



Students who didn't follow the dress code were sent home and had to change in order to be allowed back in the classroom. -Lesley Steinhardt





Music is what brings people out on the floor as well as the D.J., Dan Dattilo, who served as the disc jockey.


"The D.J. played good music. He kept everyone dancing all night," said Julie Zubaty.
















## Motivation Leads to Success



Anita Woodruff taught all high school science classes, while Elizabeth Applegate taught junior high science and one section of biology.


"Biology was a lot easier this year than it was last year," said Alyssa Brown.









When Rupa Yeager was asked what she had learned in religion, she said, "I have learned so many interesting facts that I can't think of just one."




Fry's class learned about the book of Genesis by creating their own books. They made cartoon drawings and the book covered creation to Joseph and his many colored coat.




The half hour lunch provided the students not only time to fill their stomachs but also time to talk with their pals and even more importantly time to take a break from classes.

French class had a field trip to Louisville, Kentucky to see a play. They watched "The Three Musketeers". Afterwards they dined at a French restaurant.





Erin Jacobson said, "My favorite activity was trying to paint 3D figures. It was a lot of fun and it kept my interest."



































World-wide, civilians and military personnel fell victim to terrorist bombs and acts of hatred. On the home front, "bioterrorism" became a common term after it was revealed that Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein was producing biological weapons. Hussein's defiance of United Nation's imposed sanctions prompted the United States to

seek world support of military action against Iraq. Members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization wrestled over conflicting opinions on the issue, while North Korean leader Kim Jong II threatened to deploy nuclear weapons if Iraq was attacked. As tensions rose among political leaders, the world watched and waited to see what the next chapter in "The War on Terrorism" would bring.

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








#### COLOPHON
