"I think that service hours help students become more active in the community and also helps us help other people that are not in the Shawe family," said **Angela Goley**.

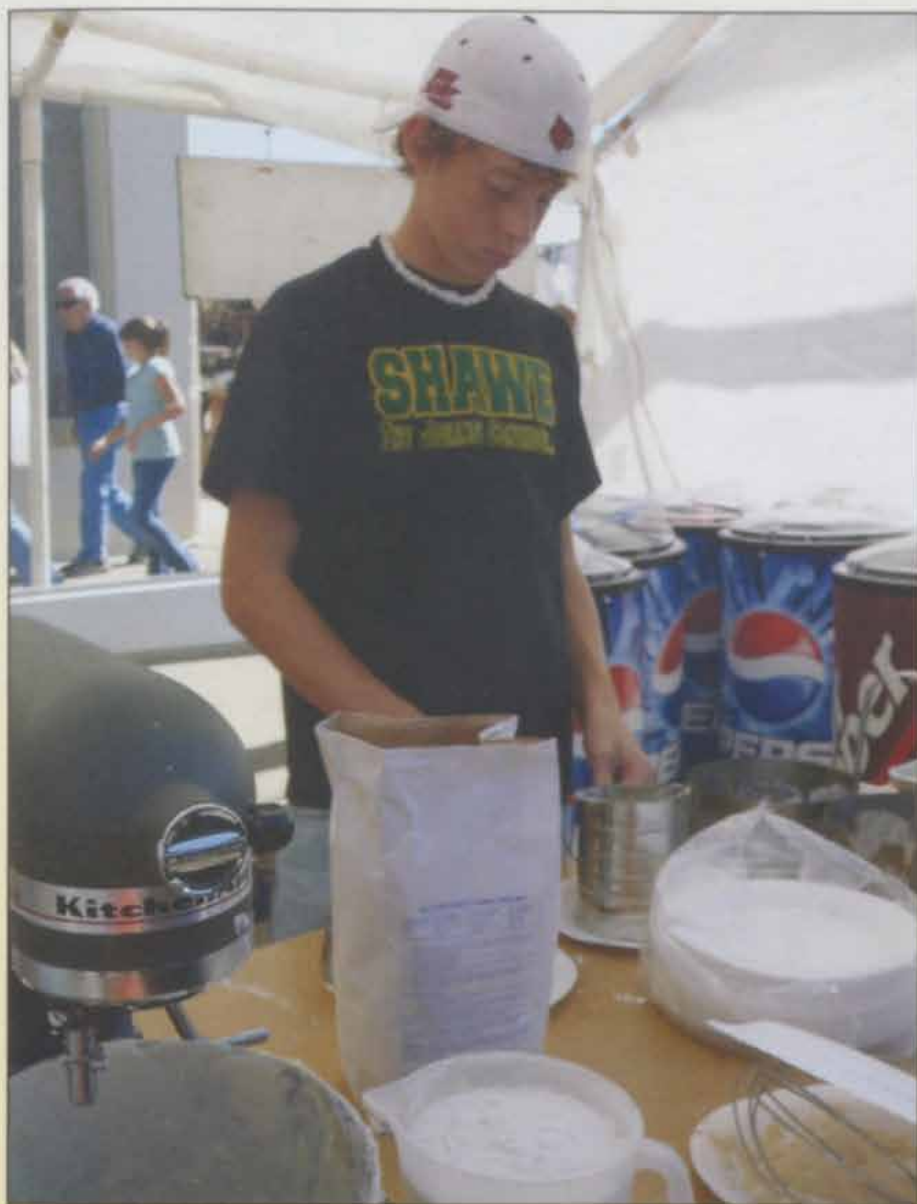

**Johnny Fisher** and I partied the night away and my date, **Brittany Armstrong**, made the night really amazing," said sophomore **Harlan Kelly**.

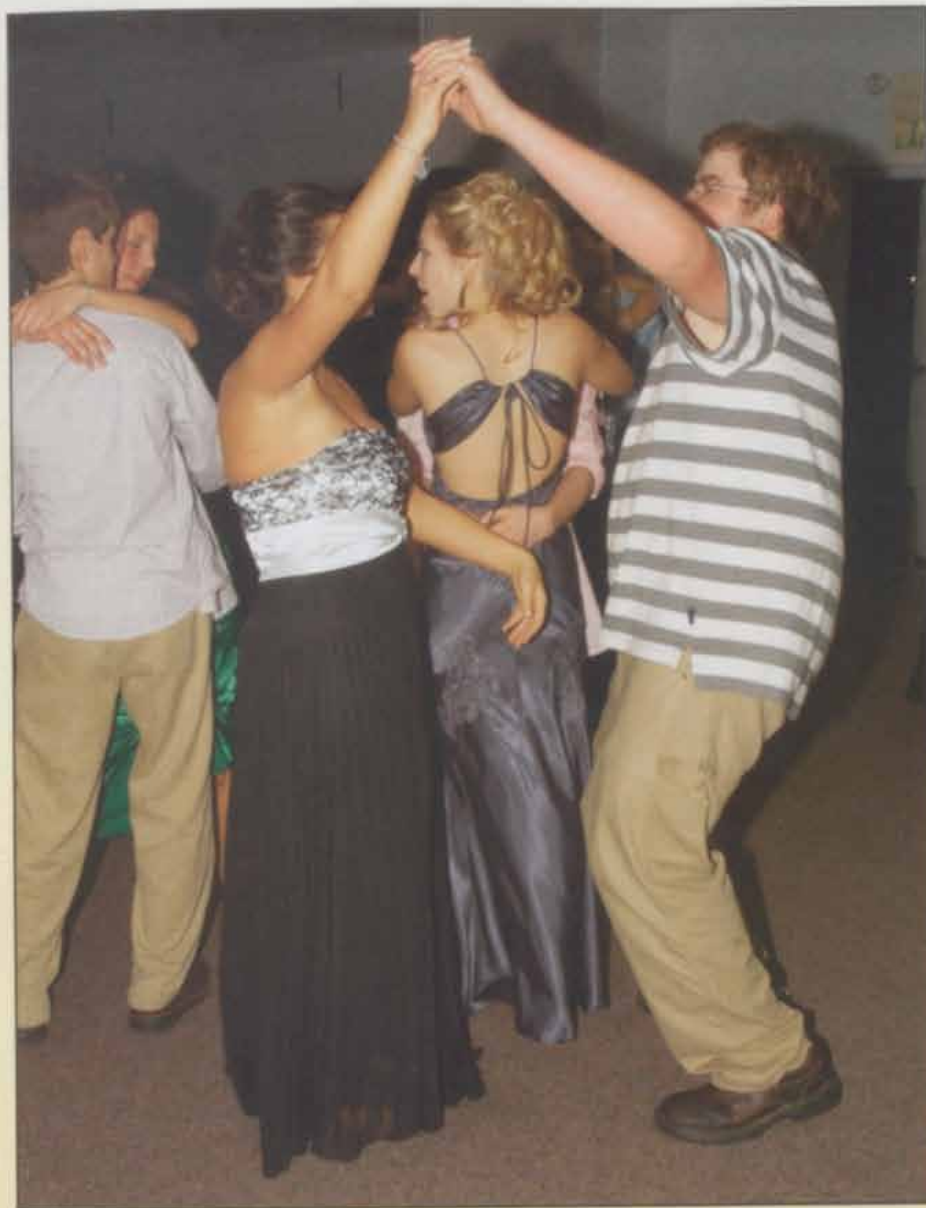

Loyalty and school spirit appeared evident, despite the small size of the student body. No matter what, students strongly displayed their support and encouragement for the school. -*Katherine Bear*

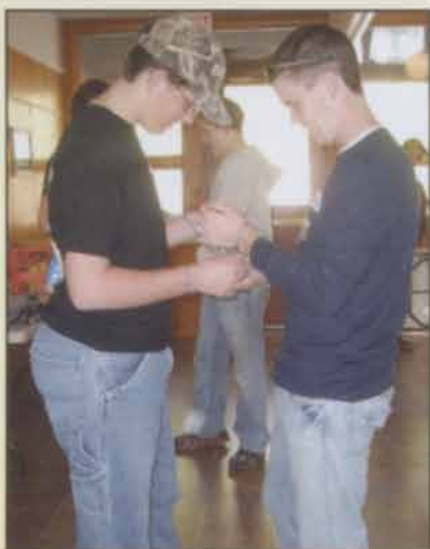

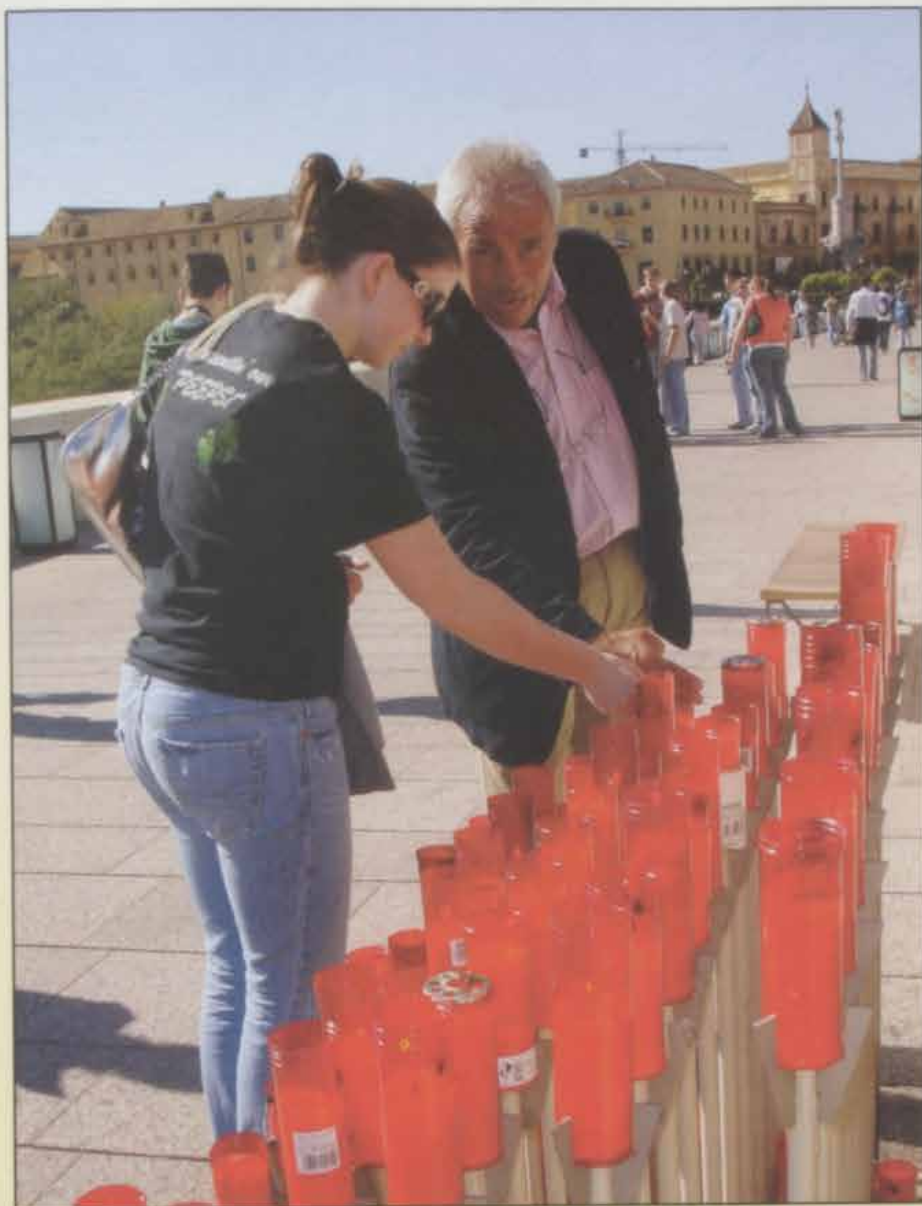

had a good time! The people I hung around with wanted to have a good time, so we decided to make the best out of what we were given. I ended up having a ton of fun by the end of the night."

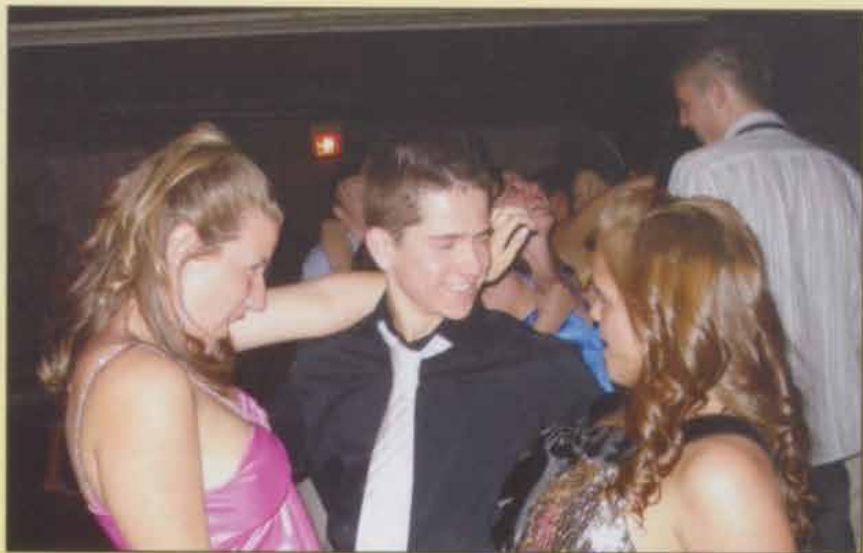
Between dancing, talking and refreshments, there was plenty of things to do.

"I had fun at Spring Fling. My date, **Nicole Zapp**, was a lot of fun, even though I kept bugging her," **Darren Lainhart** said.

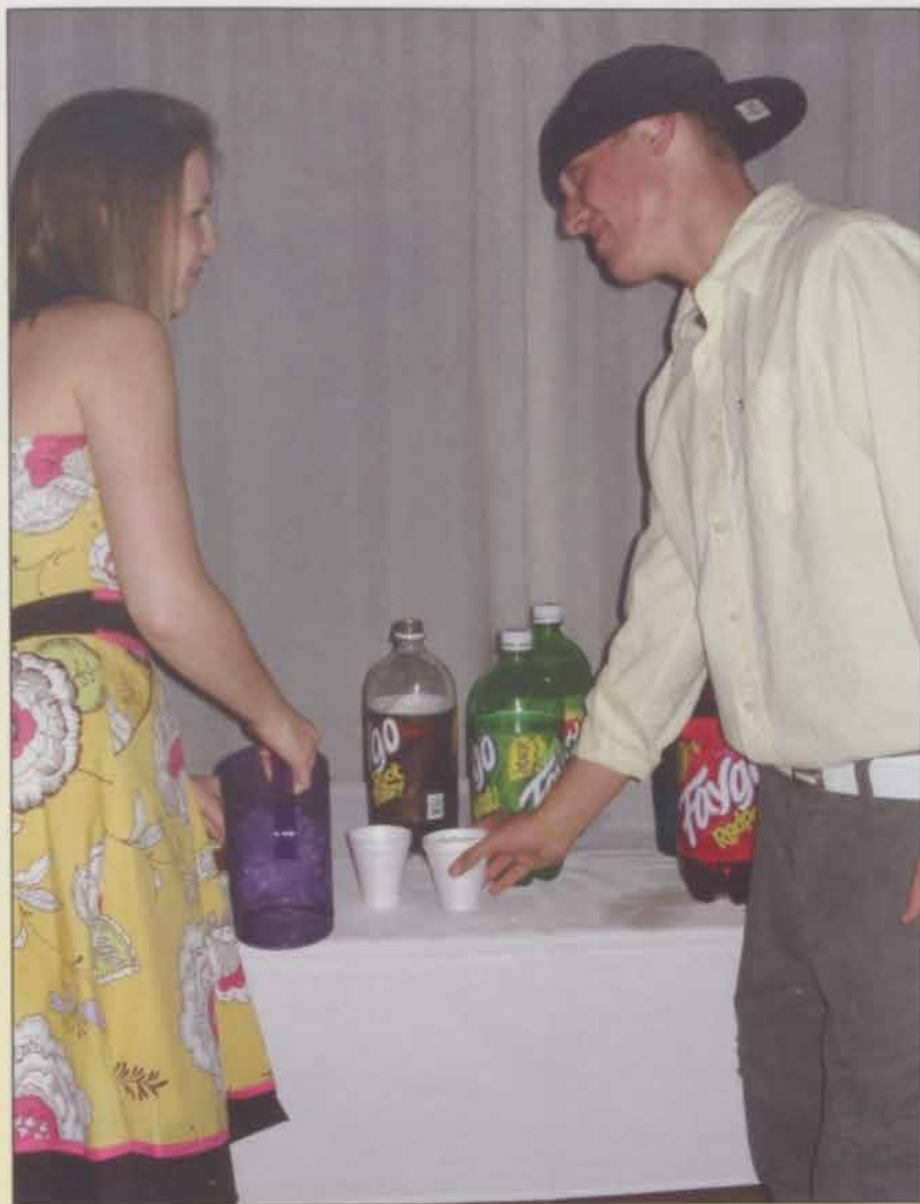

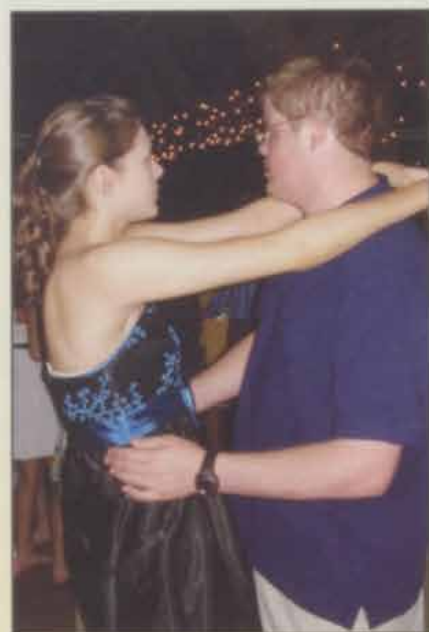

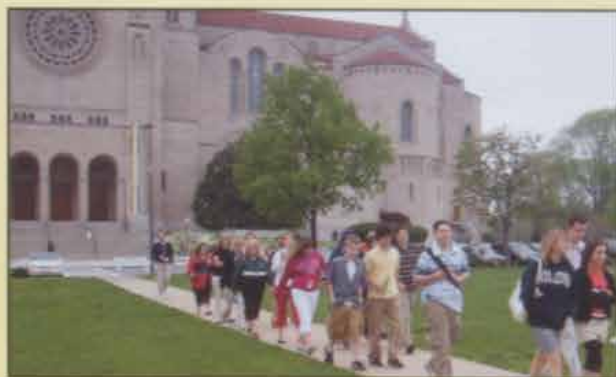

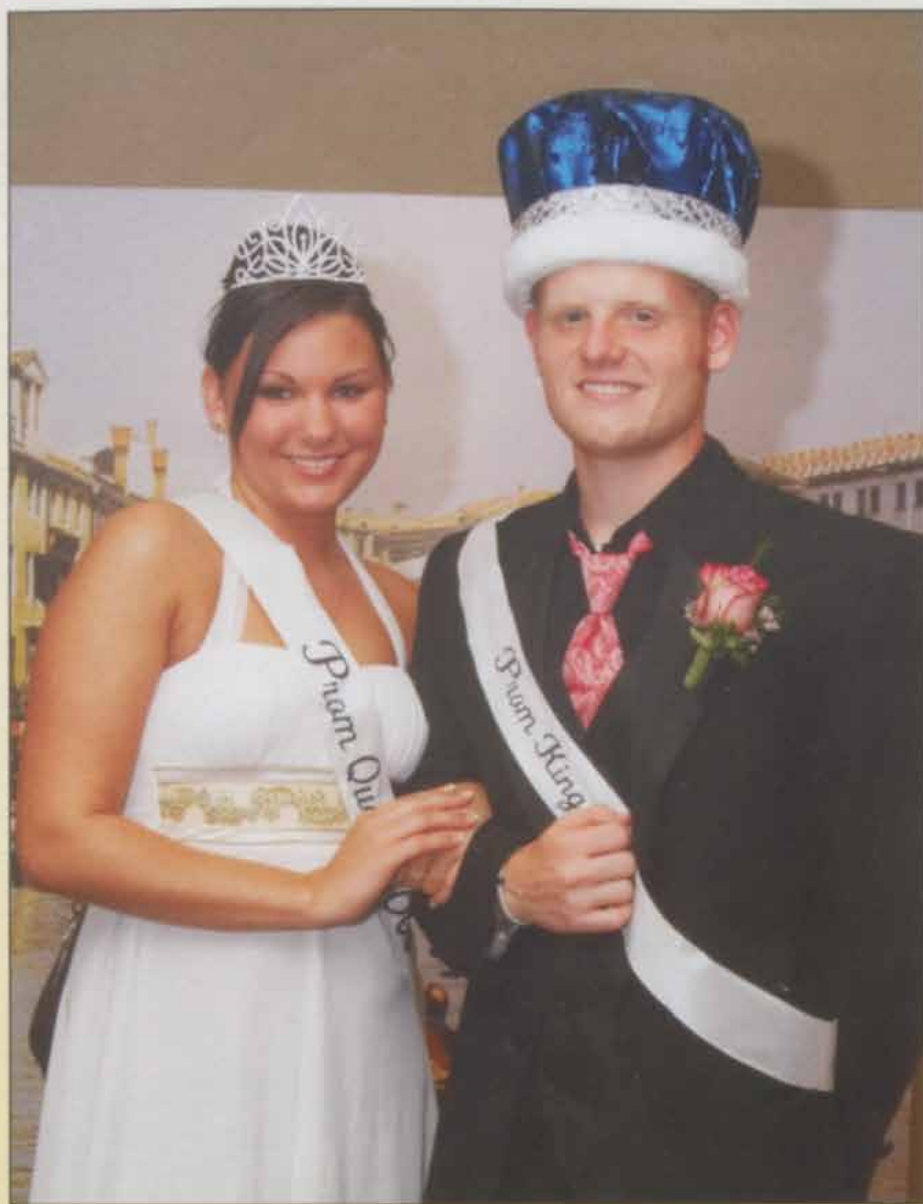

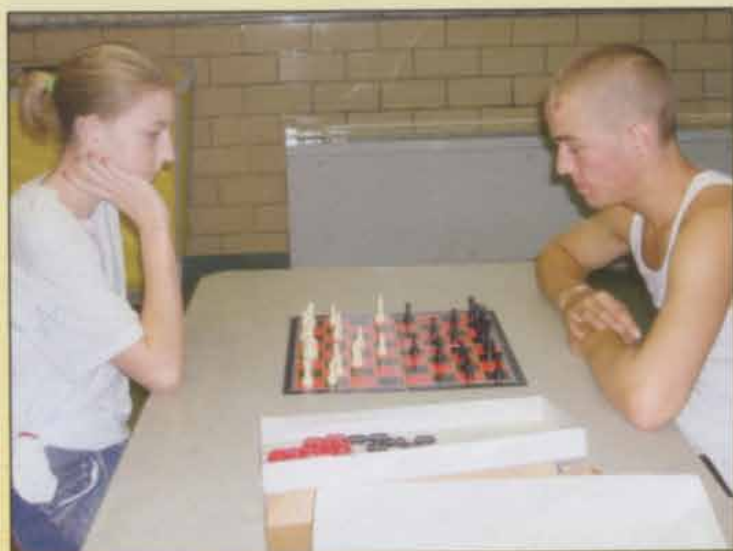

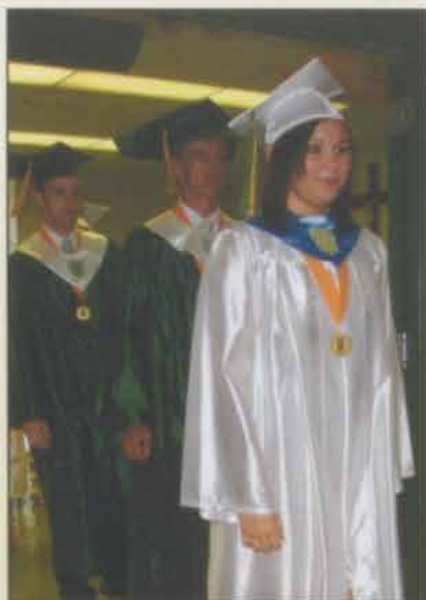

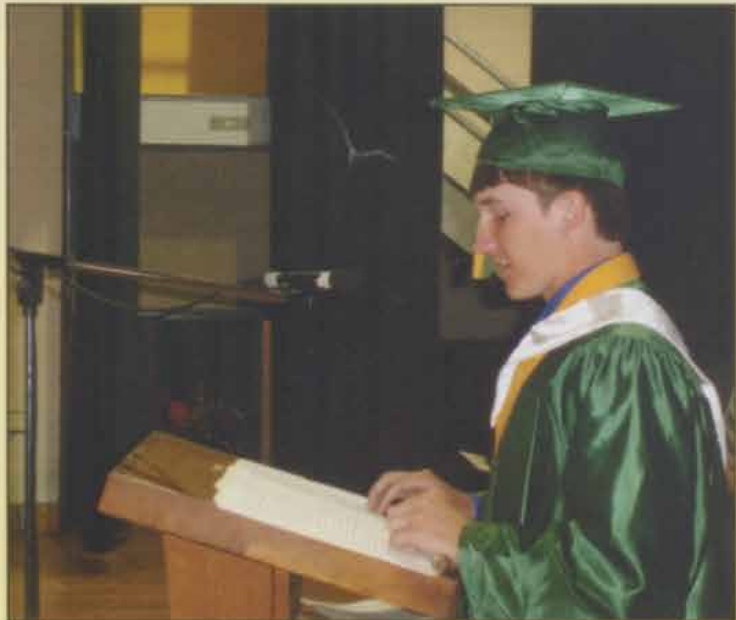

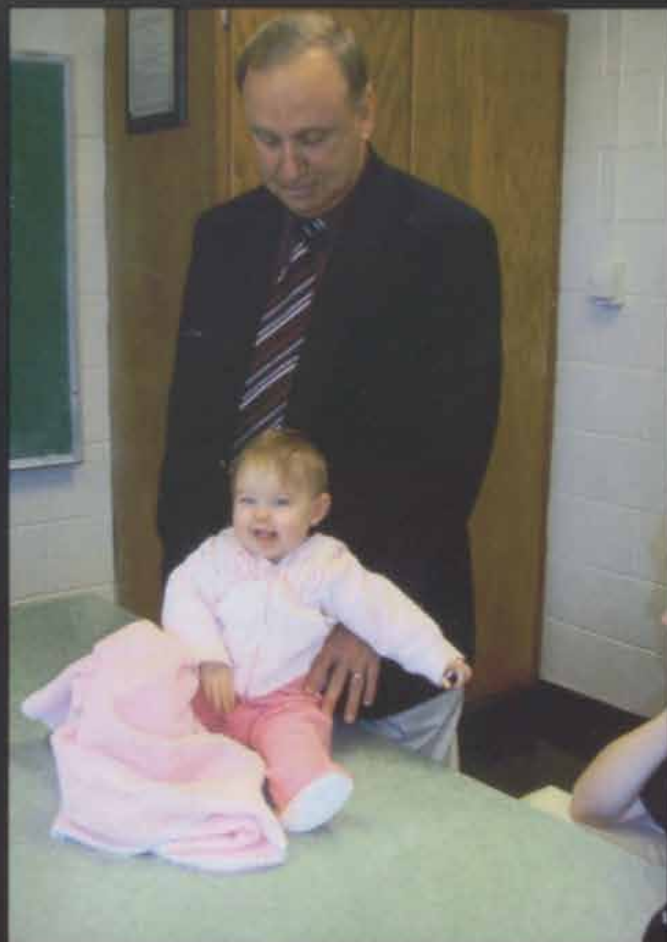

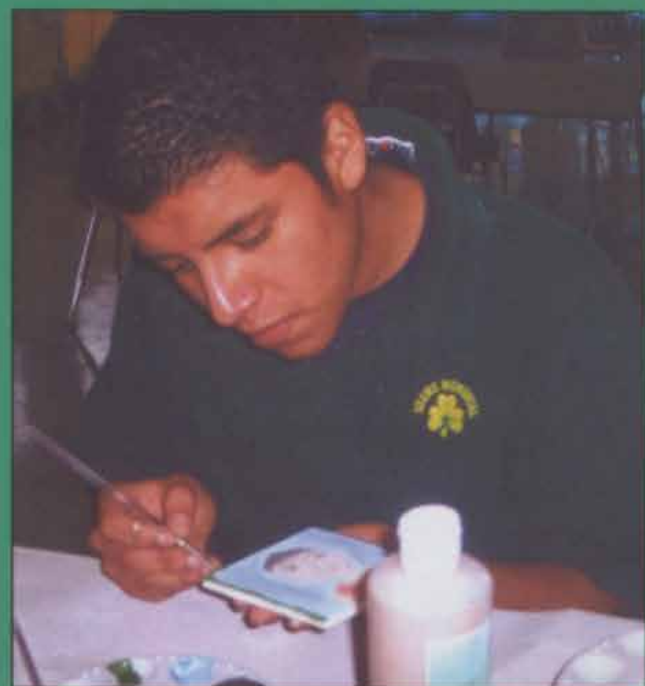

## Seniors Prepare for a Future Full of Magic and Personal Fulfillment

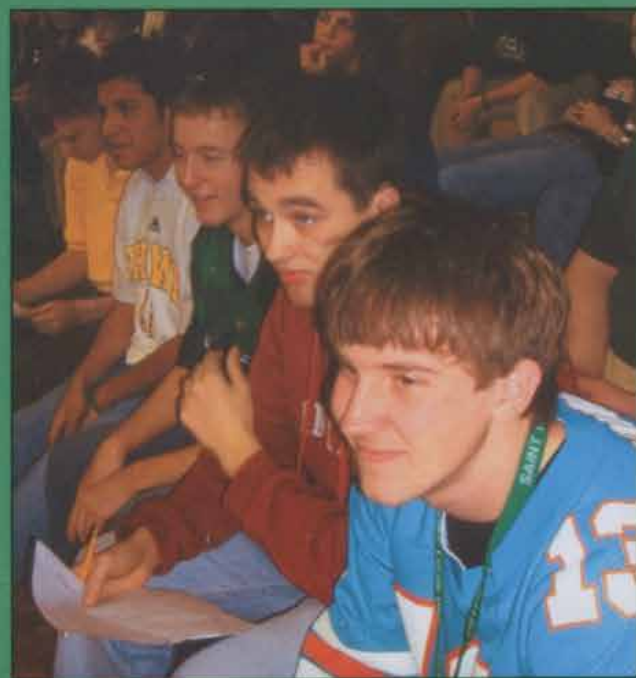
Seniors worked most of the year to raise money for graduation. Class members sponsored the annual Christmas Dance, and pioneered the first ever Black Out Nights.

"Truthfully, I don't see much difference from this year and my past years other than the amount of work," said **Will Mruzek**.

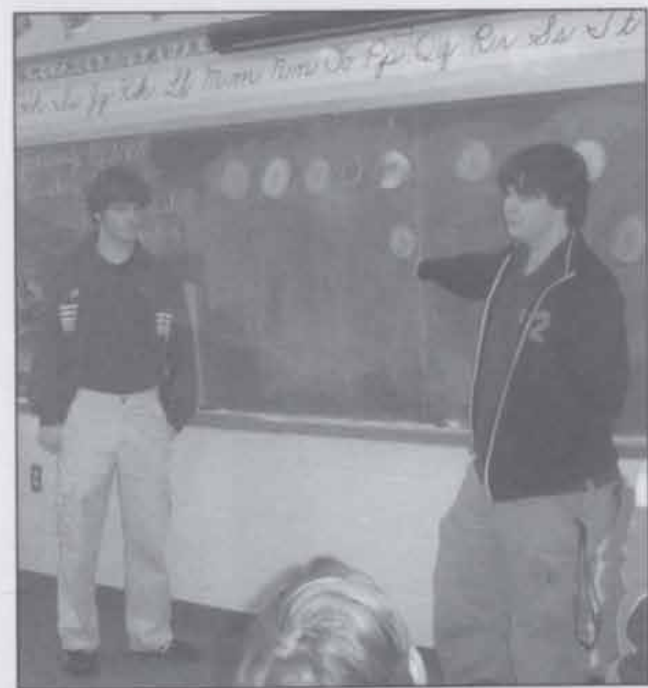

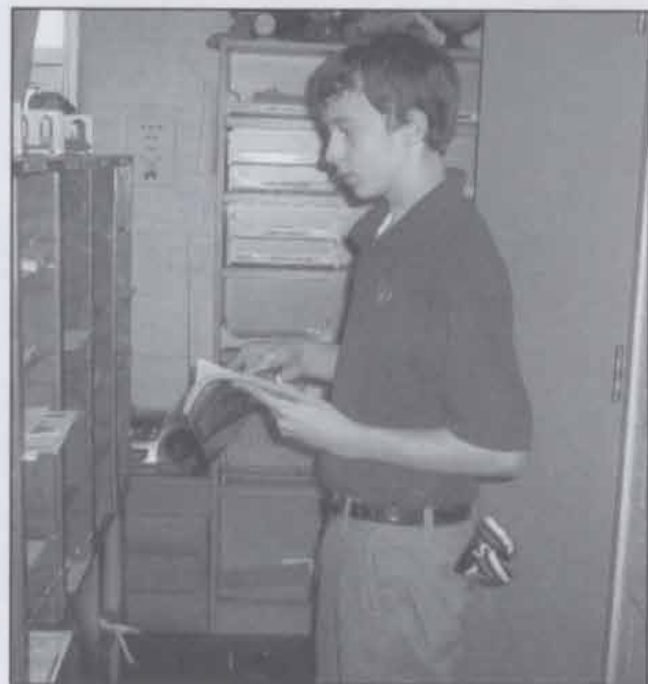

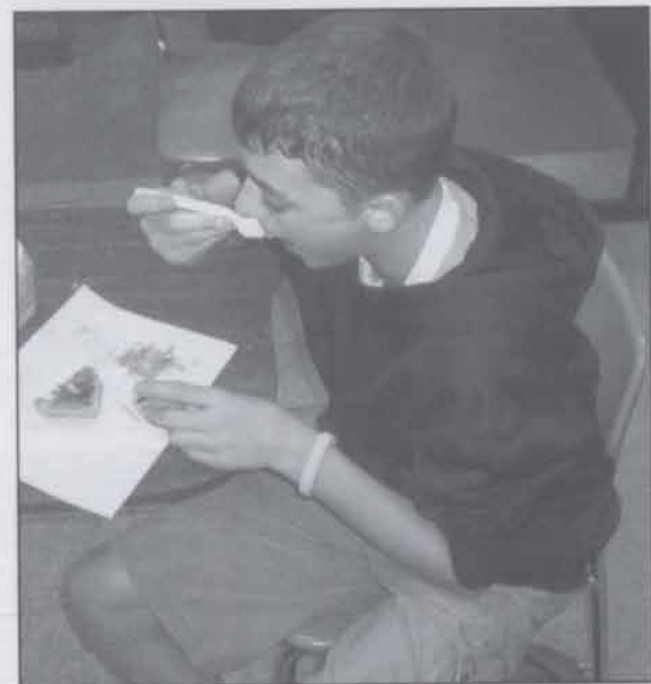
"Eighth grade is different from seventh grade because there are new teachers, new stuff to work on, and new books too, but it is not so different," said **Tyler Canada**.

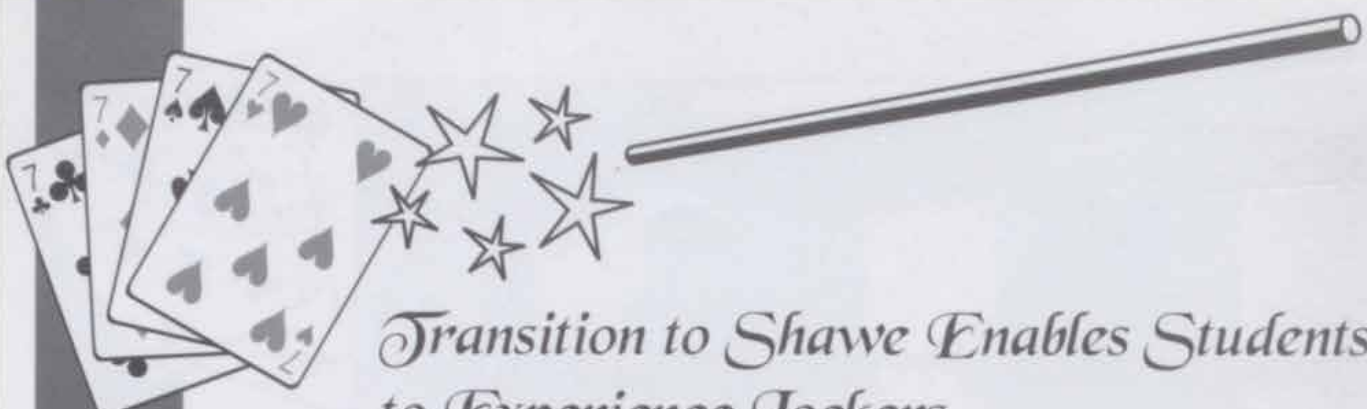

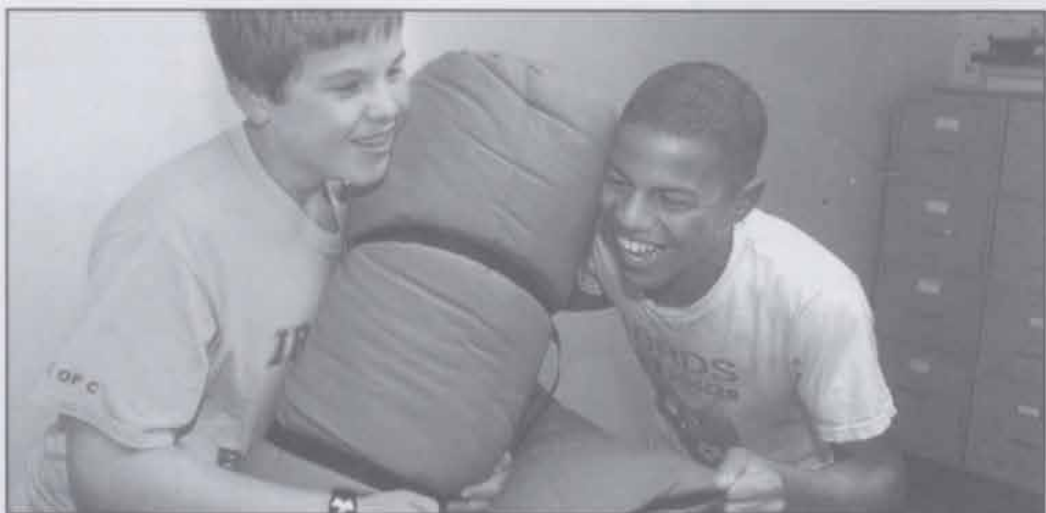

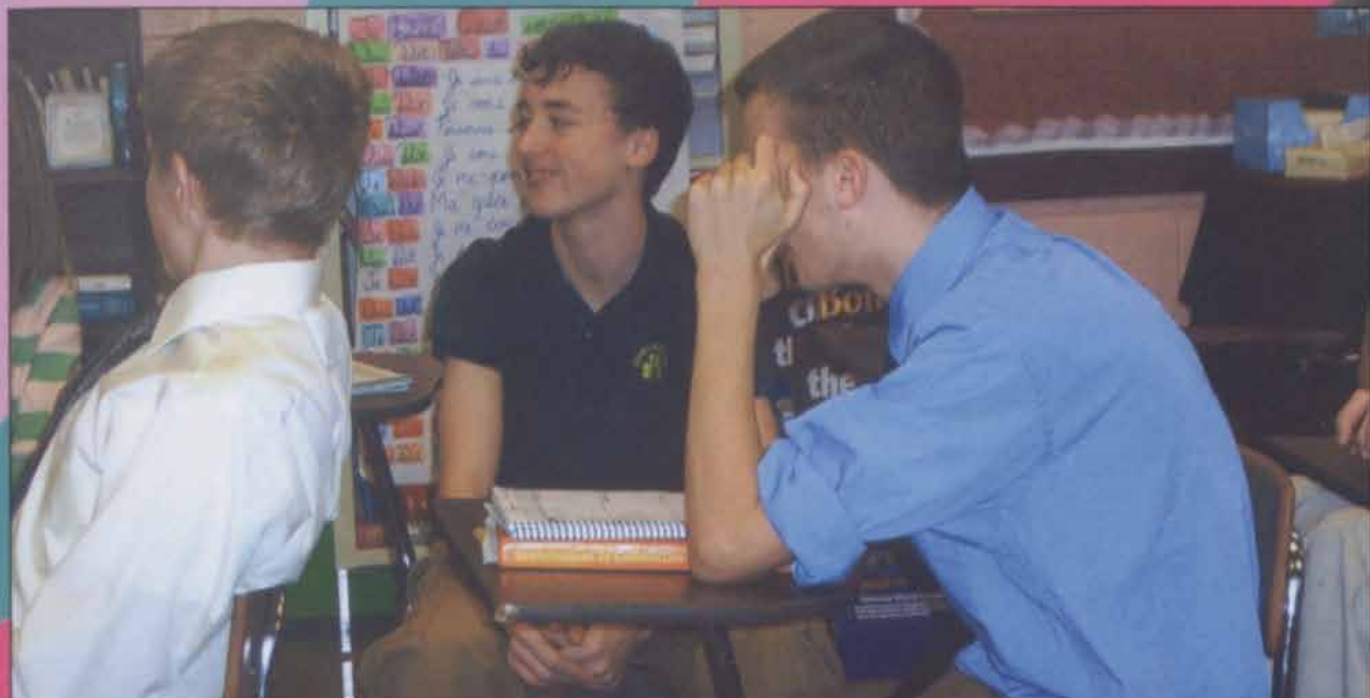

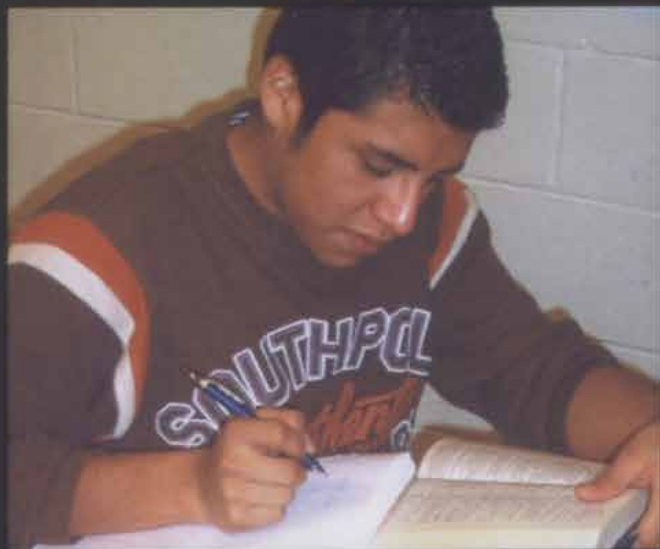

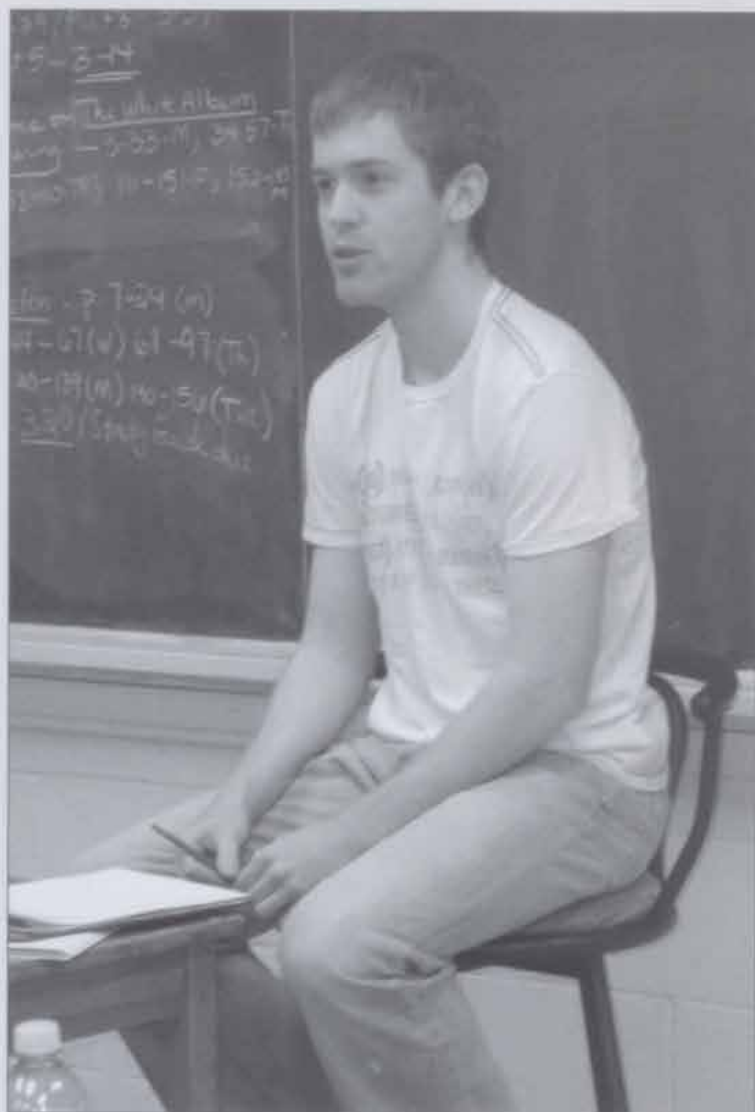

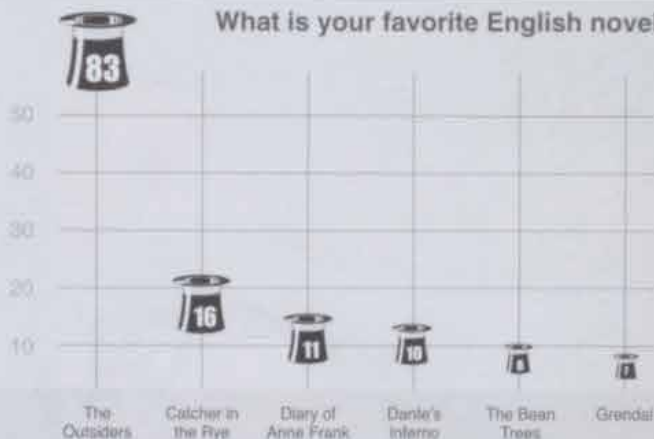

controversial issues in the books.

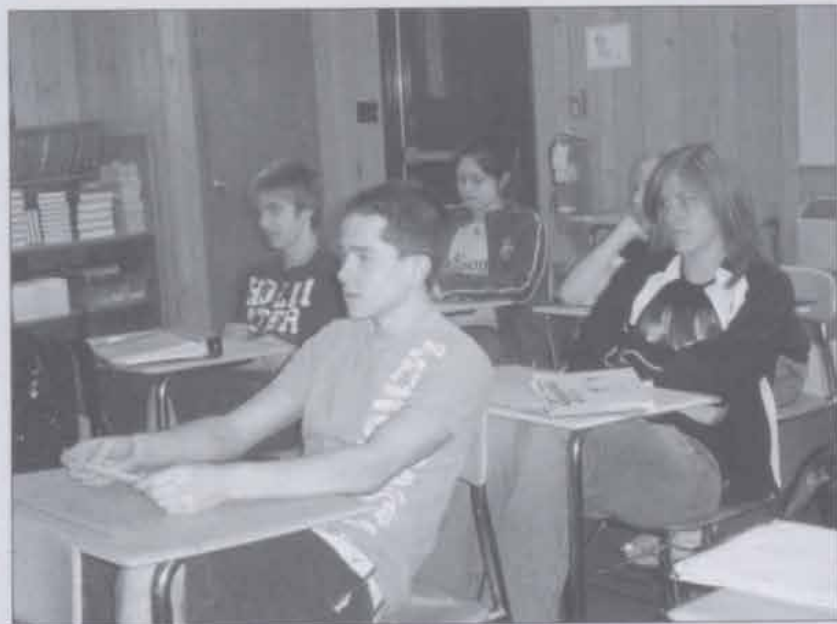
**Nick Hall** said, "In English I enjoy refuting the feminist views in the books that **Mrs. Martin** chooses for us to read."

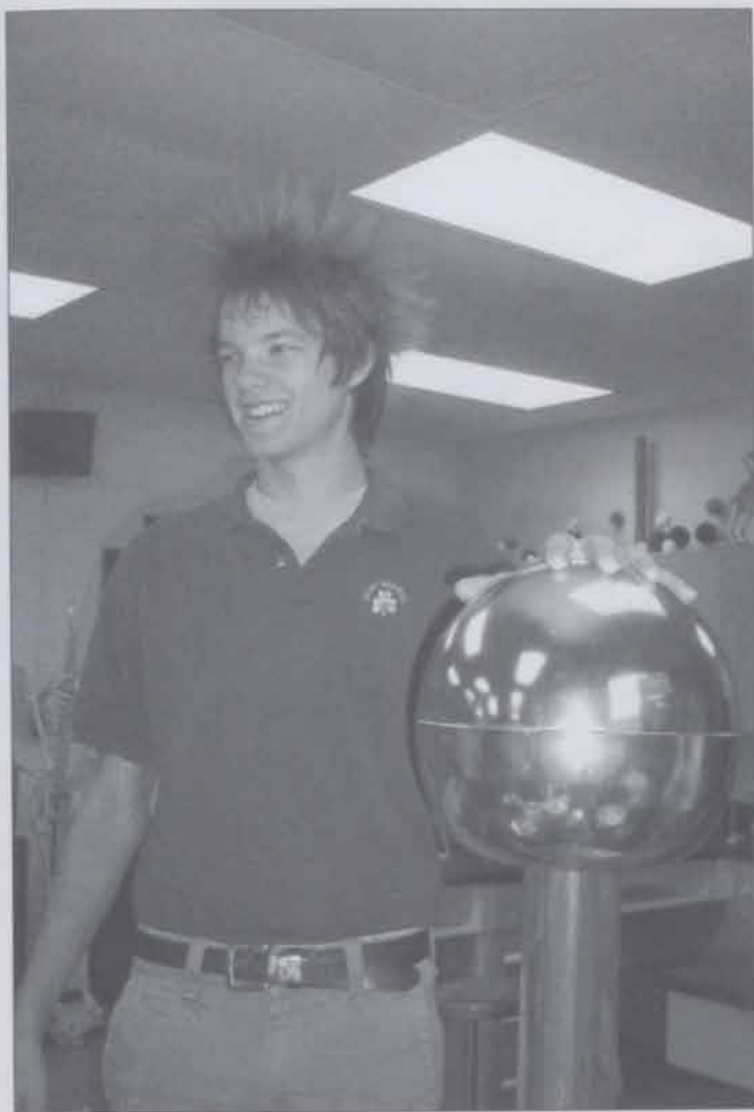

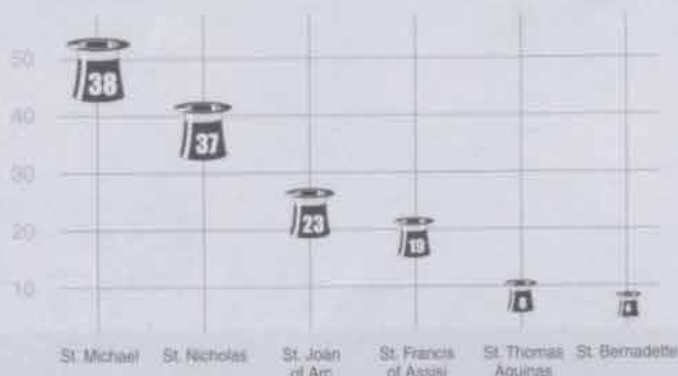

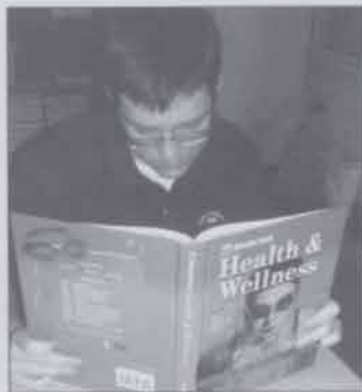


# Changes Occur

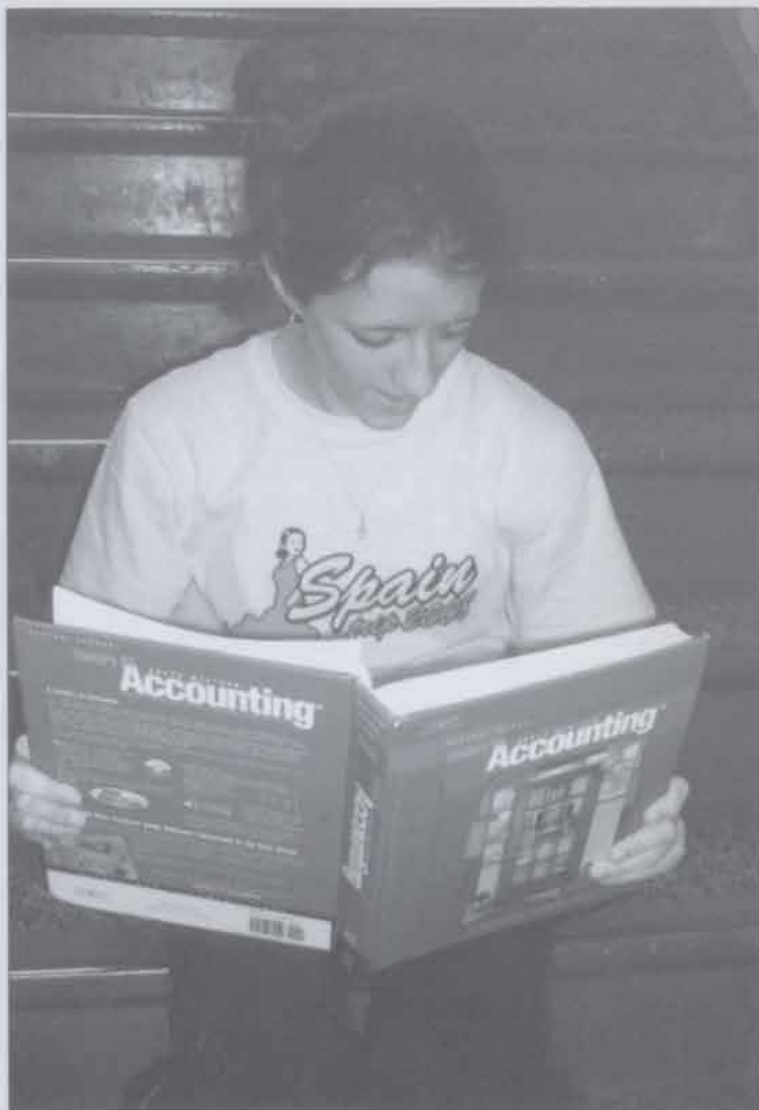

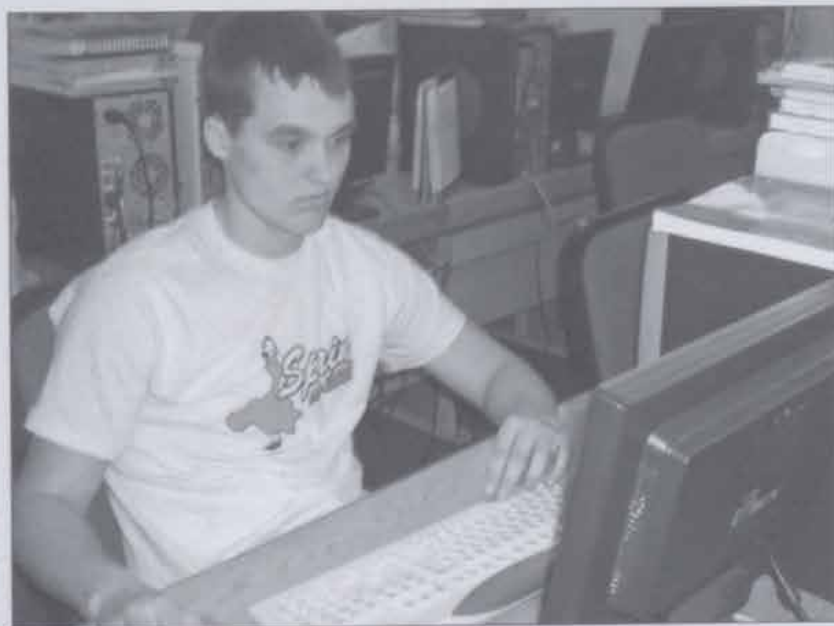
classes she replied, "I enjoy my classes because I am able to cover several topics. My subjects,

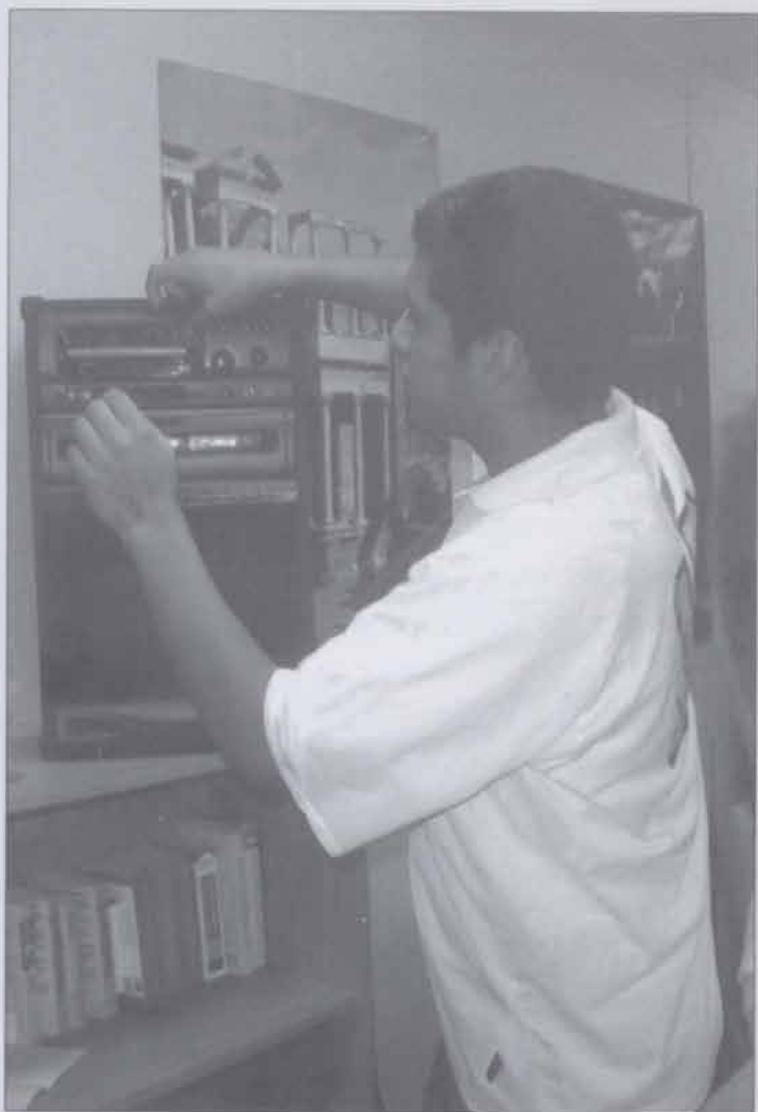

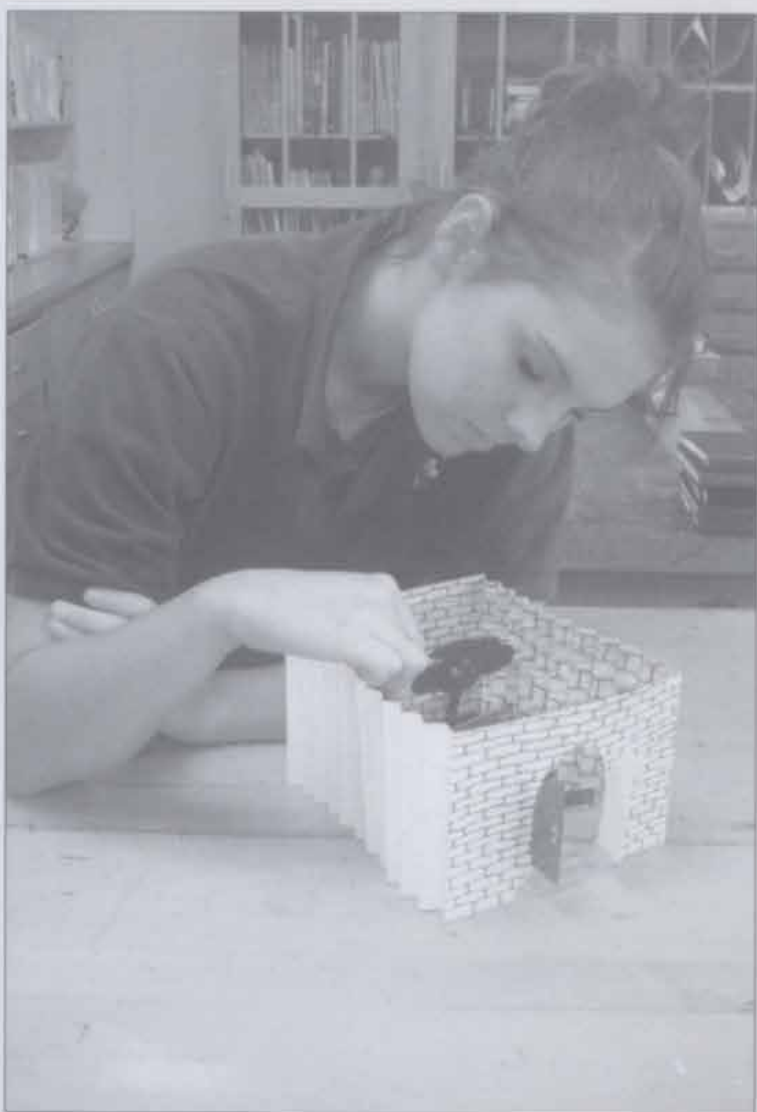

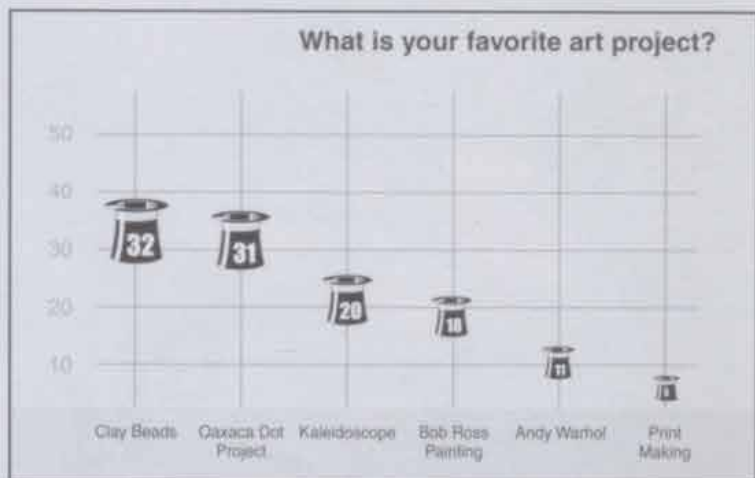

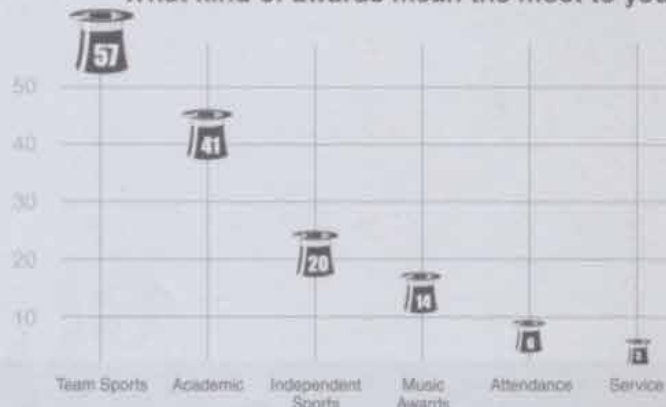

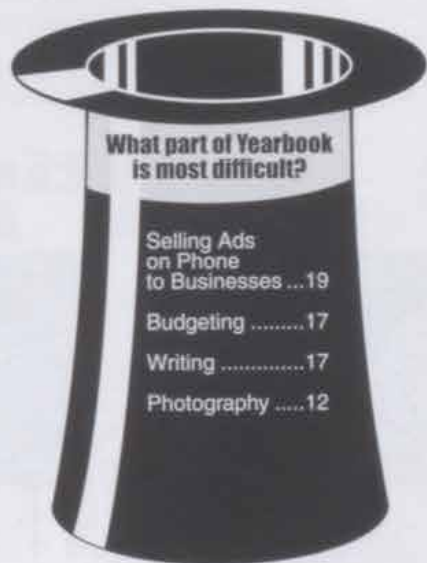

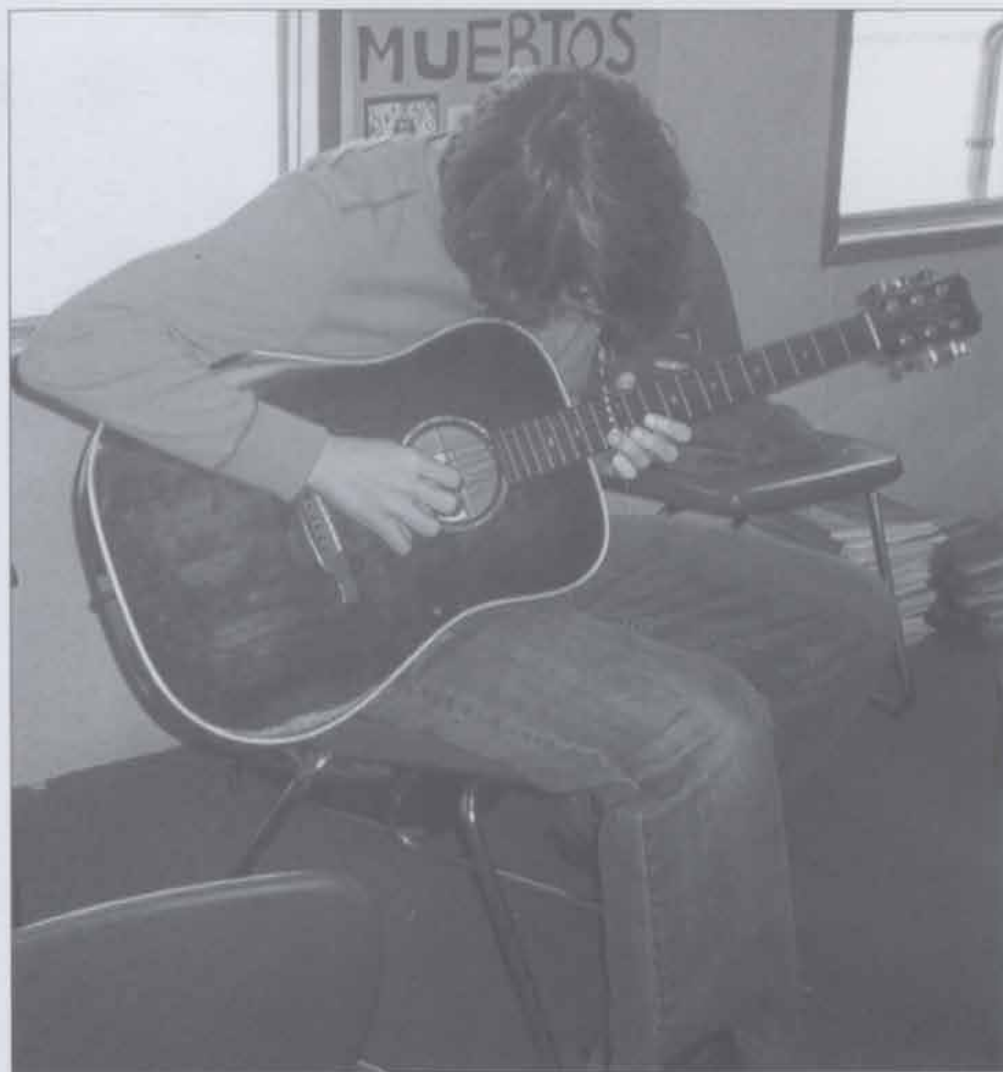

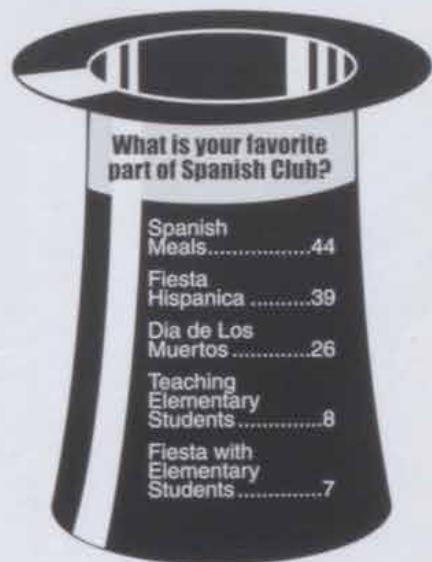

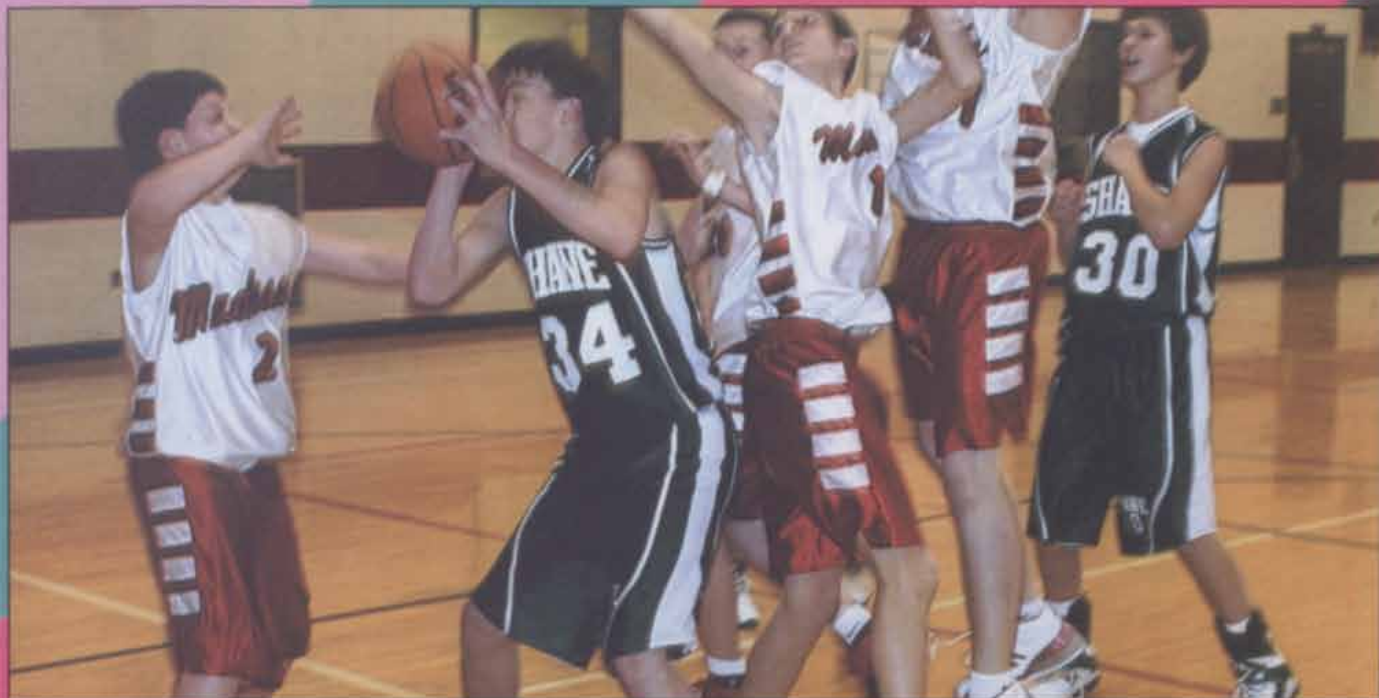

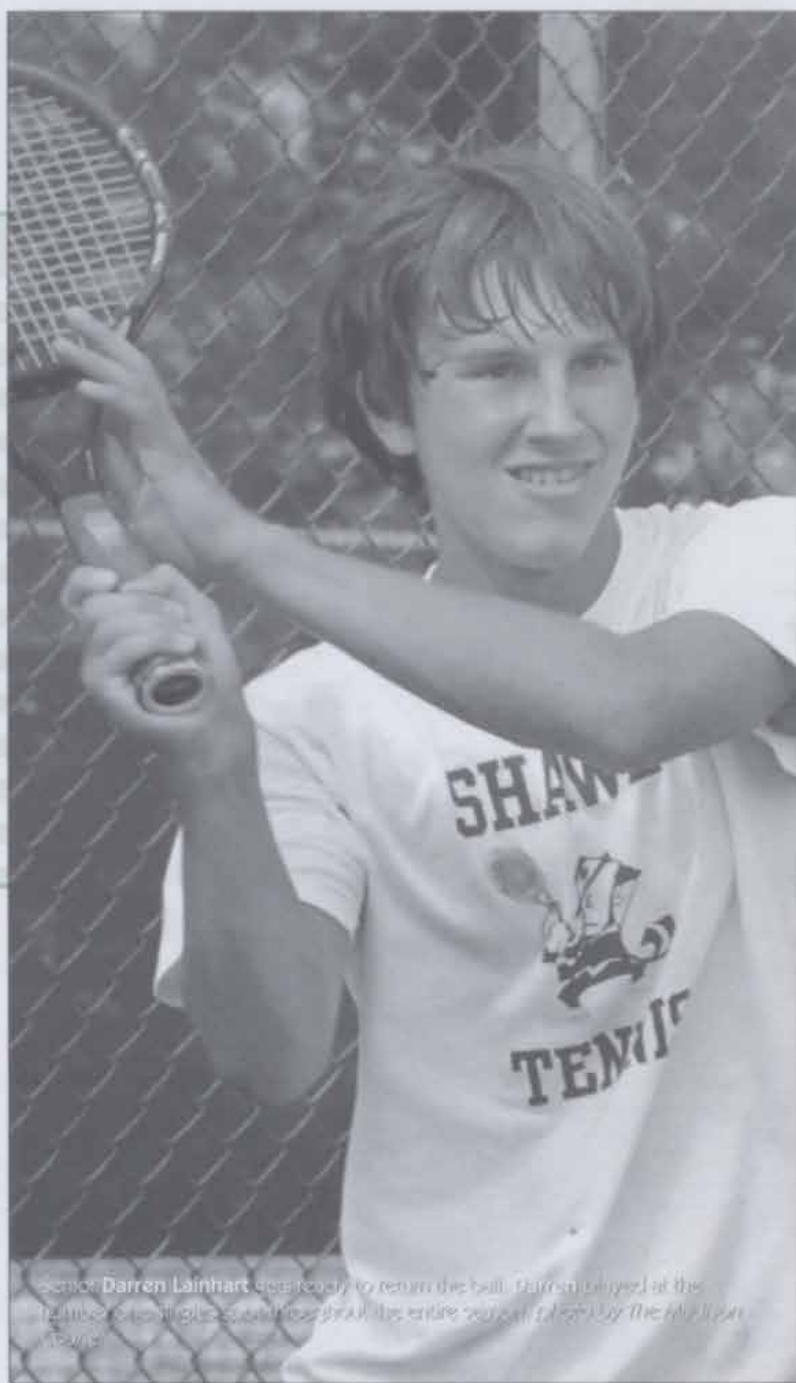

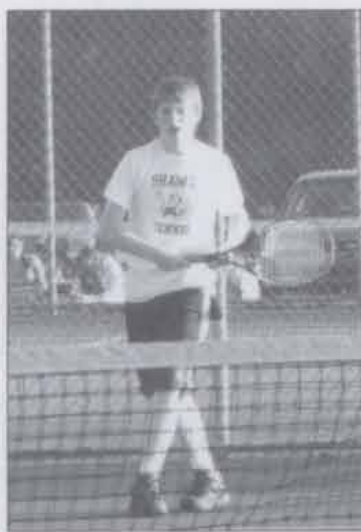

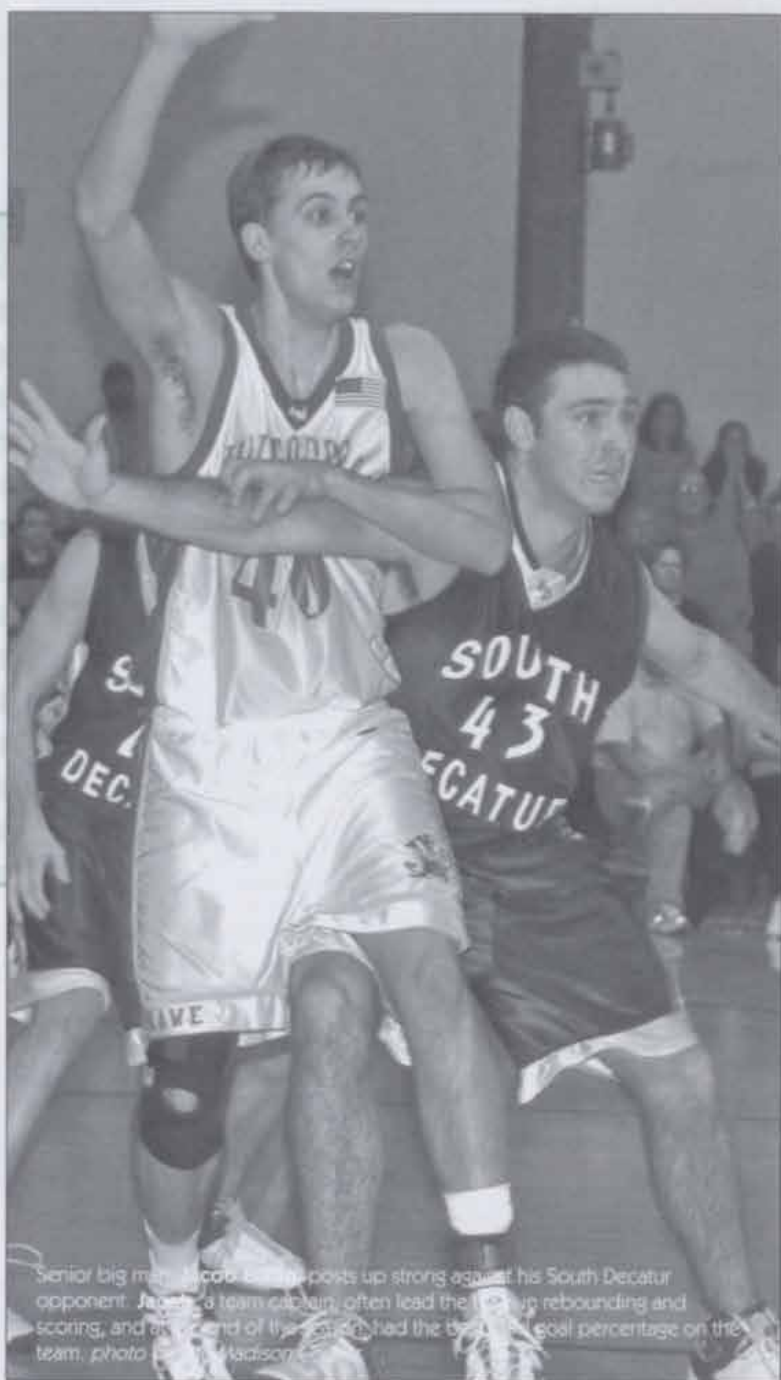

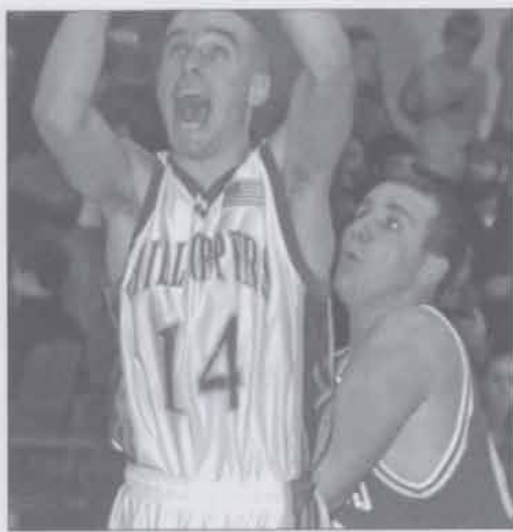

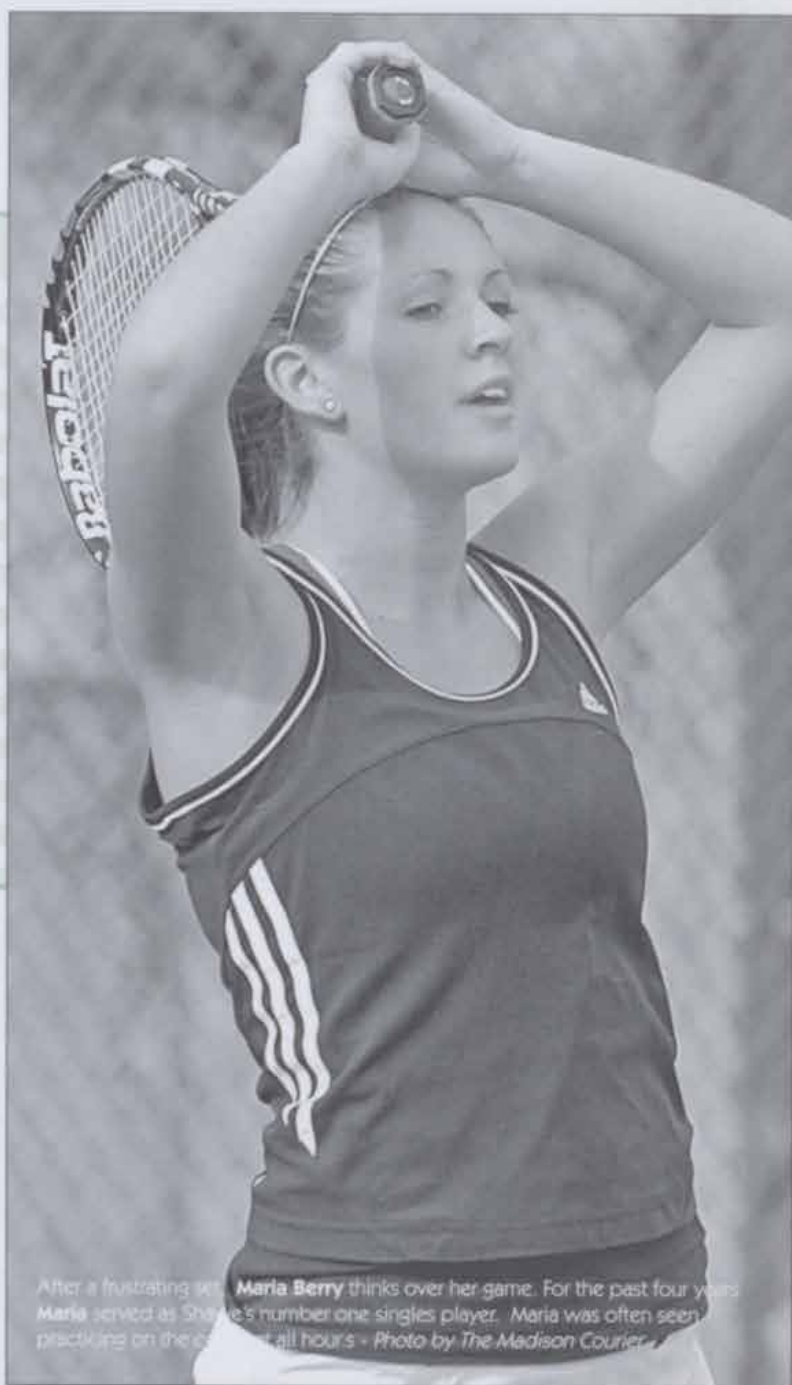

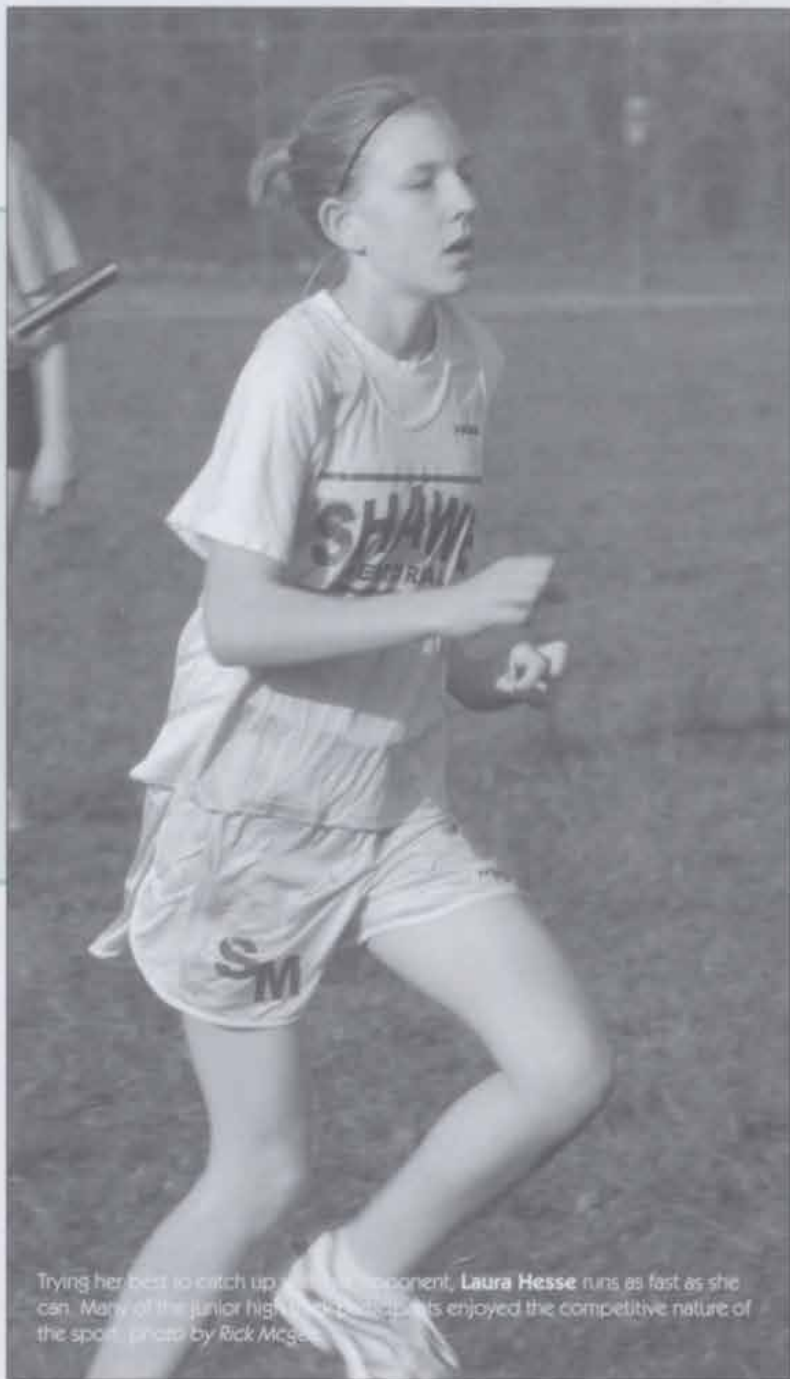

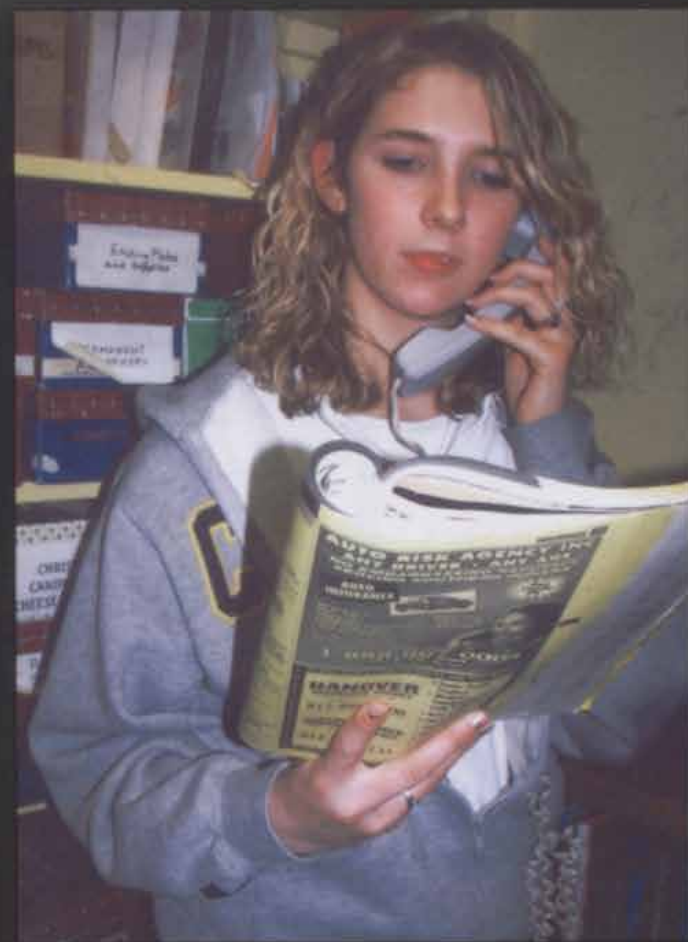

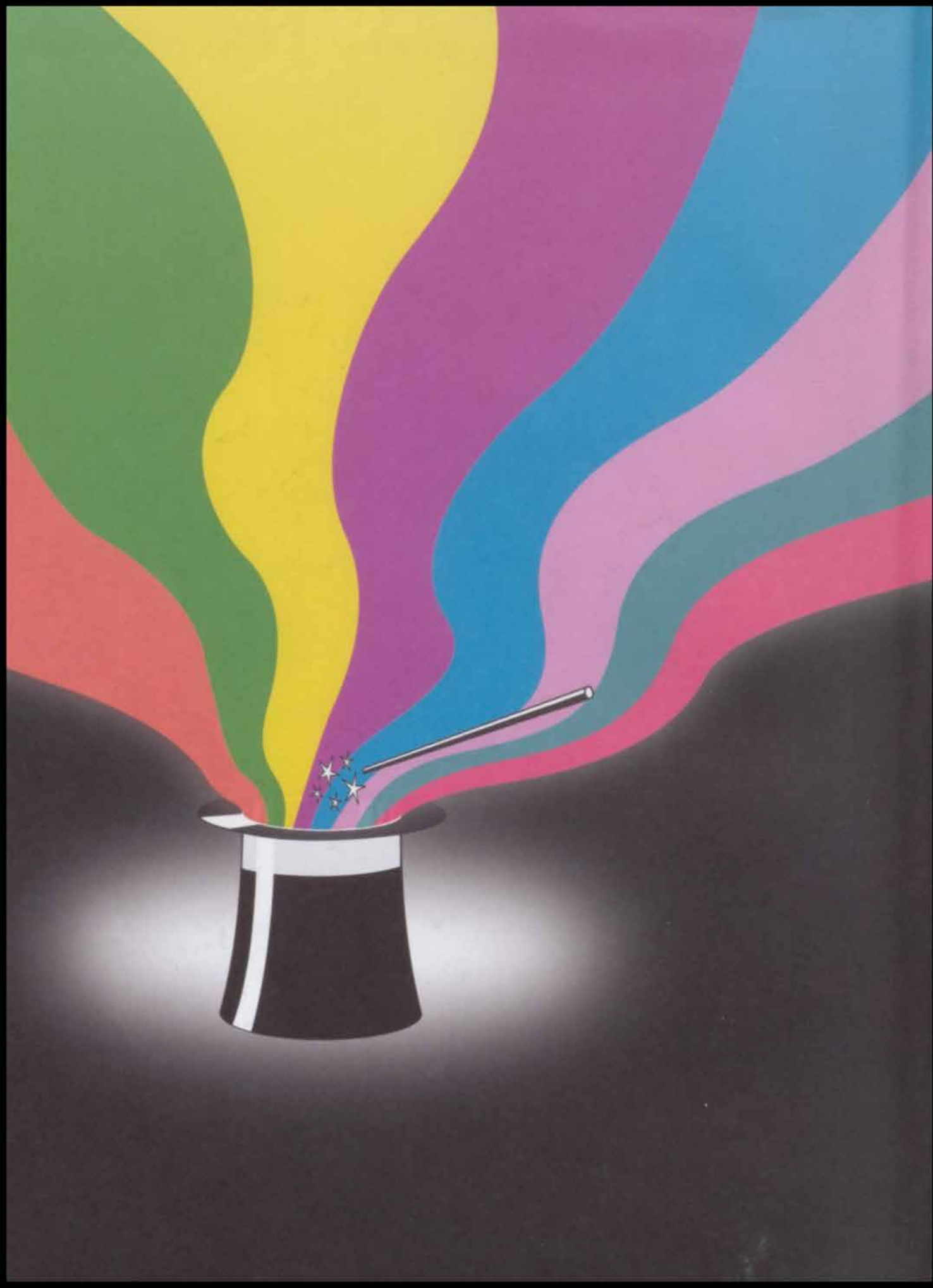
