


Emotionally ready




Finding ourselves


Many records were broken in the best Homecoming performance ever. Records broken from 1967-68 season included the most games won, the highest score, and most yardage gained.




Dress up, fifties days show contrasting styles


Student Council awarded two free tickets to the Uriah Heep Concert to promote student participation. Chuck Bear dressed in pegged pants, pointed shoes,







Throughout their four years at Madison the class of 73 had been known for their originality. This characteristic was shown during their combined baccalaureate-commencement exercise.


Aside, from the traditional graduation ceremony the senior class selected Colour My World to be sung by fellow classmates. This song served as a reminder of class sponsored activities.


The class colors of sky blue and silver were exemplified by presenting each girl with a light blue carnation after receiving her diploma.







Foreign languages present challenges





Publications staffs accomplish noteworthy goals



Involved students acquire knowledge


Involvement and interest describe students in the social studies area.


Three day camping trip motivates science classes.


and plant experiments.




Music gains interest for fine arts students






This year could be termed another successful year for the practical arts department. Among subjects offered were mechanical drawing, woodworking, welding and general shop.


















Whether the Cubs were coming or going was a big question all season. The team exploded during the first of the year and hopped to a sixth place rating in the AP polls.

Senior forward Ed Hackney led the team in free throws with a sizzling 82.7 percent. Senior Bill Johann collected 121 assists for near seven per game.

































Science Club earns funds





The next project the juniors undertook was the homecoming float. The title of their float was "A WHALE OF A SEASON" and was decorated with a gigantic whale made of tissue paper.






Administration combats red tape; also evaluation
