



As you recall your fellow-students and teachers, and the classes and tests, the religious programs, school activities, and athletic events, remember why you did all this at Shawe High School.






Faculty, Administration . . . help with a smile
















Study: To know more is to be more






Ping Pong and Ball Bats




















Sectional Champs!

right) runners-up in the tough New Albany Bible Quiz. And Rhonda Goley (right) was named Shawe's Miss Bettye Crocker.


