


























Graduates, Accomplish Goals

Annual commencement festivities took place on May 31 at 2:00 P.M. All seniors received their diplomas with seventeen Academic Honors, five Core 40 Diplomas and one Shawe General Diploma.


































Projects teach skills

"I maintain my elite state in National Honor Society through patience, hard work and constant motivation from sponsors," said Nick Hall. -Katherine Bear






Council Sparks Changes






Boys & Girls Bond









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
