



school and later in life because you can talk to them about anything, anywhere and at anytime," said Michael Elburg.


Maise Lauster had this to say about her friends, "My friends are very important to me because they are amazing and they support me in everything I do. I would be lost without them here."

football tournaments and dressing down.



Angela Goley.


"Service hours made me realize that helping others is a great way to get to know people and it made me think of all the less fortunate people that I could take the

that to people, and some of the teachers don't like it," said **Brittany Armstrong**.





"I had so much fun at the Christmas Dance because everyone who I was with had such a good time.


Johnny Fisher and I partied the night away and my date, Brittany Armstrong, made the night really amazing," said sophomore Harlan Kelly.





























































































Although many school sports attracted athletes, students still found other ways to show off their athletic ability. "I really enjoyed participating in the flyers this year because I love to dance




