






SHOWING SCHOOL








Lovening in the Stars




Laving fun



















Riehle always took the time to make sure we all understood everything. Plus it was fun, because we played a lot of games."






The newcomers to social studies had the oppurtunity to expand their knowledge of history by participating in History Day. The seventh and eighth graders along with the juniors all took part in this contest.





Seniors got the option to eat out every other Friday.


"Senior eat-out days were nice because we got to get out of class early and eat food we enjoyed," said senior Sarah Terlinden.

No matter what the students are, or where, the impression was that lunch time was the time to feed their souls as well as their stomachs.








Accounting was offered this year to the sophomore class. Erin Jacobson said, "I really like accounting, It comes easy to me and is interesting to learn about."

Students that took business courses learned how jobs are in the real world. Business courses helped students out on their college applications.







That is the reaction from many of the students, this year seemed to be lacking in the amount of trips taken, as compared to previous years.







Lunchtime found either French Club students selling candy or Spanish Club hosting a Pizza Day. These funds went directed towards their respective trips to France and Mexico.


"I liked the shirts for Irish Chicks, but they didn't get used very much because we didn't get organized on time," said Kelli Hoffman.



Freshmen representative Greg Holm stated about the Lenten Fast Food Friday, "...it allowed us to eat good food and follow the rules."






"I like band because I like to play percussion and beat on things," said John Stack.



DISCOVERING SPANISH IN GLOWING WAYS








"Being the Vice President was fun because I got to help organize everything and hear all of the members' ideas," said Nicholas Schafer.

"It was awesome when we finally got the pyramid to work. Even though the girls didn't win, sectionals were really fun," said Matt Goley.






























