






























Determination






Student Life





IN ORDER TO shatter the spell of inferiority on the scarecrow, Debble Heath as Polly exhibits her acceptance by giving him a kiss.








BLOODY MARY, a native woman of Bali Ha'i, is portrayed by Becky Rogers as she attempts to sell grass skirts to the GIs.










Class of '71 **Gains honors** At assembly






kov. Three numbers were presented by the choir which was directed by Miss Myra Laughlin.








Organizations

Knitting Club opened its first meeting of the year which was concerned with the writing of the constitution. Members did not have to pay dues but they had to furnish all materials they used.










The Council's annual Christmas party for needy children was given in the cafeteria. Students and members helped with various activities.




Creativity is The answer To success

The hoop was decorated and presented before the game as the team confidently broke onto the court.











Student aids assisted the various departments with the aid of several new facilities. Extra storage room provided space for audio visual and library equipment.


Thespians display abilities Exhibiting recent histrionics








Striving for a better school life and helping the surrounding communities was the goal of Sunshine and Hi-Y Societies.

in which Hi-Y members ran for offices while following the procedures of the Indiana legislature.



















Mr. Dohn, a graduate of Western Kentucky University, was employed as a new algebra teacher.








MR. DOHN, AN algebra teacher, new to the faculty, explains the fundemental uses of algebraic equations duing his first day of teaching at the school.


Team teaching experiments began in the earth science classes. Mr. Adler, Mr. Chism, and Mr. Harmon taught these classes.
















Shop students develop creative talents



Industrious students excel in business



Forty-one students participated in the ICT program, while thirty-six were active in the DE program. These students worked at local businesses during half the school day.










LEADING RUSHER Perry Cosby tries desperately to evade a Salem safety. In the homecoming game, Perry ran for three touchdowns.



Madison's Fightin' Cubs started practice in mid-August to prepare for the inter-squad scrimmage game on August 29. Head coach, Mr. Gallatin, guided his gridsters to four wins and five losses.

Even though the Cubs lost their first two games to Greensburg and Batesville, they won the next four which set a new school record. 






Athletic ambitions, abilities Shown through intramurals





Track records fall during cinder season




The 1971 track team was one of the best under Coach Gallatin.


The team's 0-6 season was mainly do to the boys' inexperience. Improvement is next year's objective.




Golfers drive On to records And victories








Memories of Seniors' year Are treasured




