














Students learn fundamentals of the business world



















Volleyball set for future kills








The Shawe girls' swim team was inexperienced, but they did well considering that 50% of the team was beginners.






Experience is gained at the j.v. level










Shawe golf scores both birdies and bogeys

This book was created by the dedication of a small group of people who pursued perfection through endless hours of hard work. Their sacrifices of time and energy to complete this year-book are to be commended. Working without prior journalistic experience, the staff embraced the challenge and overcame numerous obstacles to record the history and heritage of Shawe Memorial High School.
