



Probably as long as this school exists, there will always be that special family feeling that is nearly impossible to find anywhere else.



The administration has many responsibilities that people are not aware of. Mr. Arthur Politz, principal, deals with irate parents and teachers. He negotiates conflicting interests within the school community and he gives out detentions to unwary students who commit crimes like standing in the hallway or walking on the grass.

Mr. Allen Boedecker, director of religious education, is in charge of confirmation, senior retreat, Sunday religious education, school mass, and other aspects dealing with religious education in the school.

Mrs. Karin Krasevac-Lenz is the director of Friends of Shawe and Pope John, a new organization founded in 1987 to collect contributions from Shawe alumni and school supporters. Friends kicked off its fund raising campaign November 14 with initial gifts totaling \$60,000. By February the group was able to announce gifts and pledges totaling \$330,628 toward a goal of \$500,000.

Mrs. Carolyn Pagel is the school secretary and bookkeeper. She is always hard at work keeping track of absentees, doing school paperwork, answering the phone, and keeping the books.

New and Different Faces



Seniors Have New Experience





ISTEP: The Pressure Is On!!


Academics have been enhanced by a new mandatory test called the "Indiana Statewide Testing for Educational Progress" (ISTEP). ISTEP was enacted by the state legislature of Indiana. This test was given to students in grades one, two, three, six, eight, nine and eleven. Used to show achievement and aptitude, the test covered areas like reading, math, spelling, writing and comprehension. If a student scored below a certain percentage he was required to take the courses failed in summer school. The test, given in segments totalling six to seven hours, was given in all Indiana schools March 1-11.





The answer to the question is yes, the students are into fashion and are just a bunch of young faddists among the halls and classrooms of Shawe.









Holding Our Own







Doubles players were Eddie Hunger, Wes McAdams, Brian Furnish, Michael Whitham, and Chris Harris.






Skiles Gets Sectional Win



Given encouragement by Coaches Jim Barnes and Bob Pratt, the four remaining girls were sparked and played their hearts out.






The Lady Toppers had an exceptional season, ending with a record of 7-11. This was the best record since the 1982-83 season when they were 9-11.

Junior Varsity Struggles


The junior varsity boys basketball team, coached by Gary Armbrecht, had a hard season at 4-14. But they gave it their all every game.















Principal, Athletic Director Leave Shawe

Editor's Note: Information for this article was gathered when Mr. Politz was interviewed by the journalism class during May. The story combines material written by Arlene Dirksen, Don Prost, and Janet Moore.

Arthur Politz, principal of Shawe Memorial and Pope John XXIII Schools, left after the 1987-88 school year to further his studies and earn a doctoral degree in education. Ball State University is where he plans to pursue his studies.

Mr. Politz sees himself as a somewhat quiet, shy and

determined man. He served in the Vietnam War and has been the principal of several Catholic schools.

A native of Delphi, he graduated from high school in 1964. He joined the Marines and served four years. In 1965 he was shipped to Vietnam, where he was among the first to land. He was told the conflict would last only six weeks, while it lasted ten years after he left. The military was alright in some regards,



but Mr. Politz did mention the disadvantages of the service. He didn't like being told what to do, the lack of privacy, and he said he has "no desire to return to the service".

After the military, Mr. Politz went to college, where he met his wife Joan at a computer card dance. Mrs. Politz has a bachelor of arts degree from Valparaiso University, a master's degree from Purdue, was a National Merit Scholar and salutatorian of her high school. Mr. Politz has a bachelor's degree from Valparaiso, a master's degree from Indiana University-Fort Wayne, and will earn an Ed. D. from Ball State.

Mr. Politz has worked in a few different positions: teacher, accountant's aide, and principal. The schools he has worked in include St. Joseph's, St. Patrick's, St. Paul's and Shawe/Pope John. Mr. Politz feels, "Catholic principals have enormous power." At the same time he says that of all the people connected with a school, the principal is the most dependent on others.

As the first person to serve concurrently as principal of Shawe and Pope John Schools, Mr. Politz was proud of additions to the school system during his tenure; the pre-school, the day care center, a tennis and swimming team and the band. He tried to allow the two schools to function as one unit. He said that he leaves with a sense of satisfaction and also of frustration that he could not guarantee the future of Shawe.

When asked how this school was different from others he worked at, he said that Shawe's school spirit was like no other that he has seen. He was also amazed at the academic records. He was happy that he spent less time on discipline.

A saying from Pope John XXIII guides him in his ways: "He may let me do little, but of the little He lets me do, I intend to do it all."

Athletic Director Glenn Petty also resigned at the end of the school year. He has been athletic director, head basketball coach, and physical education instructor for three years.

A native of the Indianapolis area, Coach Petty was a graduate of Butler University, where he played basketball under Coach Tony Hinkle. He holds a counseling degree from St. Francis College in Fort Wayne and has completed some work towards a doctoral degree at Ball State University.

As a basketball coach, his career is 134 wins to 93 losses. During his first season at Shawe the Hilltoppers compiled a 10-11 record. His most successful season at Shawe was the 1986-87 season, with 15 wins and 8 losses. This season the varsity squad was 4-16, giving

Coach Petty an overall record of 29-35 at Shawe.

Coach Petty's resignation letter said, in part, "At this time I would like to tender my resignation as athletic director, teacher and basketball coach. This action has been perpetuated by a difference in philosophy by myself and the school community. In my tenure here I have done everything I could possibly do to try to make Shawe Memorial



High School a better place for this community to explore alternative educational philosophies."

His resignation coincided with the graduation of his son, Byron Petty, who has been a varsity basketball player.


