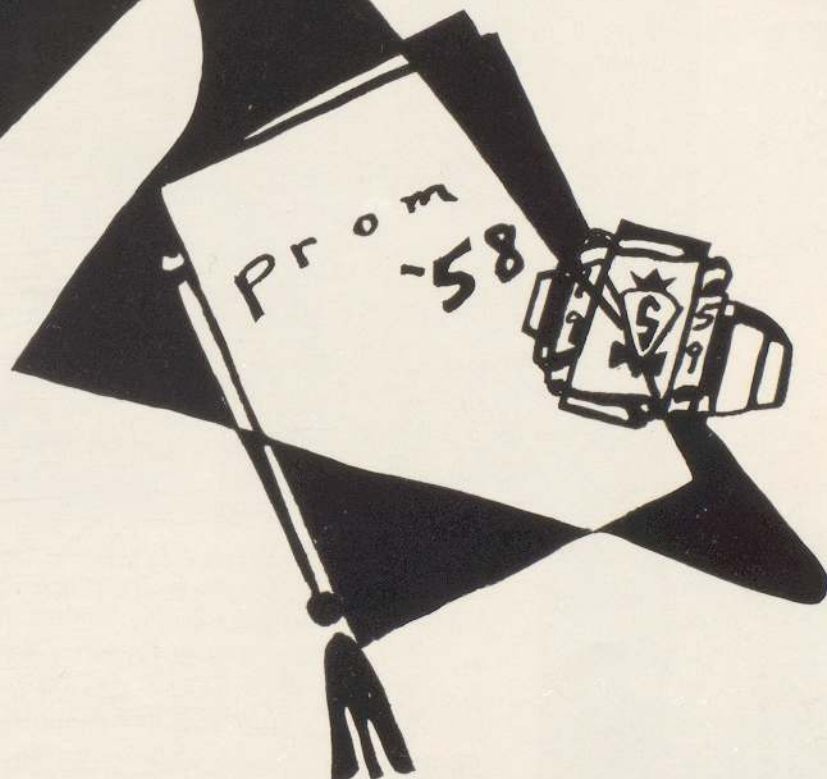

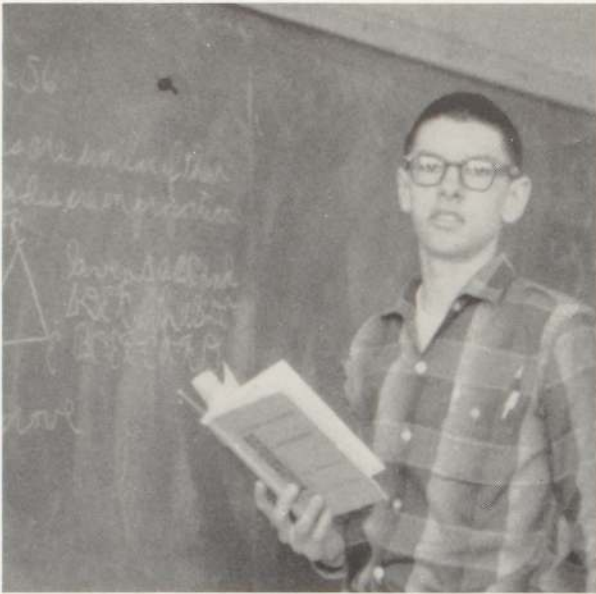

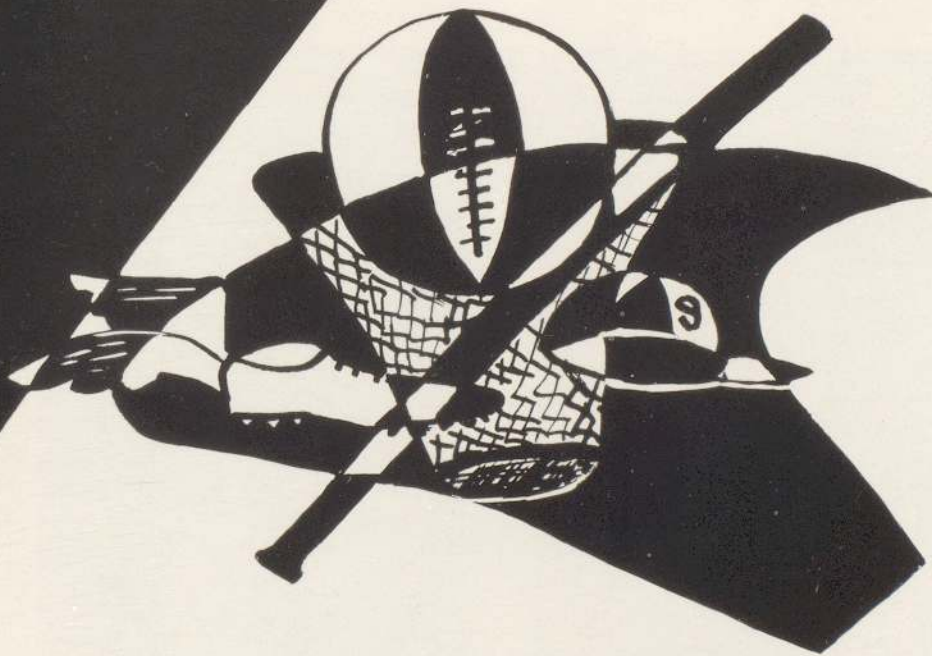

Shawe's team '57-'58 was slated to be a building season, but the green and gold of Jack Dwyer, by winning nine straight games and going on for an impressive 16-6 record, changed the general opinion. In one of the most impressive season games, 36-34 over Charleston, a tight zone defense coupled with some hot shooting spelled victory for the Hilltoppers. When Shawe defeated Austin, by holding the Eagles to one point in the third quarter, our seventh win was racked up. After the county tourney, in which Shawe ranked as a heavy favorite, the victory trail was resumed by defeating Saluda, Holten, Osgood, Rising Sun, and the Providence Pioneers. In the first game of the Sectionals, an overtime win over Scottsburg 45-42 gave the fans excitement which is traditional to tourney play. Paris Crossing fell to the Hilltoppers, who then played Madison, the eventual winner of the Sectionals.

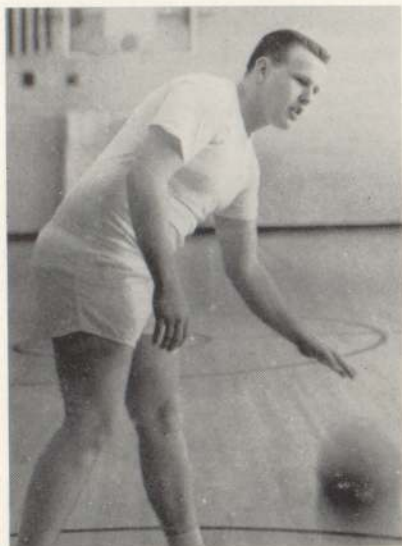

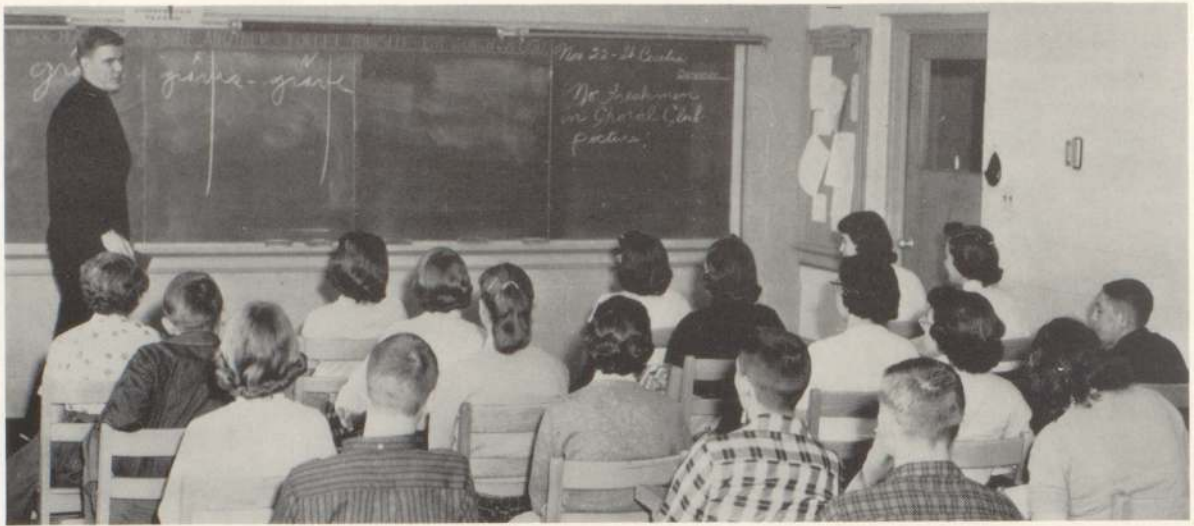

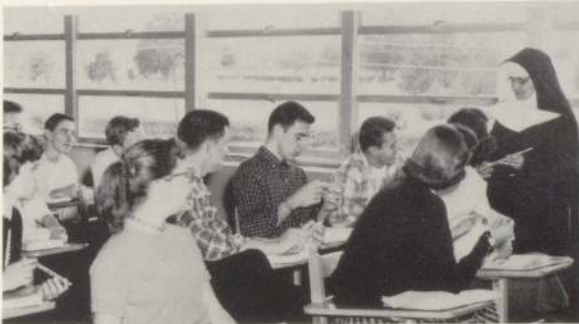
