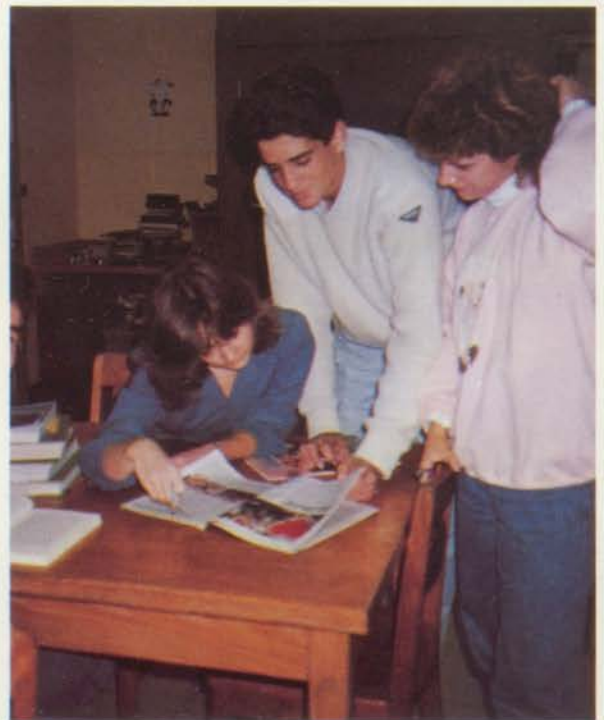

This is our time to learn, to make new friends, to celebrate victories, and most of all to become stronger in our faith as Christians.

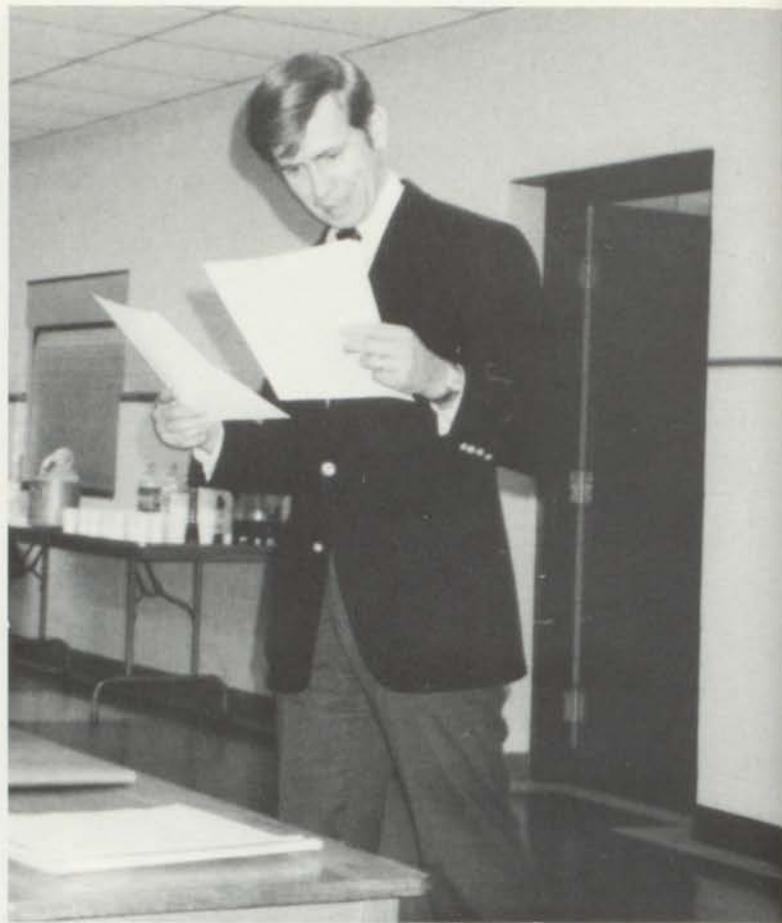


The Administration Works to Help

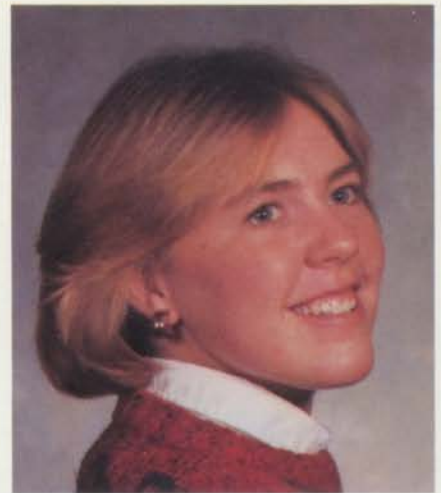

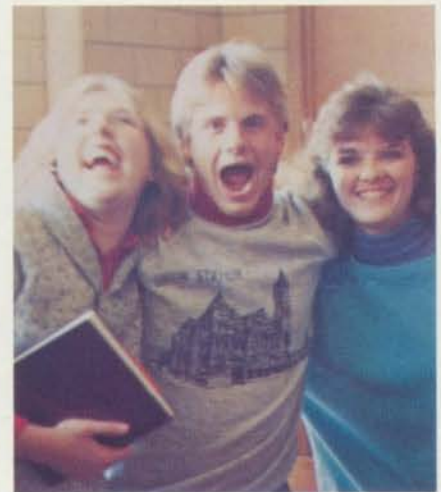

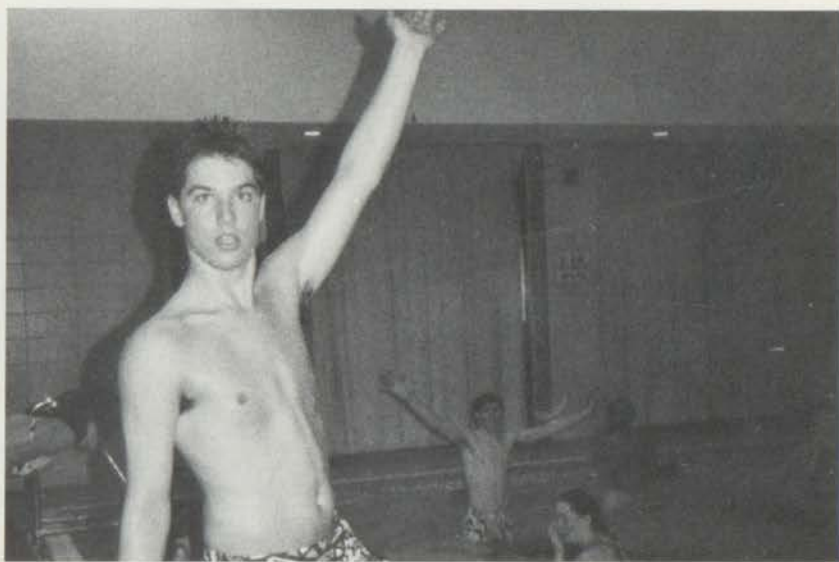

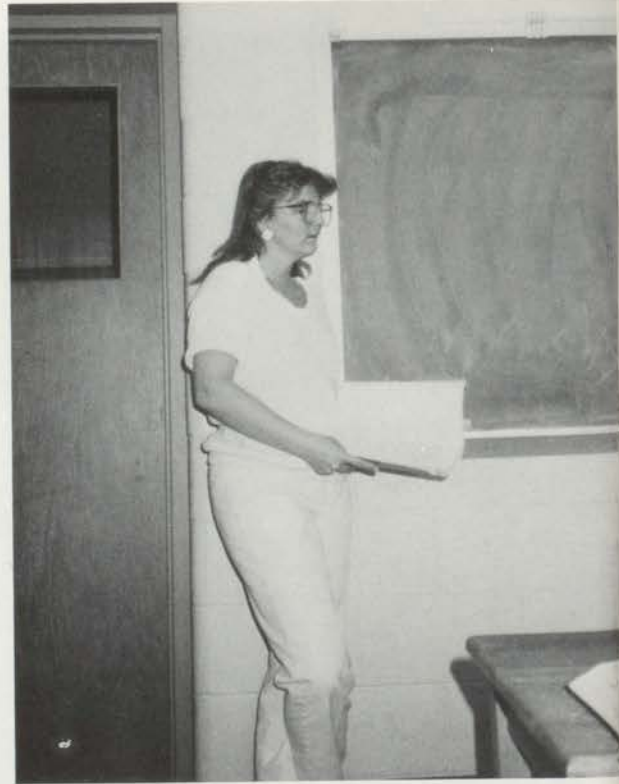

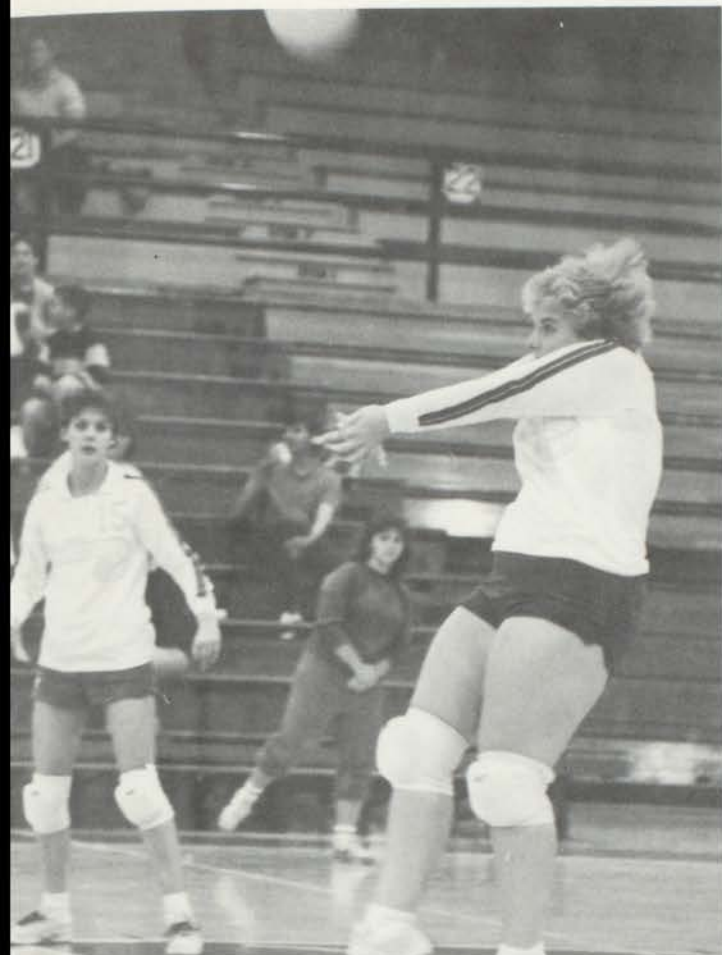

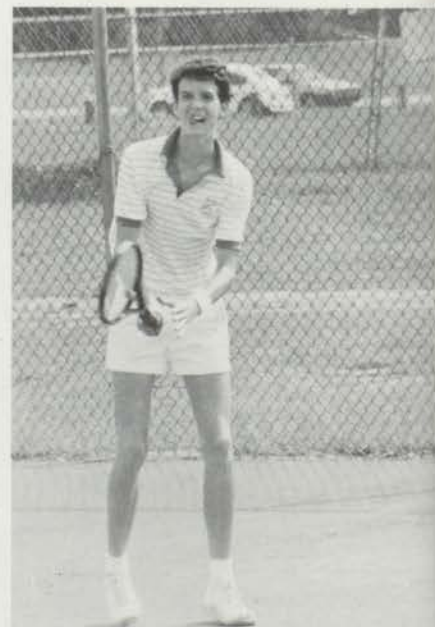

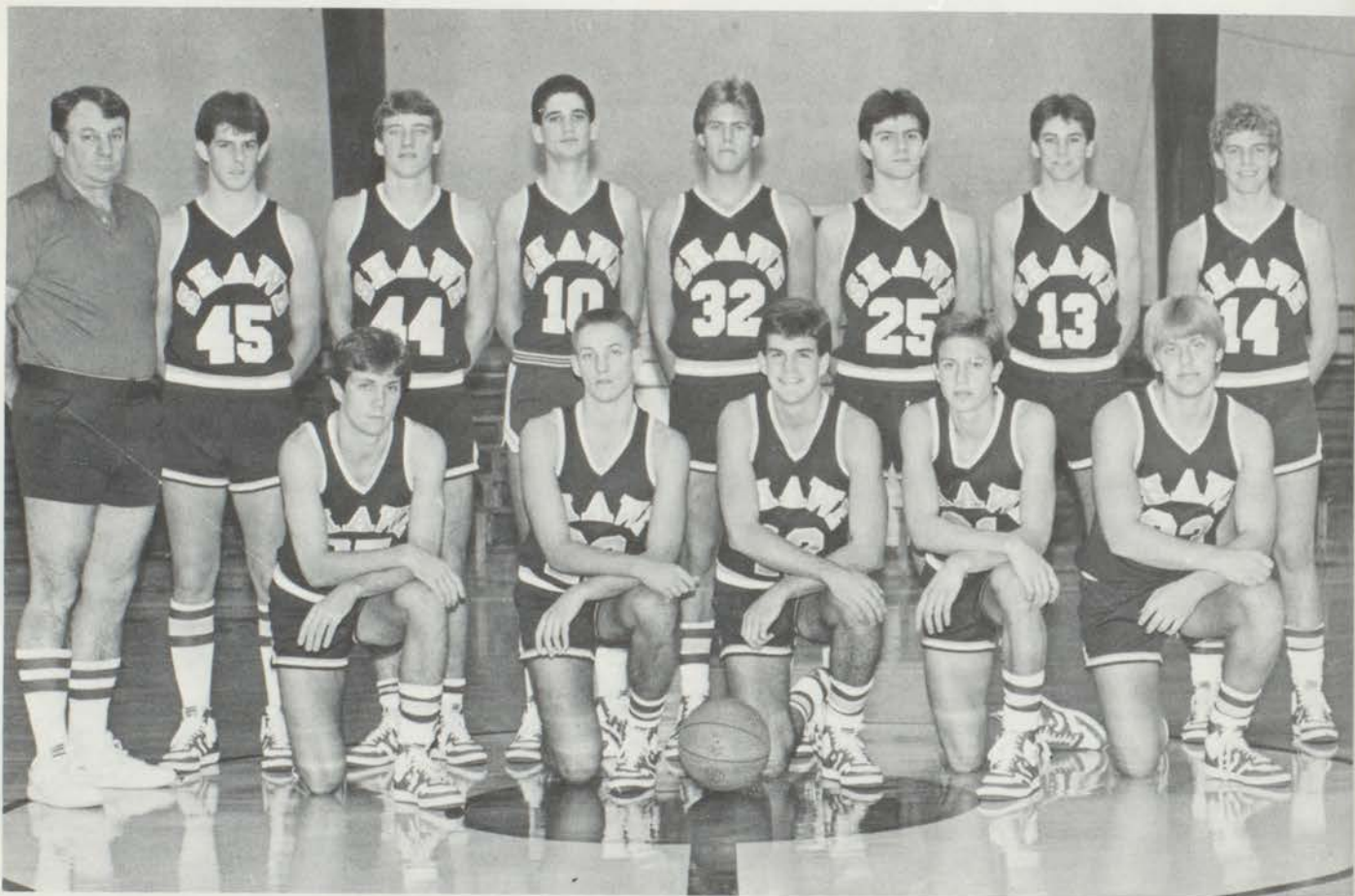

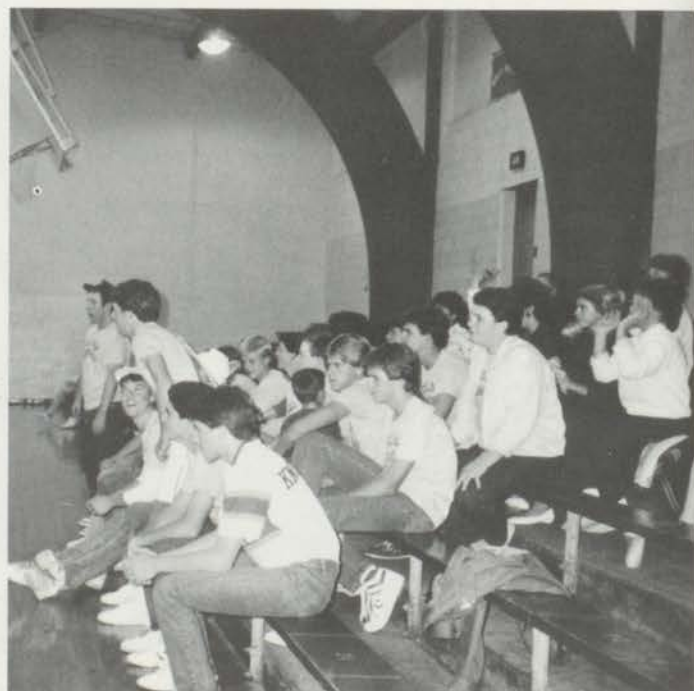
