

The positive changes we had this year were we had a great principal and the staff seemed really interested in what the students wanted to do in class and everyone seemed a bit more social and able to get along.



for students to learn and venture away from the campus for various activities.




Mr. Chad Duvall invited a prisoner from the Madison State Hospital to share his regrets with class members.


Students went all out with making shirts for sectionals and the Madison game. Students also decorated the school to show spirit and let players know that they are backed all the way.








Jimmy Leveille





























Patti Leiske said, "I wish I was able to do school to work but with my tight schedule I was unable to."







Only a handful of students showed interest in cross-country. Due to lack of involvement, **Kenny Leveille** was the only high school runner.




Ad sales goal for this year was higher than ever.


Alyssa Brown shared her experience, "The ads were easy. The most challenging thing for me this year in journalism was dealing with Mrs. Williams. She's one of my


