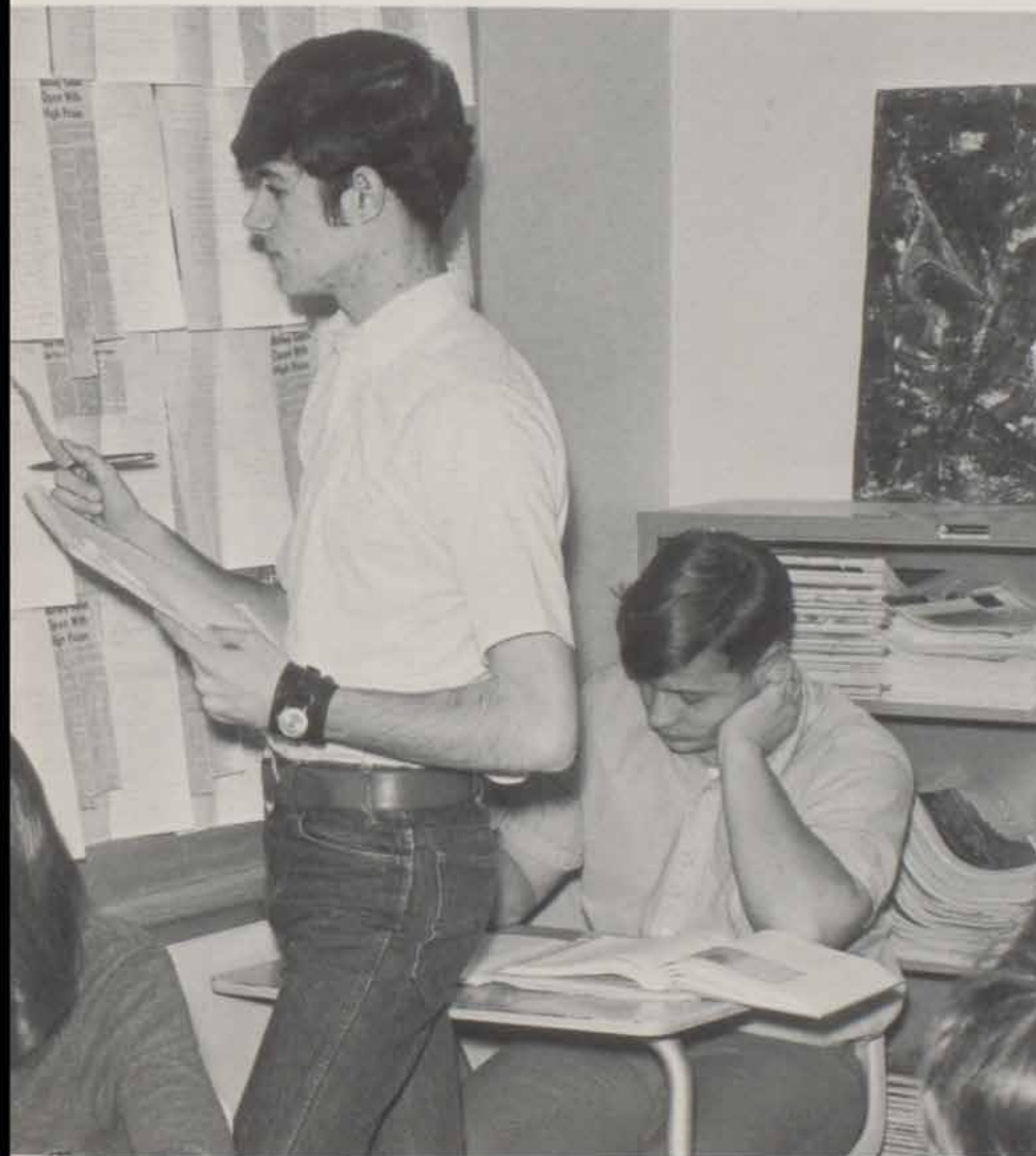
Mr. Cooper's American history class compares our government with other governments of the world. Interested students Jerry Bruce and Donald Bickers watch intently.

The department also obtained twelve supplementary books for the new library, and chose textbooks for next year.

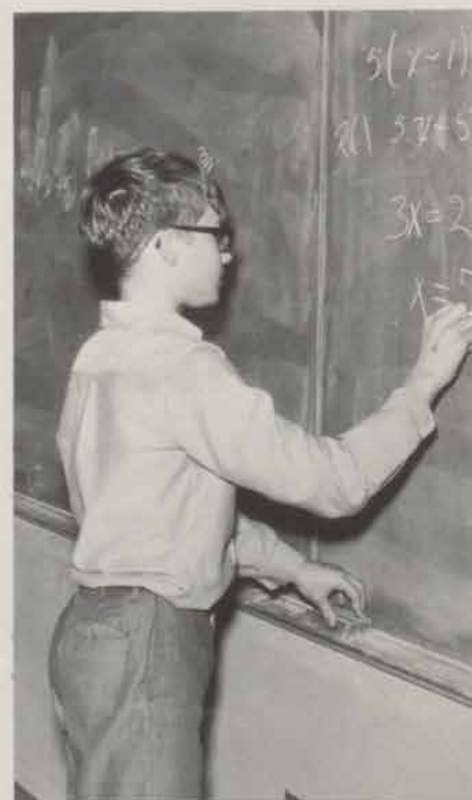

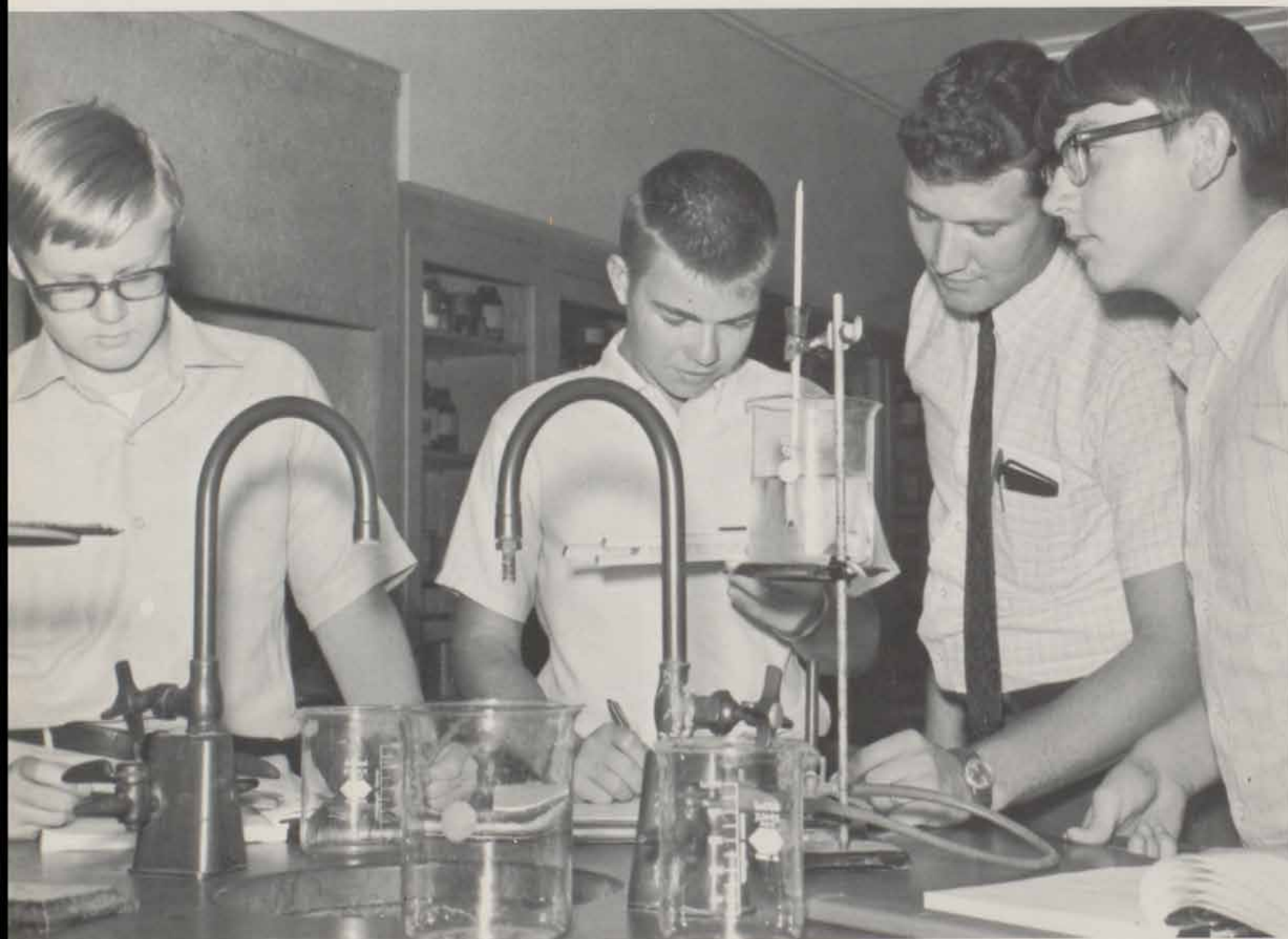
Science Department Commences Individual Learning Programs

With Mr. Imel as the new chairman, the science department added two new teachers. Mr. Waltz taught biology and advanced biology and Mr. Chism taught biology and physical science.

New pamphlets and books were purchased to supplement the student textbooks. Reports using the new material were written throughout the year.

Mr. Imel tried an independent study program for his physics students. In order to arouse student interest, Mr. Imel worked with the idea that if a

student had to find his own information, he would retain it longer. Thus, instead of lecturing to his students each day, he left many options from which they were free to choose. Pupils viewed films, worked on labs, studied in the library, and listened to lectures. The experiment gave many of the expected results. Students who wanted to study learned more than usual, however, students who lacked initiative learned only what they may have overheard in the classroom.

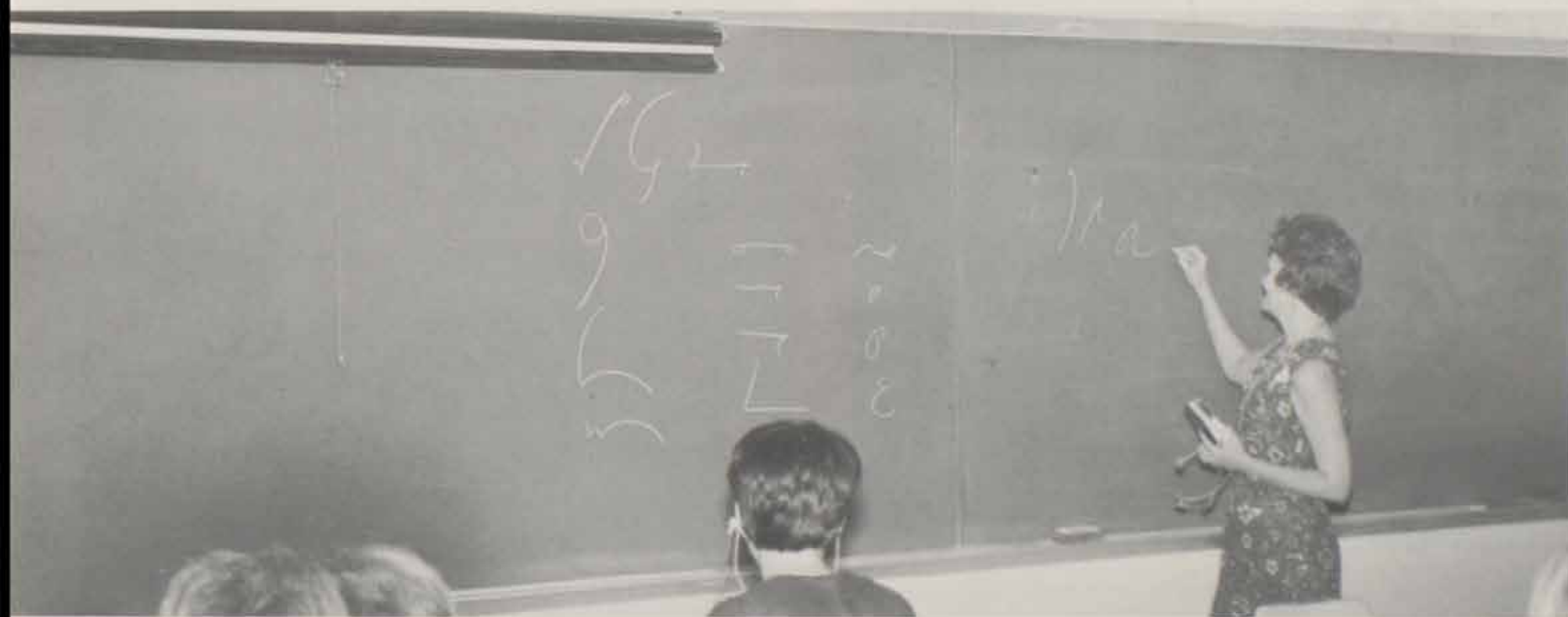
Business Machines Accelerate Learning, Skill

To help students prepare for future careers, various teaching aids were utilized in each business course. In filing classes, films helped students to improve their new skill. First year shorthand pupils practiced with transmitters, ear-phones, and recorders to reach the goal of sixty words a minute. One course consisted of mastering the uses of business machines. This one year course acquainted students with the key-driven, the rotary calculator, the full band, and the ten key. Nearly four weeks were spent on each machine during which the students learned how to add, multiply, divide, and subtract. In typing classes, record players were helpful in accelerating student progress. Also, electric typewriters were provided for practice, adding variety to the course.

The many extras available in each course enlivened interest and served to symbolize the modernization of the business department.

Language Studies Accent Practical Application

The foreign language department competed with the shrinking world. Steps were taken not only to instruct students in the usage of correct grammar, but also, more emphasis was placed on the practical side of a language. Accordingly, many of the French, Spanish, and German classes read monthly newspapers. Also, classes read foreign books which related to the countries where the particular language was spoken. This provided an insight to both the country and the language.

In their efforts to improve classroom instruction, Mr. Keach visited Europe and Mr. O'Leary explored the land of Mexico this past summer. Dr. Walling became a U.S. citizen this year and his students learned not only from his authentic accent, but also about the process of becoming a citizen.

Band, Choral Club Play Active Roles in Academic Productions

While waiting for the completion of the new band addition last fall, band members practiced outside on the football field. Waiting proved worthwhile, for the new air-conditioned band wing included five practice rooms, a music library, a band room equipped for 150

players, and two offices.

Boys enrolled in mechanical drawing learned to construct camshafts, gears, 3-D mechanical drawings, and other geometric figures. Students of general metals became acquainted with types of tools and were required to mill a meat tenderizer handle. A new instructor, Mr. Whitehead, was engaged to teach the general metal classes. The shop classes also filled a display case with articles from their projects.

Home Ec. Combines Basic Skills, Specialization



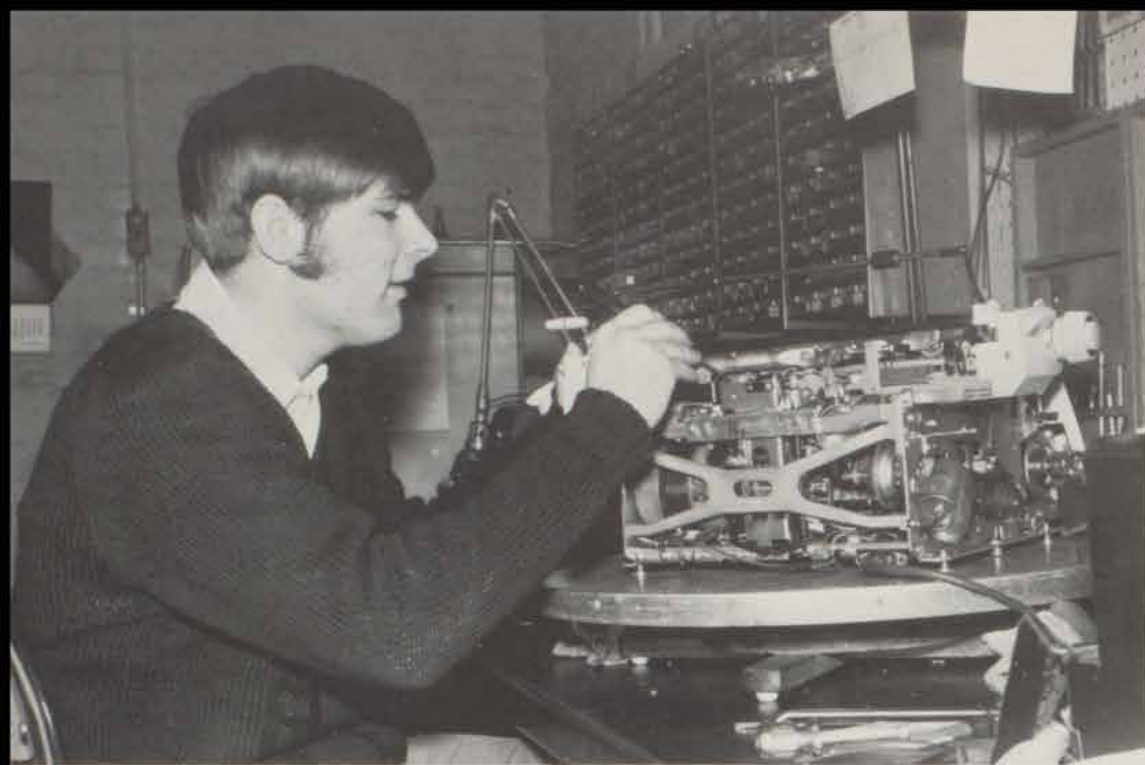

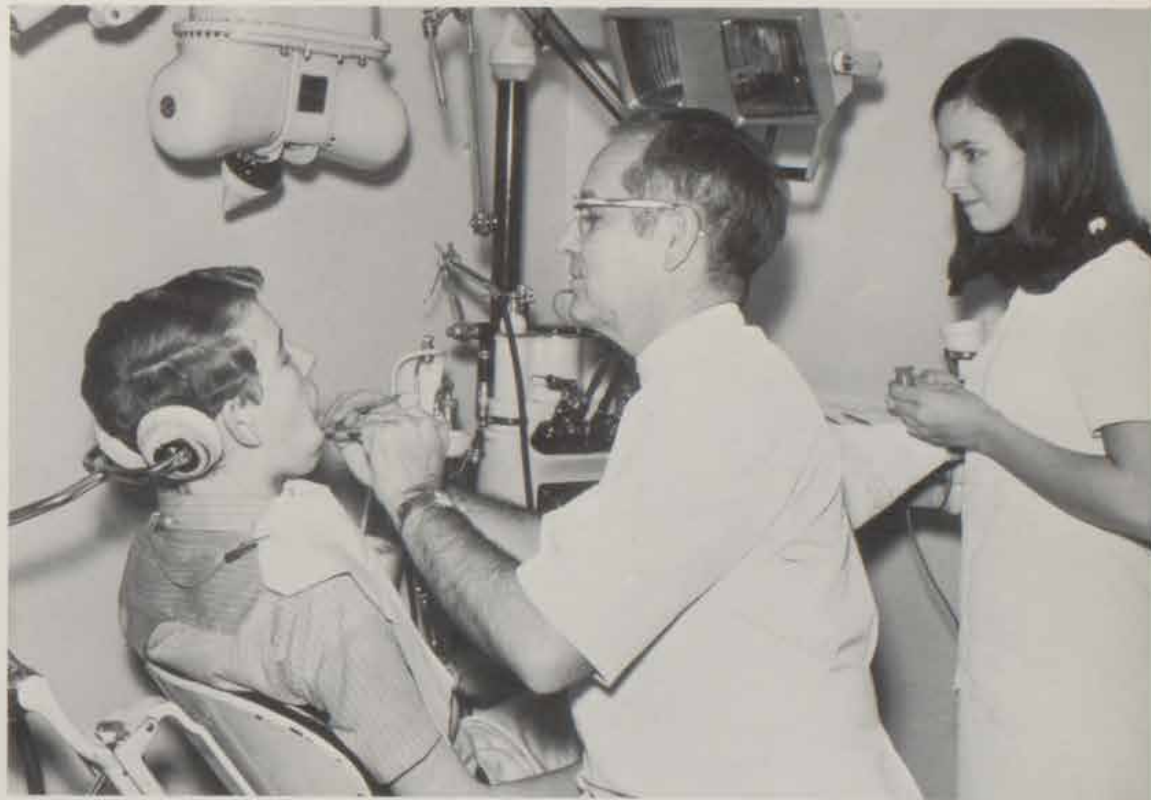

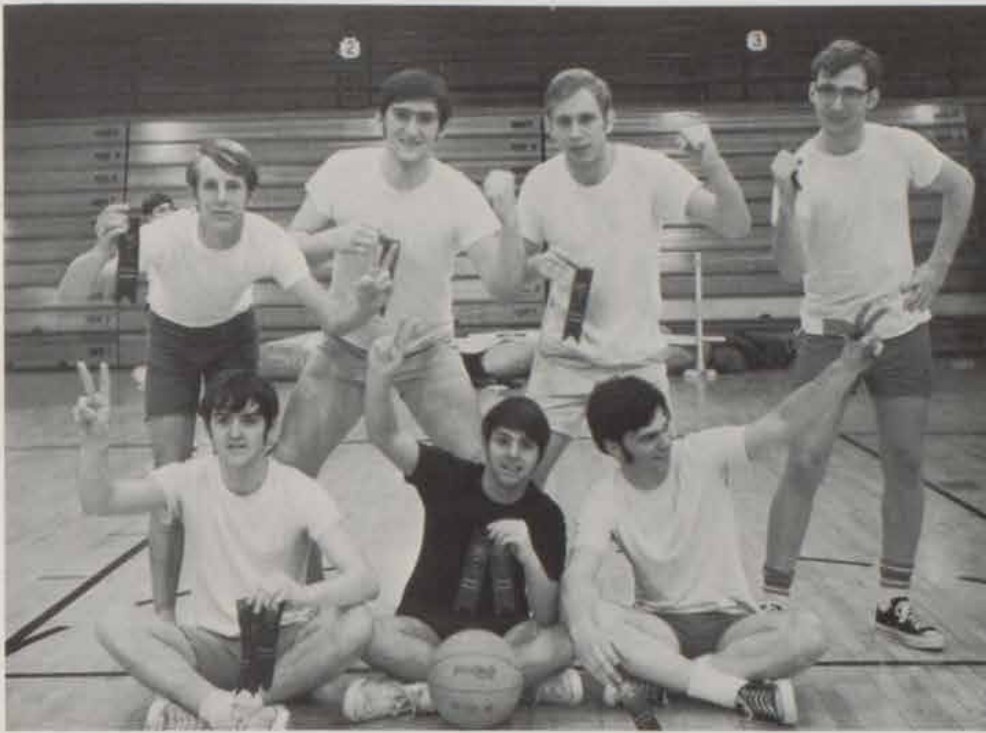

Wider Sports Participation Offered in Intramurals



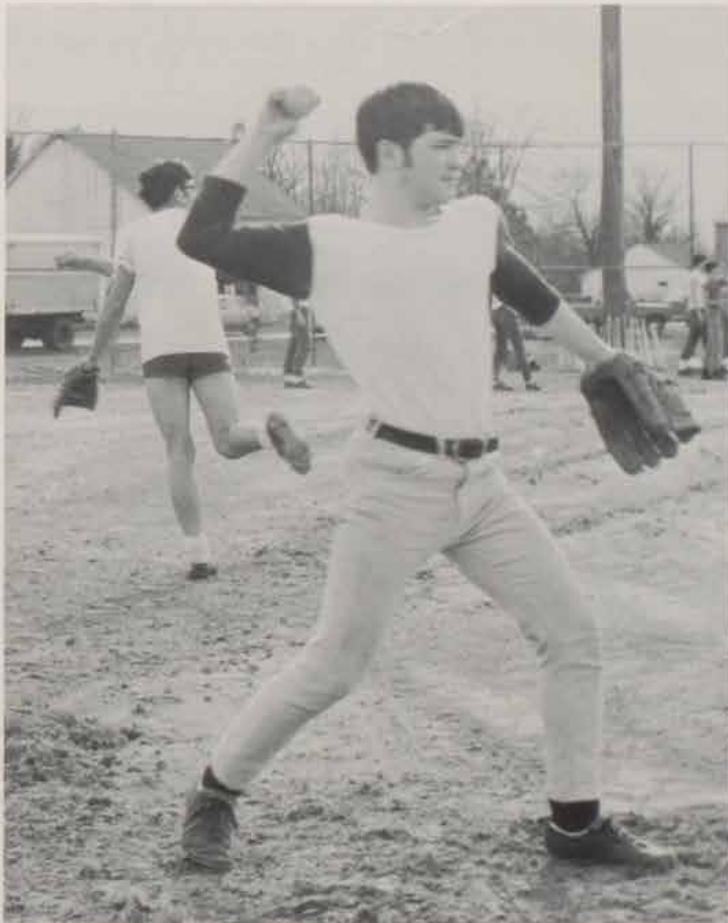

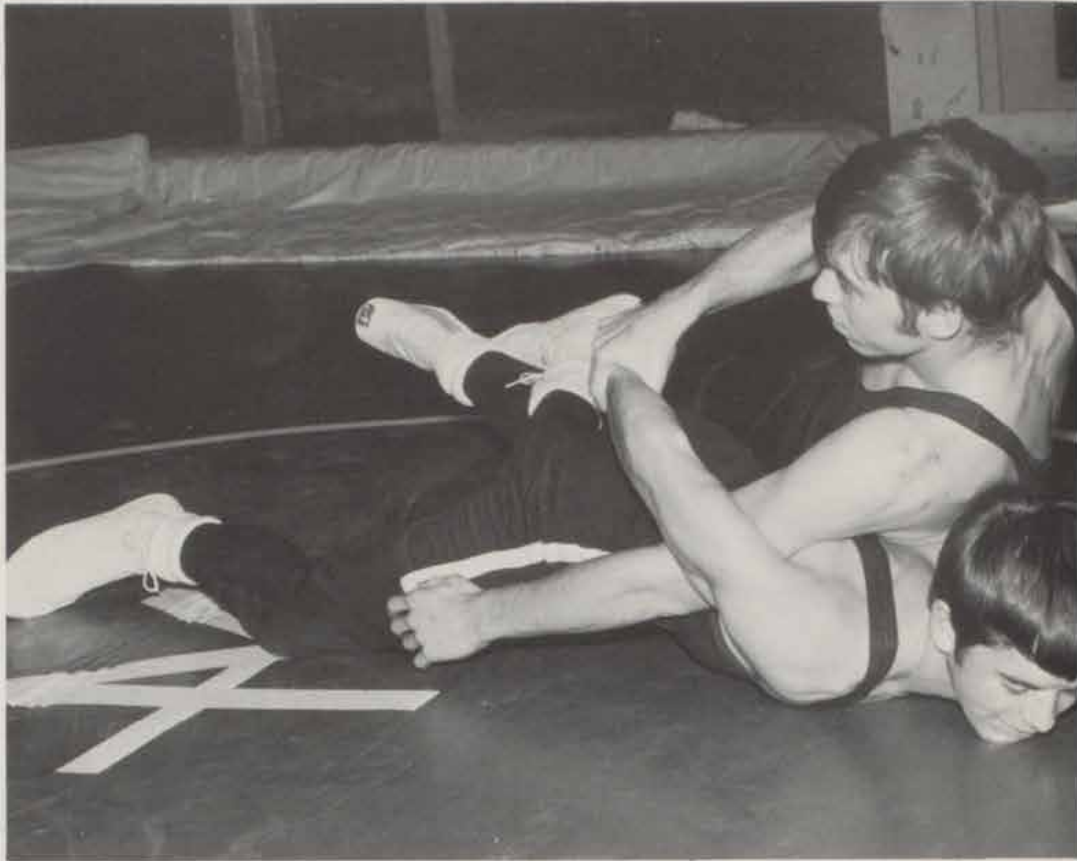

Young Coach Directs Tennis Team Season

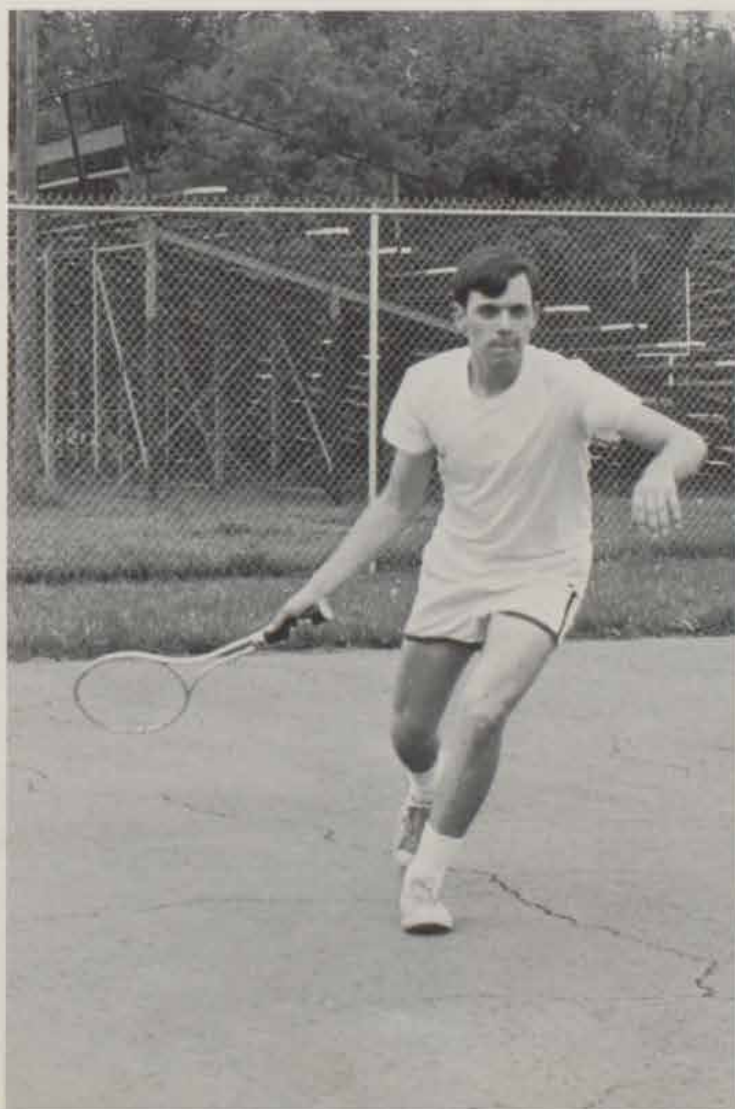

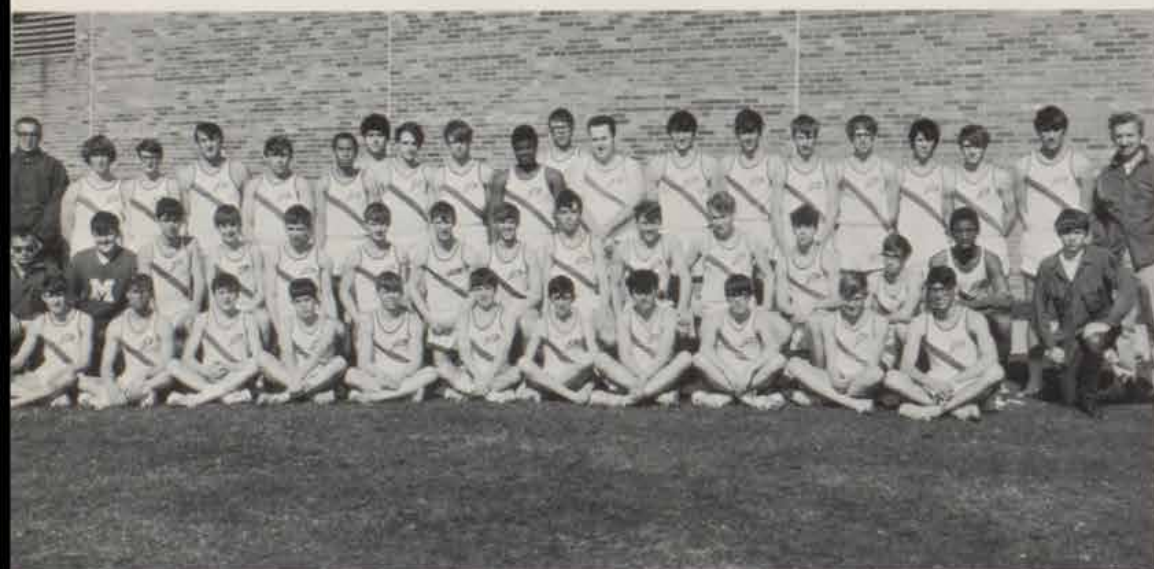
Cindermen Excel in All Events; Successful Track Season Slated

In the sectional, the Cubs finished fifteenth out of 20 teams.

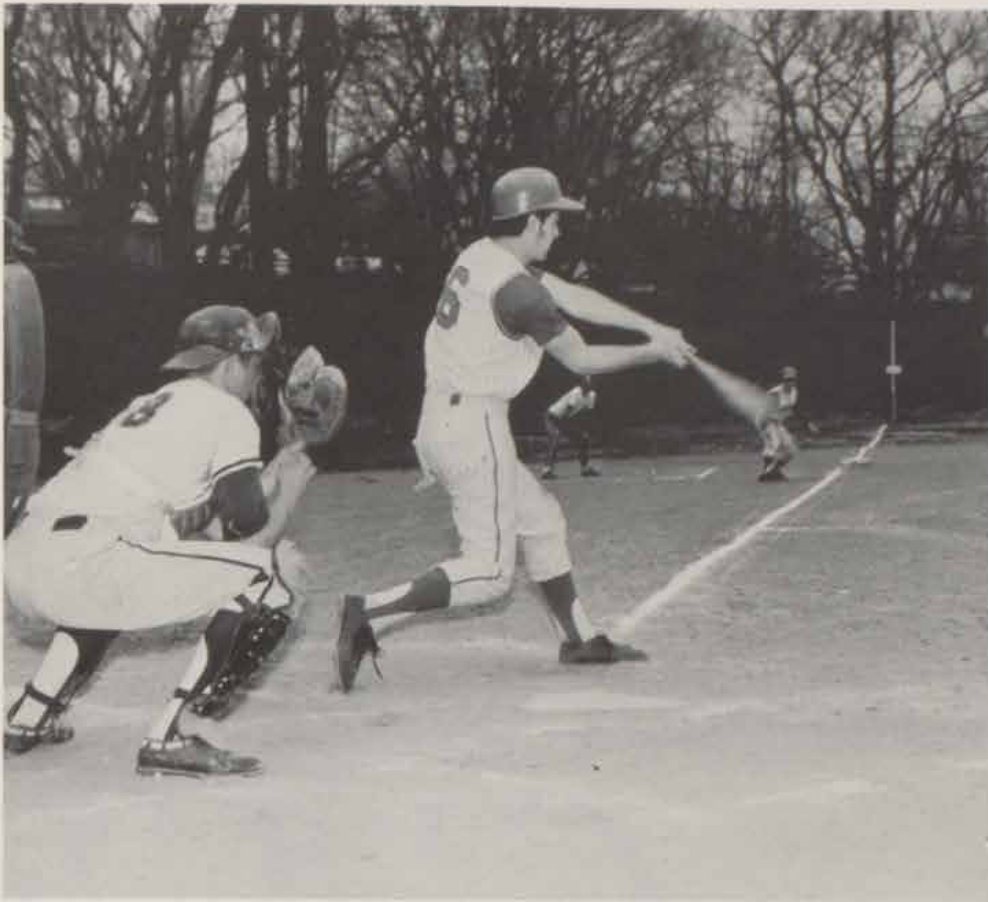

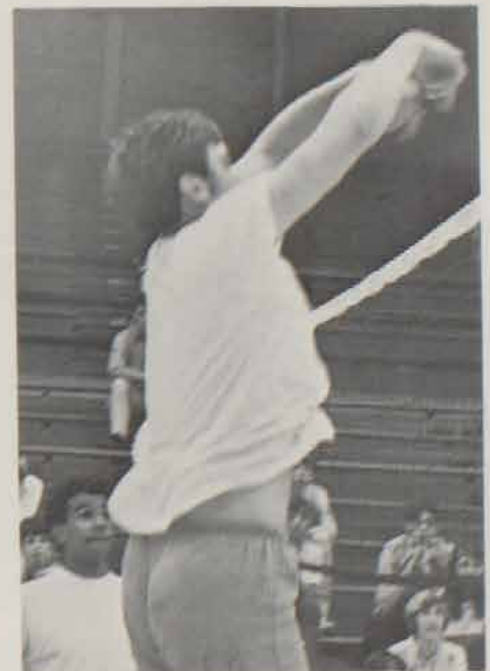

At the annual BLAST banquet the guest speaker was Dr. Carl Chappell.



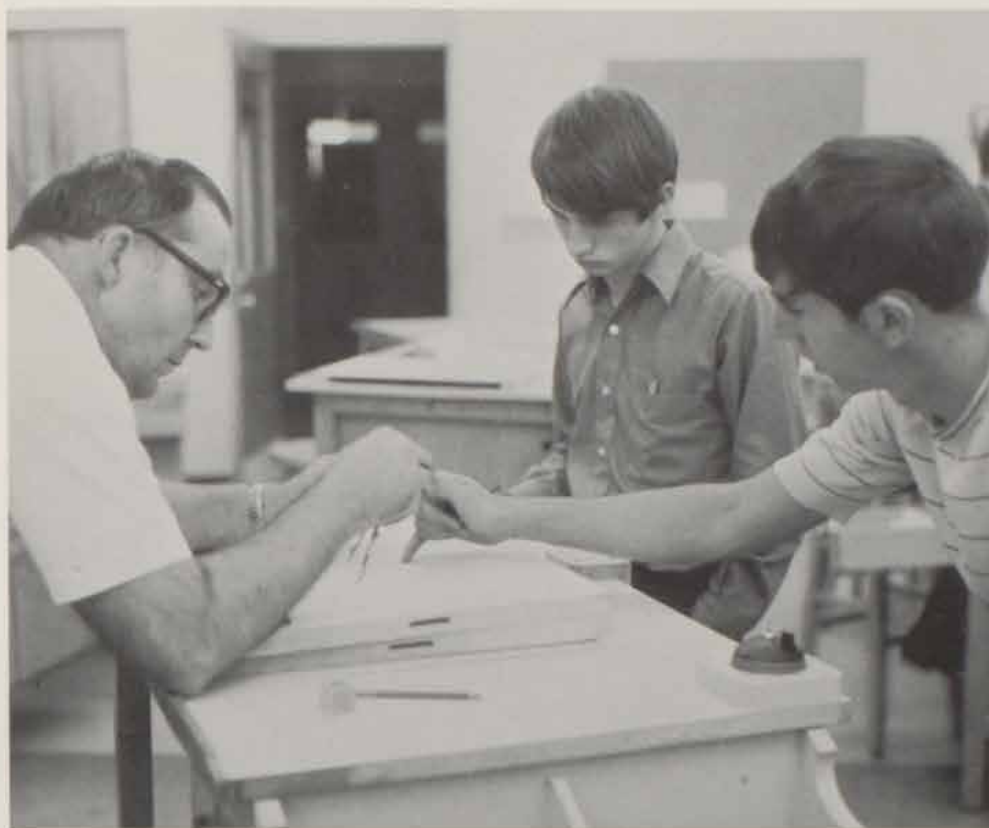

Mr. Colegrove supervised the audio-visual boys who distributed the equipment to various teachers that had reserved them for classroom use.



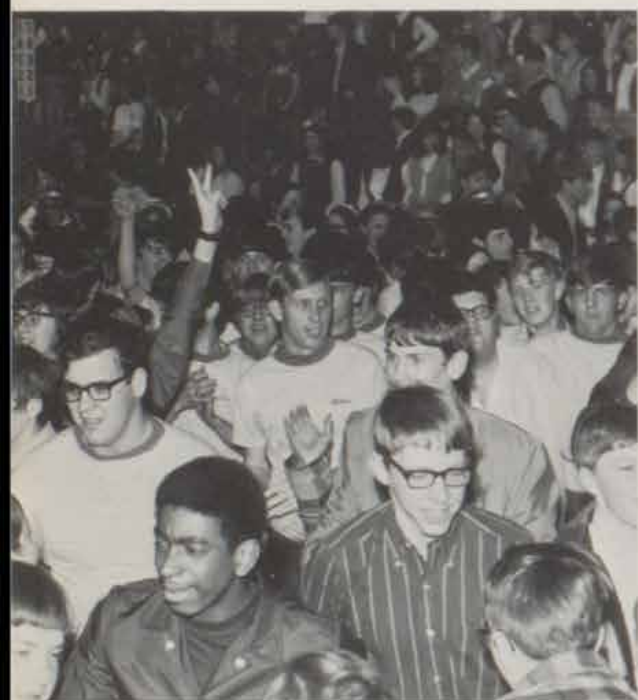

Mr. Keach entertained the German Club with a program consisting of a travelogue of Europe.

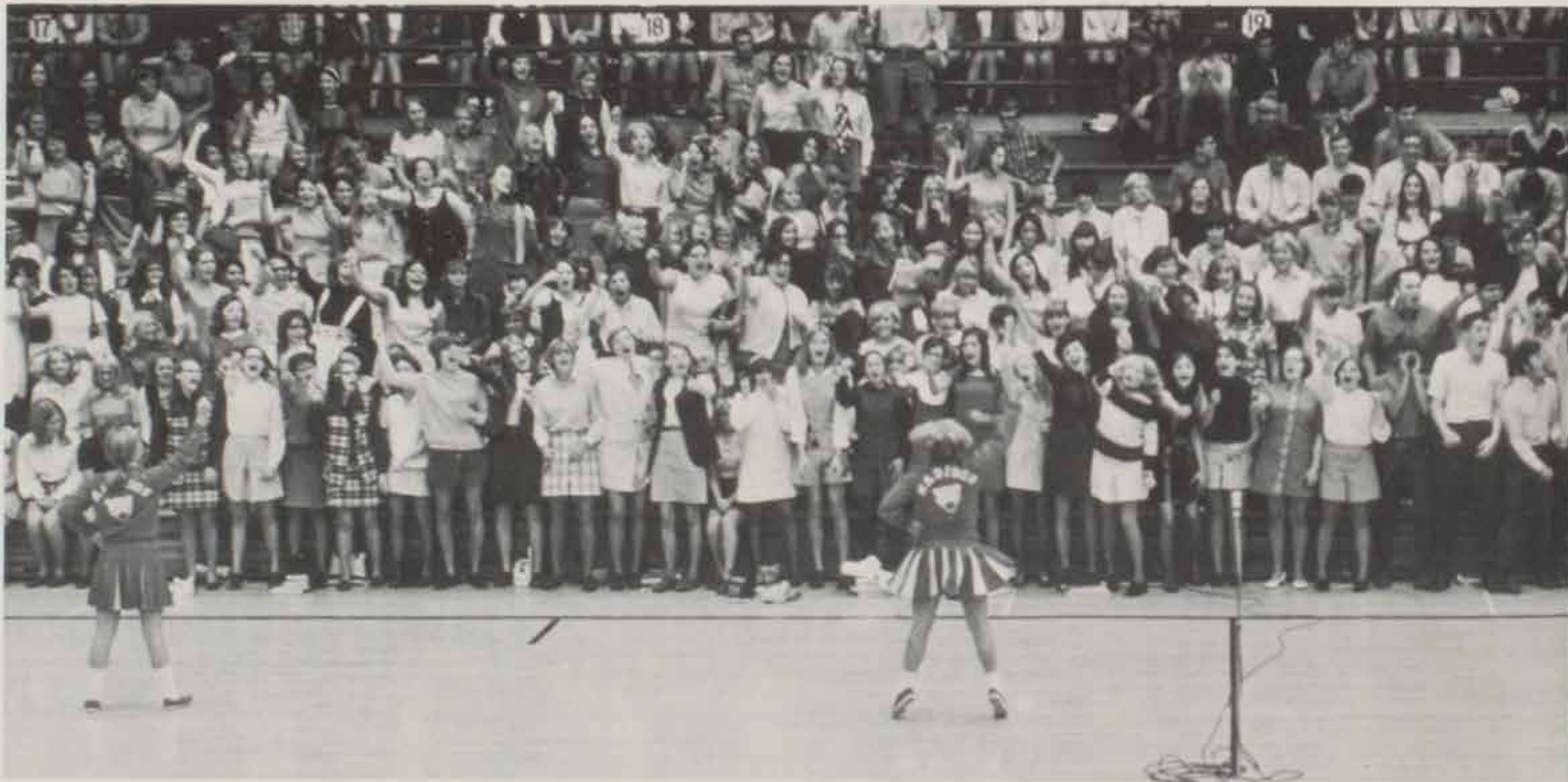

Busy Seniors Fly Through Final Year of Studies



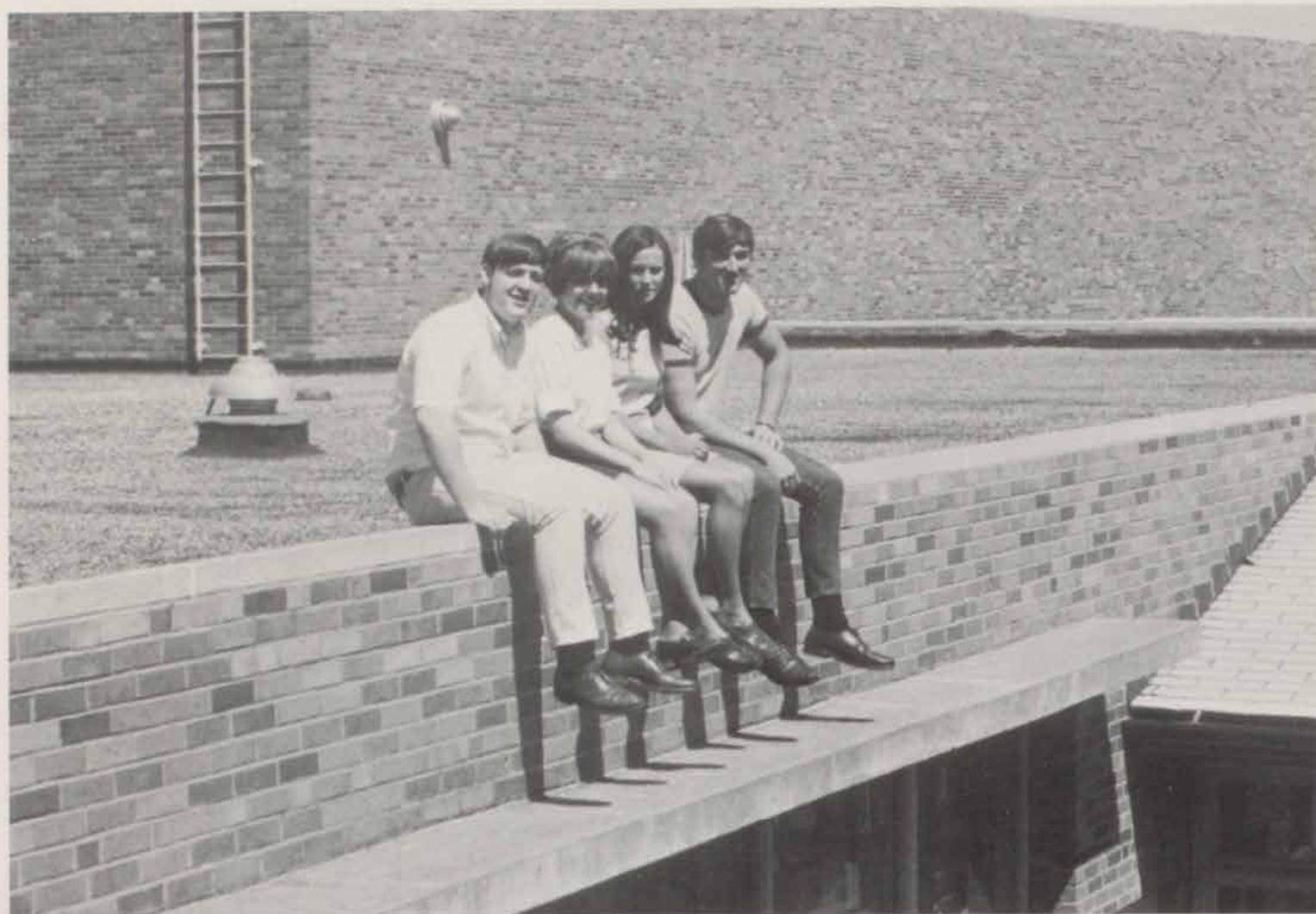
The seniors, in their final year of high school, kept busy with assorted activities and interests. Miss Stinson and Mr. Colegrove advised the class in its decisions.
