

Destination



Junior Tim Baden and Freshman Heather Andersonshare a friendly hug in the lobby during passing period. The couple could be seen sharing many hugs during and after school.





Juniors O'Retha Grace and Mike Hadden are seen together in the halls everyday. Very few couples make it to long-term status.



And help our day be more worthwhile.


We didn't think we would part. But now it's time for a brand new start.



A Week of Unknowns






Focus


"Memories that Last a Lifetime"





Honors Day: Days To Remember





















Student Council. Many of these students, such as Dorothy Hoffmann, were involved in activities outside of school as well. Hoffmann was an active member in Girl Scouts.





Band members can also be found in community events. The MCHS band marches in the Christmas parade and Regatta parade down Main Street.





Junior staff member Emily Waltz stated, "The most interesting thing that I have learned is how to develop and print pictures."


A lot of time was spent learning to use the computers and the different programs used to develop the book. Students also learned to develop film and make prints in the dark room.



Madison students are involved in many of the programs the Career Center has to offer. Auto Body Repair is a program that gives the students the skills and knowledge to repair the bodies of vehicles and to refinish and paint them. Auto Body students also repair wrecked or damaged care of local customers. Auto Mechanics emphasizes the skills to work with gasoline engines. Students learn repair procedures and basic service skills required of an auto mechanic. In Diesel Mechanics, students learn to repair and service diesel powered vehicles, and

farm machinery, technology provides knowledge in the electricity. The technology students installation for the year by Building

Electronics prepares students for entry-level employment relating to electronic controls and electronic equipment maintenance, and provides a good background for further education in the electronics field. Machine Trades will train students for employment in precision machining technology. Machine Trades has a transferal-credit agreement with Ivy Tech. Welding students get the opportunity to receive hand-on experiences with both arc and gas welding equipment. The students also have the opportunity to take the AWS Welding Certification test from the American Welding Society. Jimmy Stultz says, "I am planning to be an underwater welder after I graduate."

Food Management and Production provides students with the needed skills, experiences, and knowledge for a variety of food service occupations, and entry-level management positions. Cosmetology students get actual shop experience and second year students work on customers that come in..

Students have to get 1500 clock hours of training then they can take the State Board Exam, and become licensed hair stylists. Students like going to Versailles because it is a change from MCHS and it gives them an opportunity to learn about a career they are interested in. Shannon Lauderbaugh stated, "It is better than just sitting in school all day and it is a fun change."





It was decided by the committee to hold this year's prom in the cafeteria. The colors were navy blue, silver, and white.


Prom committee member Angelia Bornstein said, "I joined the prom committee because I wanted to have a say in what goes on, and because it would be fun."

The Sophomore class has a very bright and talented young man leading them into next year.






The Cubs ended the season with 3-7 record, which is improvement from the 1996-1997 season record of 0-9.






One Step Closer

Volleyball A Year to Remember





Practicing for a higher level






A Whole New Class












Emily Waltz and Amy Hoffman warm up on a windy day at Cozy Acres before a match against Jennings county.




In their final sectional warmup this year's golf team broke a fifthteen year old school record. The Cubs shot a 292 against Jennings County to break the old 18 hole record.







A Long Way To The Top


A long way to the top was a very true statement, in more than one way, when it came to this years freshmen cheerleading squad.




Their last game came against Indianapolis Cathedral in the




Senior guard Kyle Oliver slaps hands with teammates during starting lineups of the Floyd Central game. Madison beat Floyd Central by a score of 74-53.





Ison also commented on the season by saying, "As this team progressed from the beginning of the season to the end they made good strides with the exceptions of a few games and I enjoyed coaching this team.

























Season of Dreams


The Varsity Cubs baseball team accomplished something that not many other teams do- they were semi-state runner-up. Also, the team was ranked #1 in the state for class 3A.




Junior Collin Schafer watches the ball to see if it goes foul. Schafer was one of the Cubs leading batters this season.

Cubs Defeat Jennings County, Floyd Central, and New Albany








Junior singles player Collin Schafer, who was 3-0 in the sectional, commented, "It was a little rough at the beginning, but things began to come together as the season moved on."








Emily Waltz, prepares for the incoming serve. The pairing of Waltz and Gettelfinger at number one doubles, proved to be a dynamic duo.






Through the past year we have all bonded, made new friends, and made many new memories that we will never forget.


