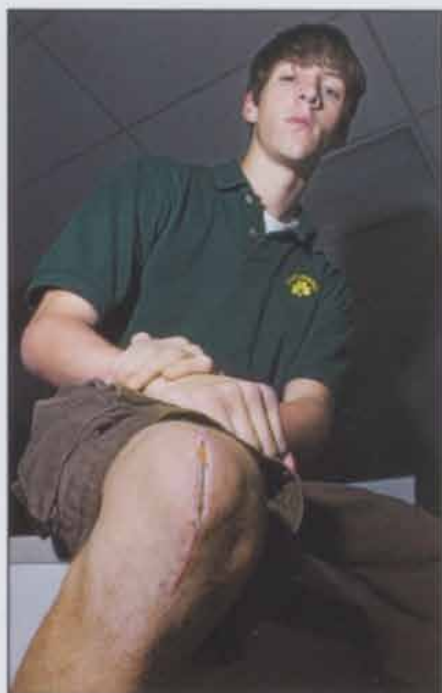

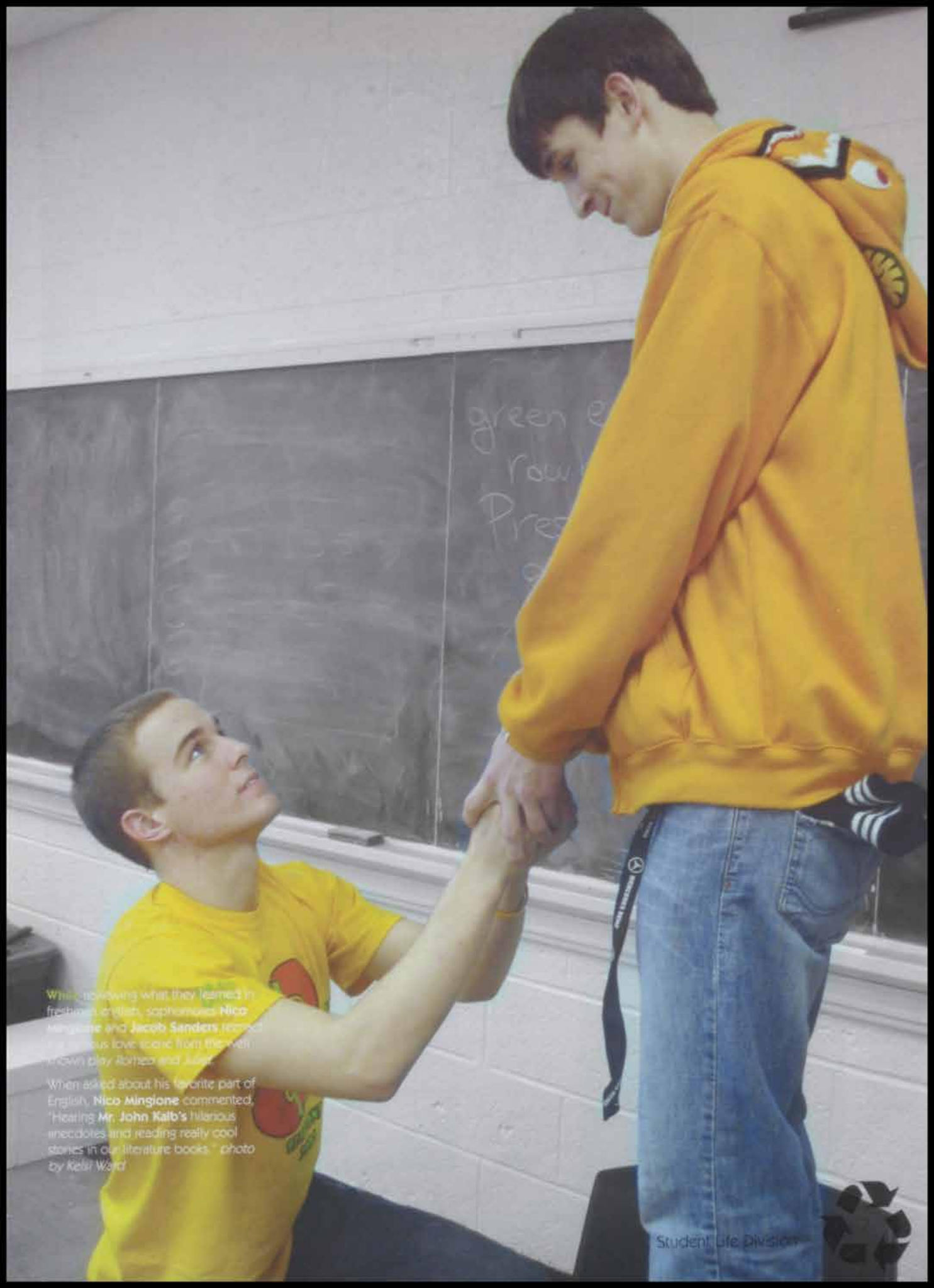

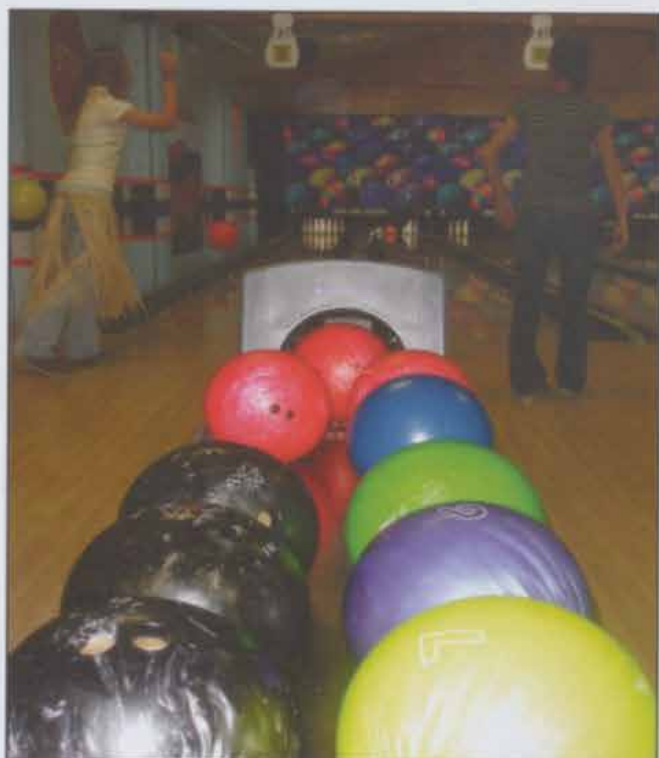

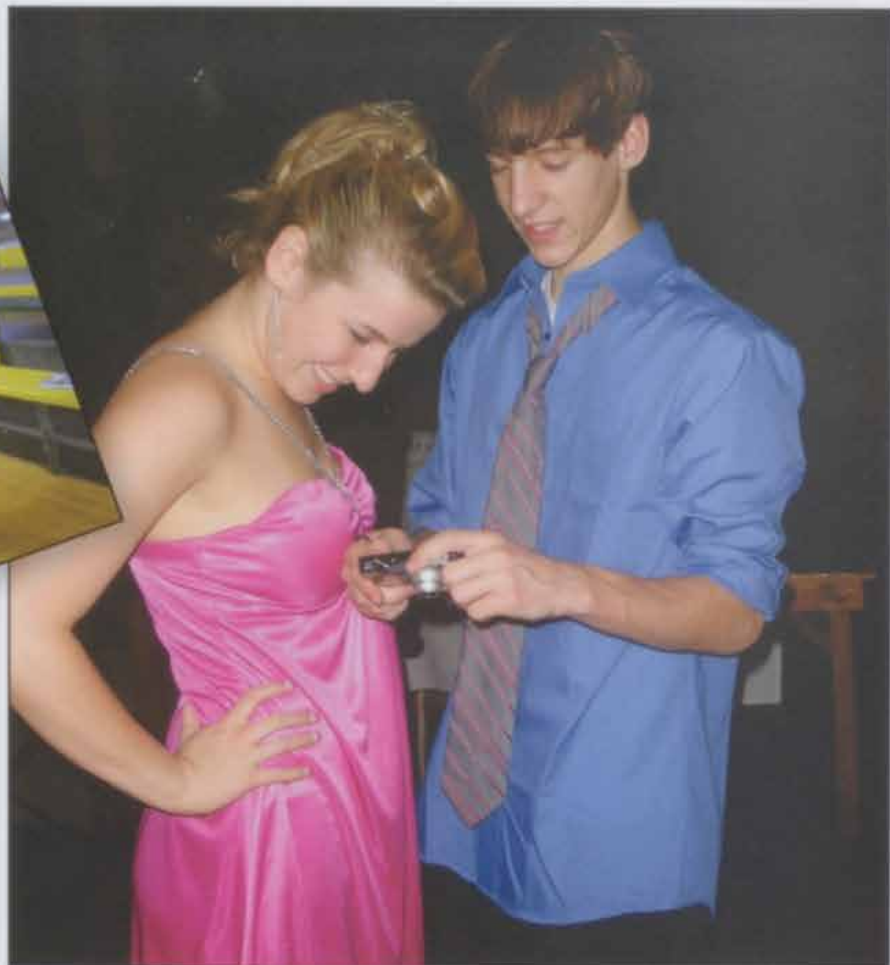

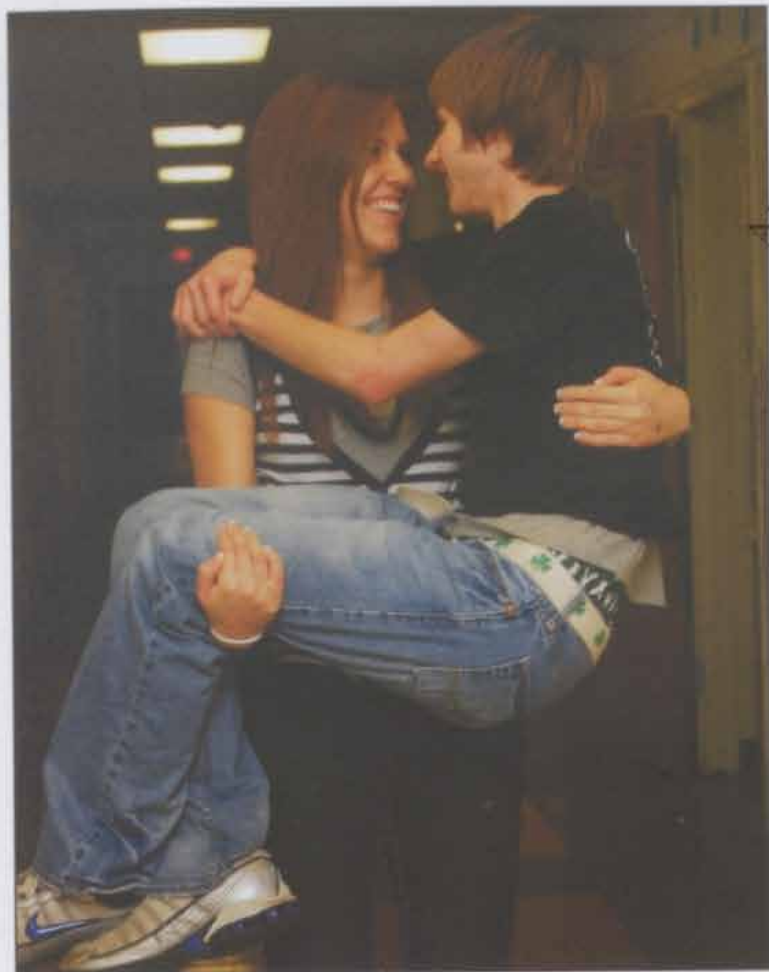

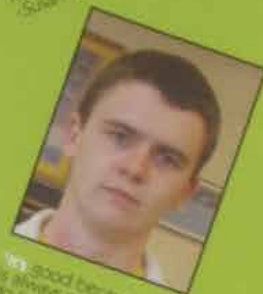

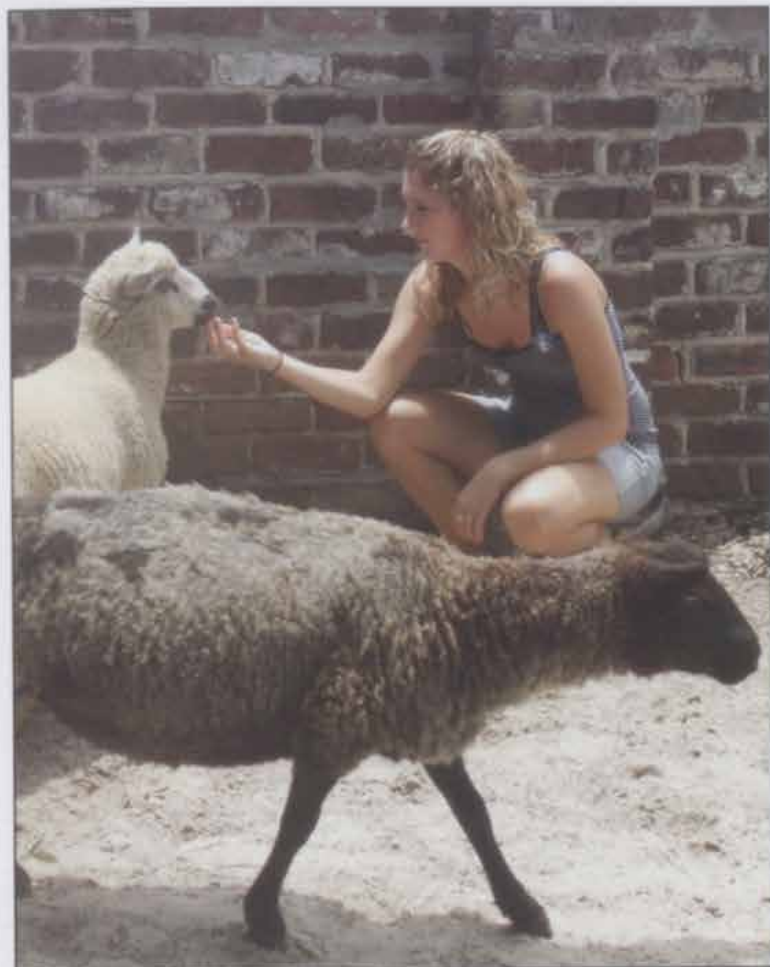

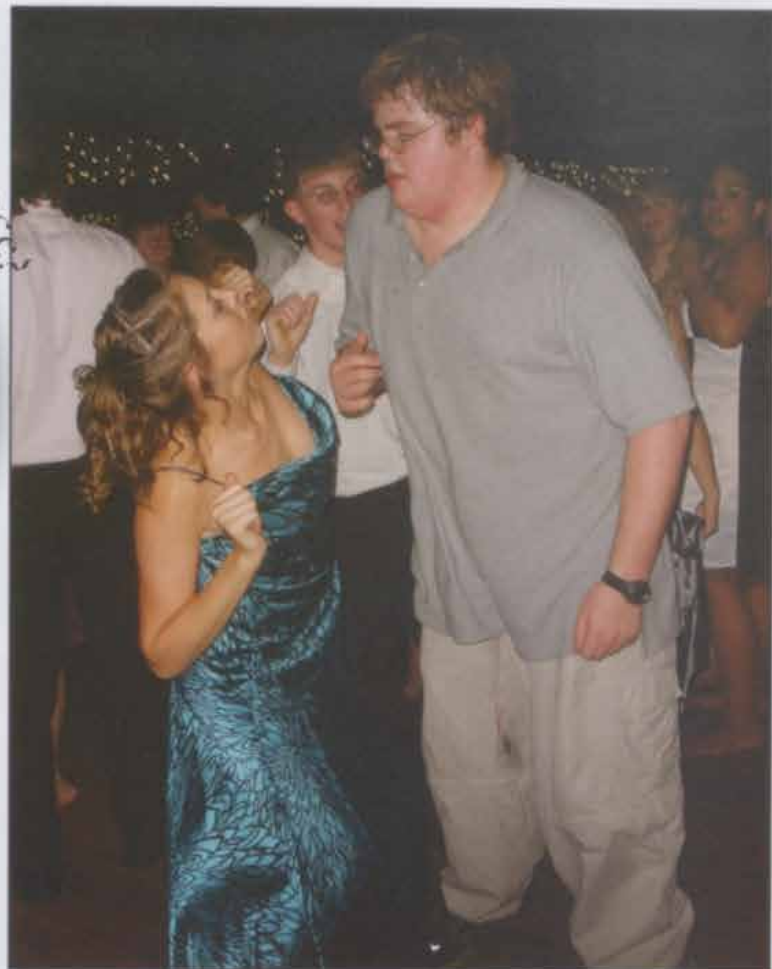

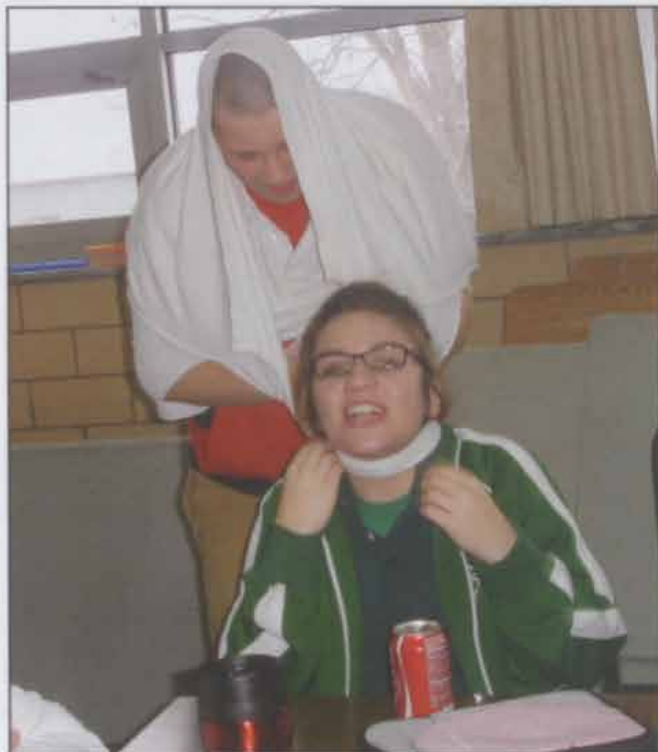

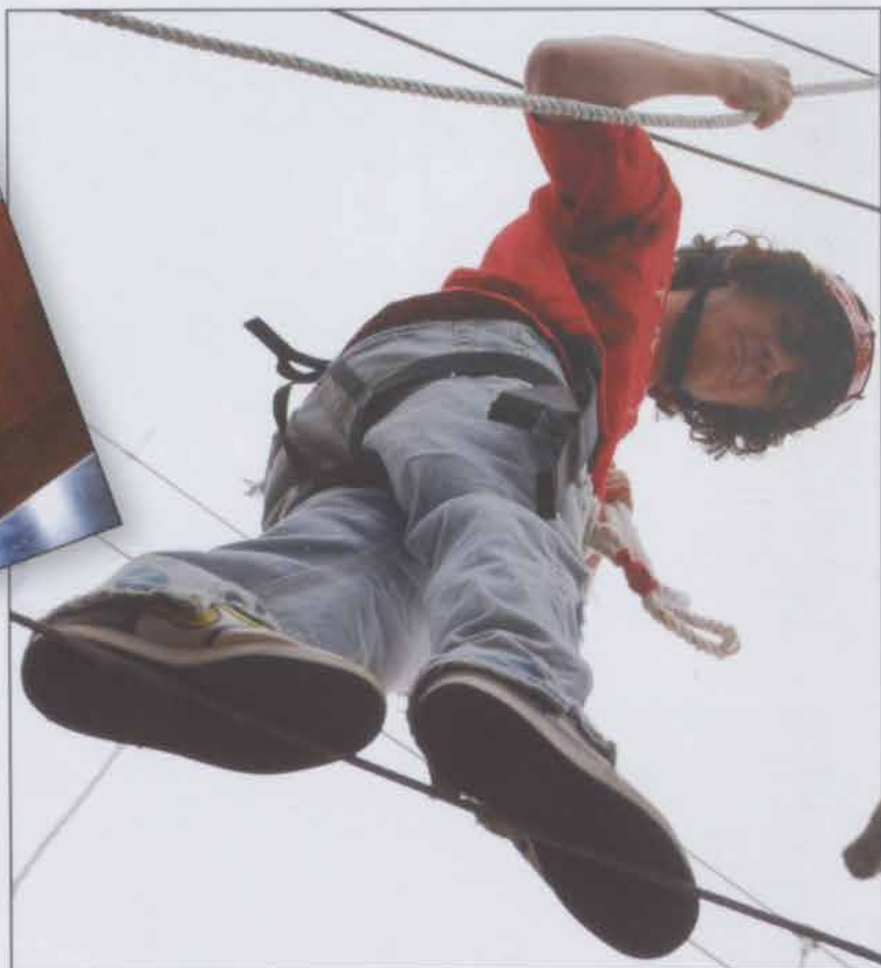

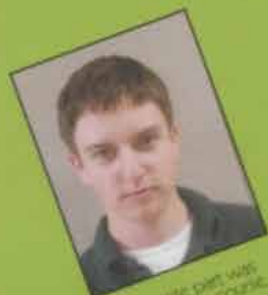

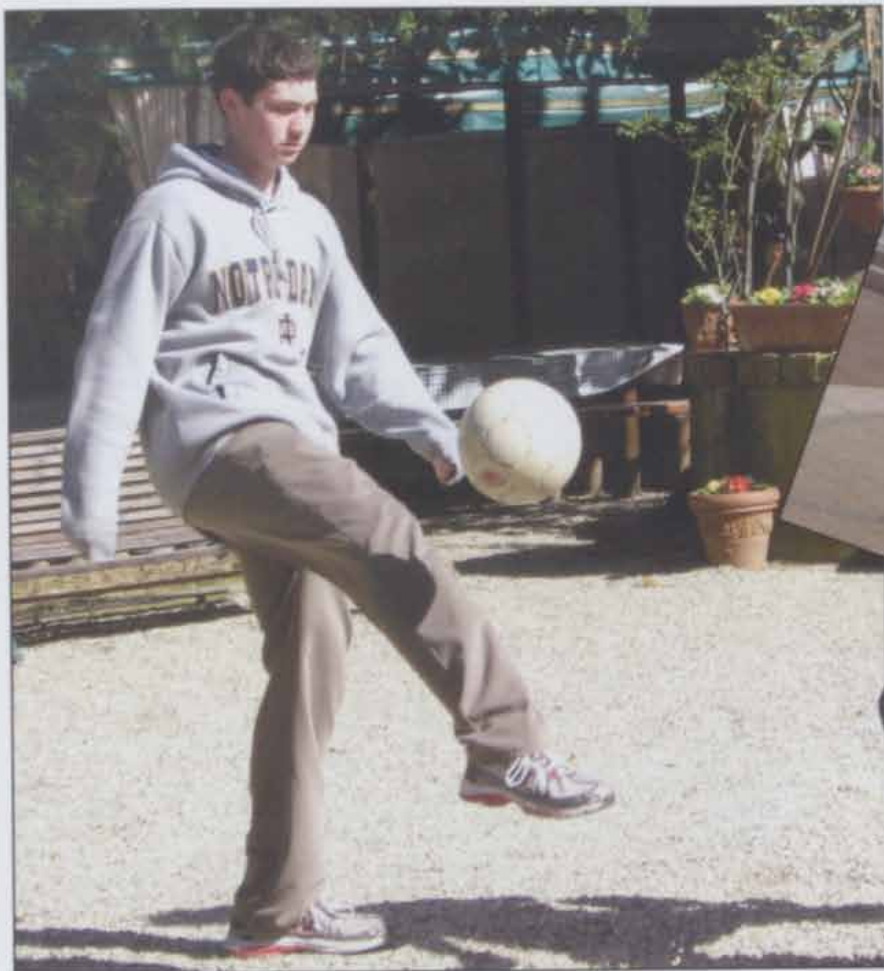

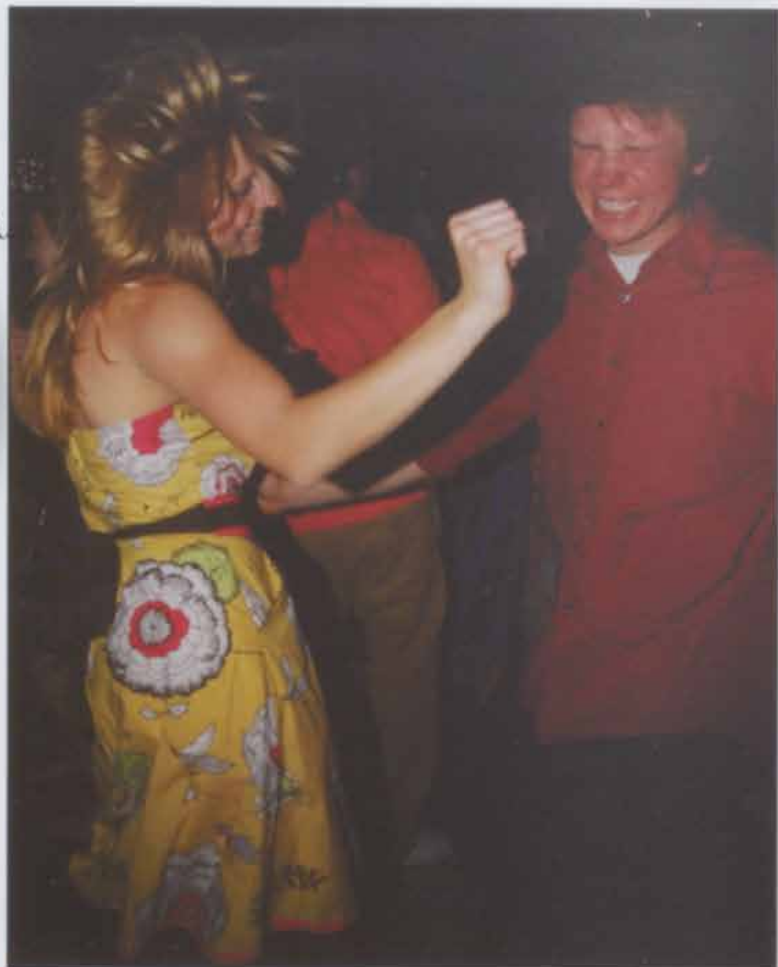

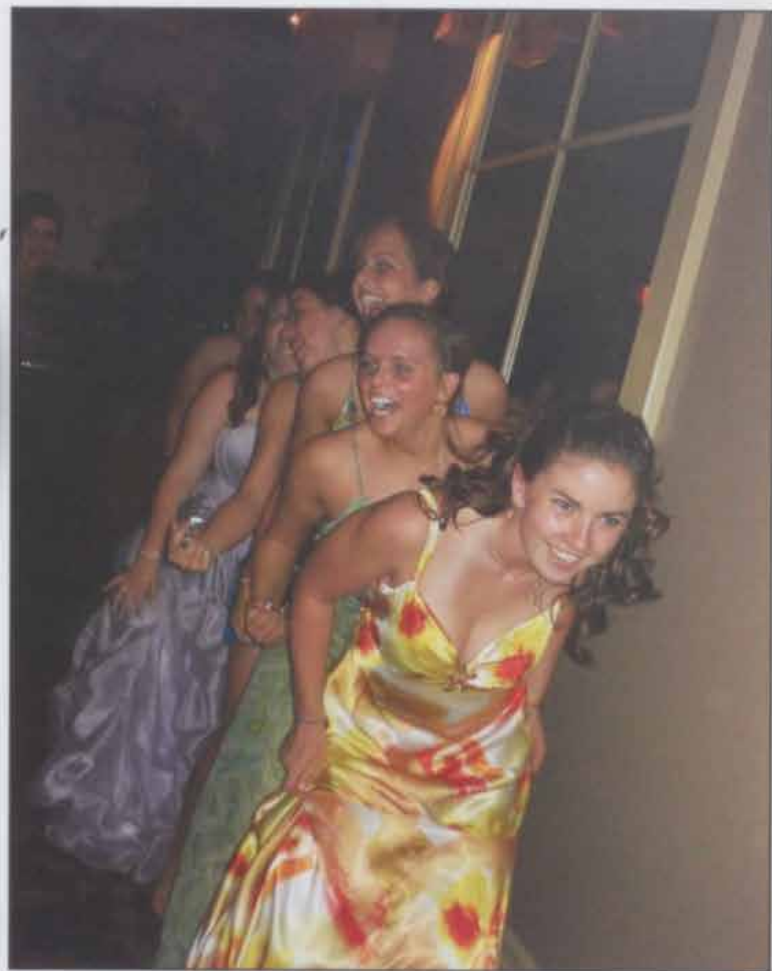

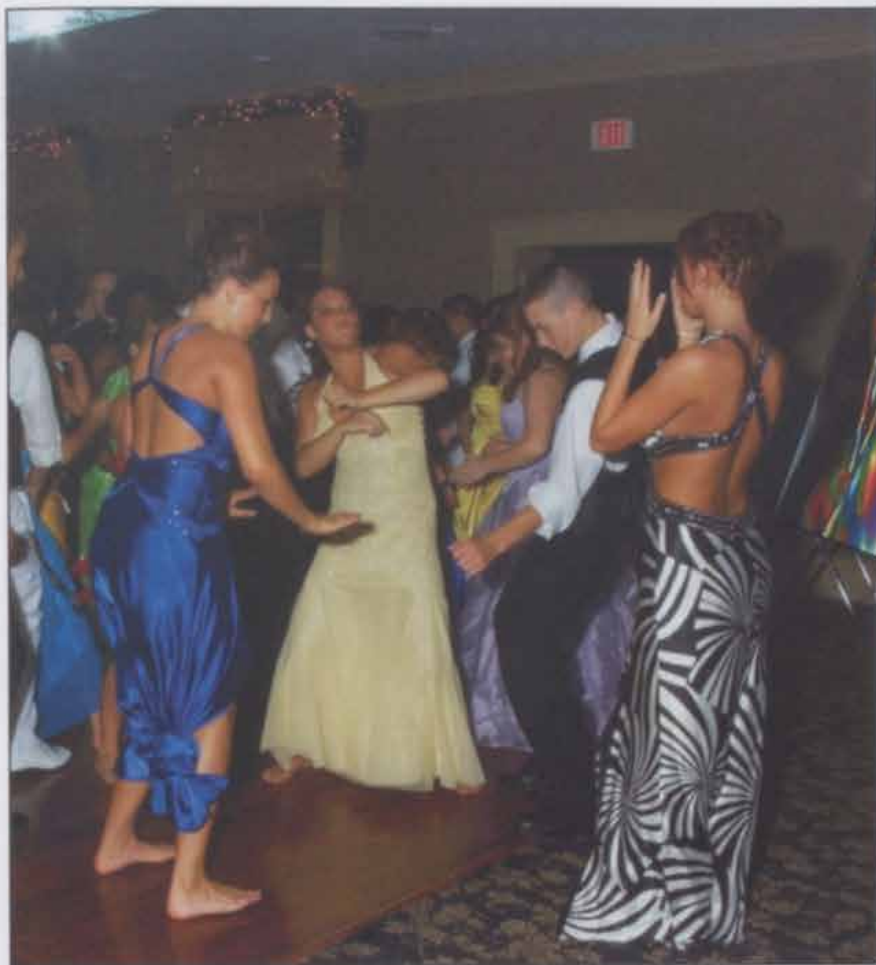

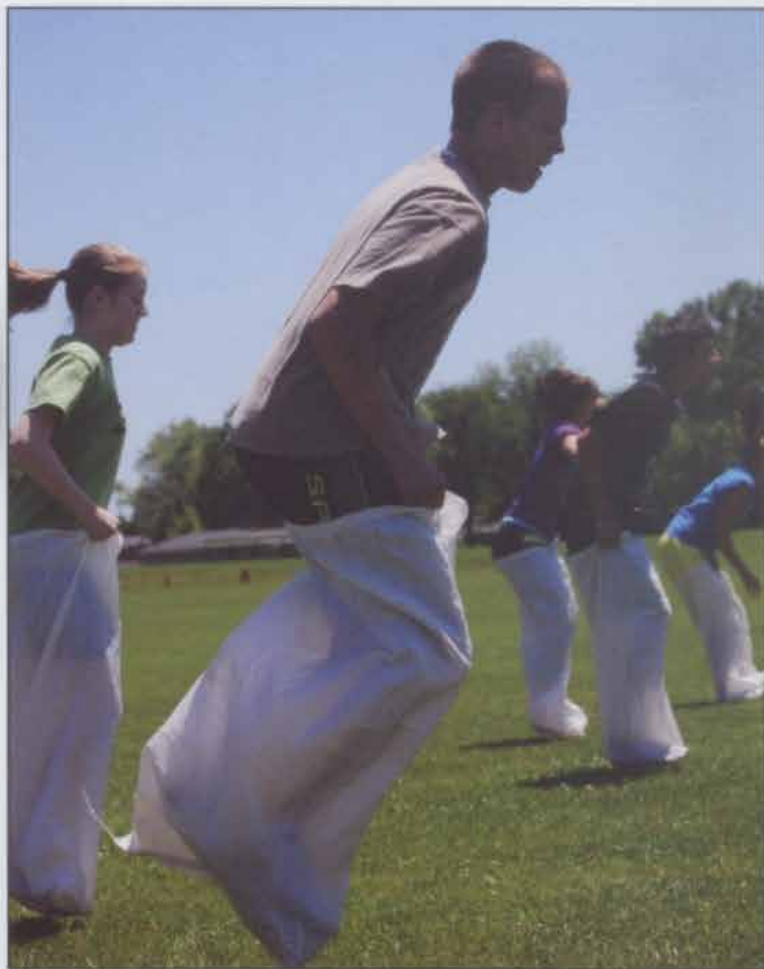

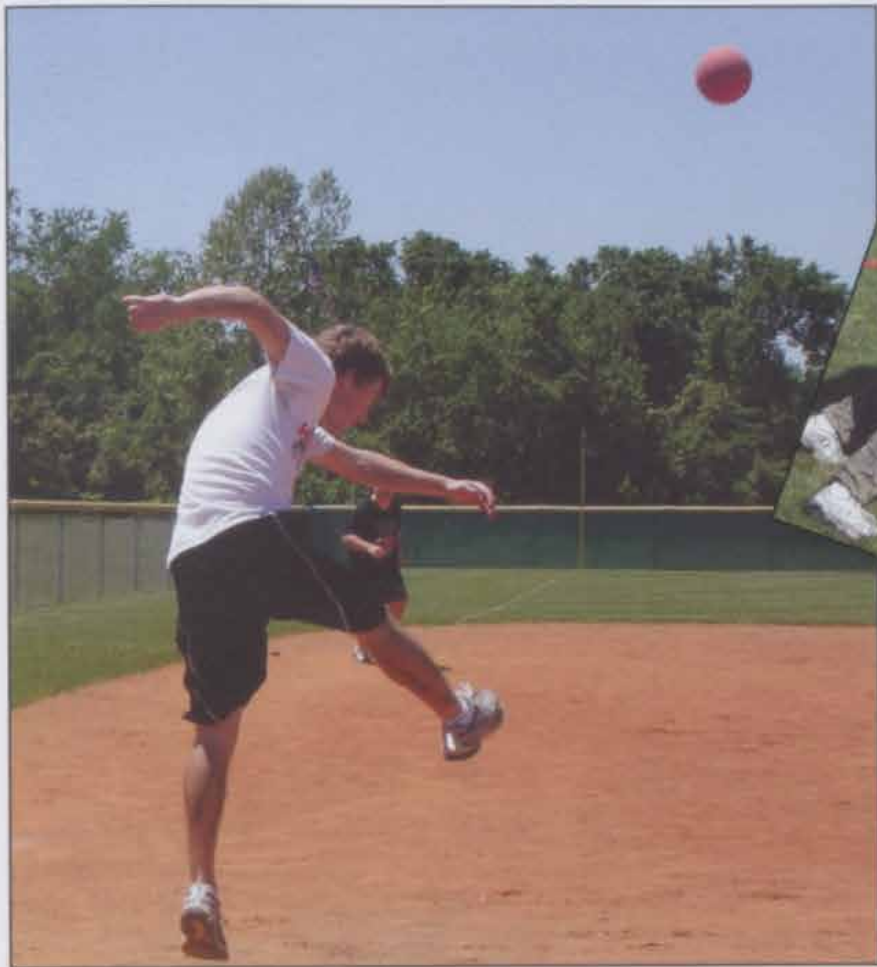

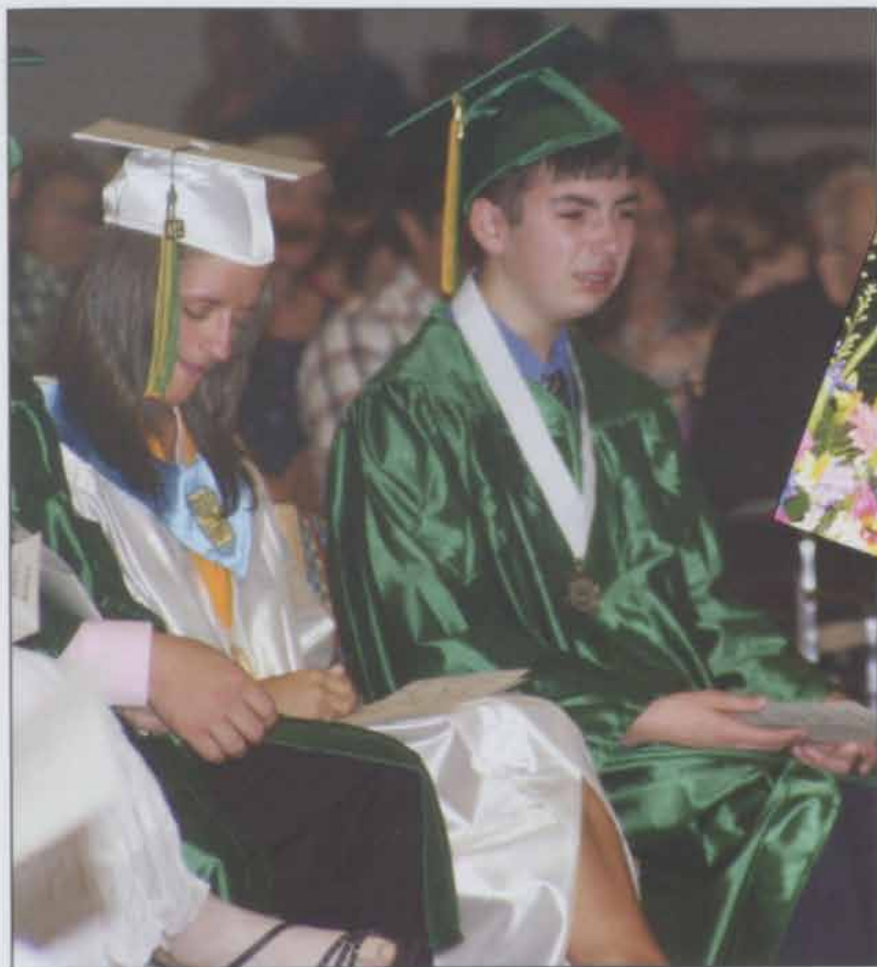

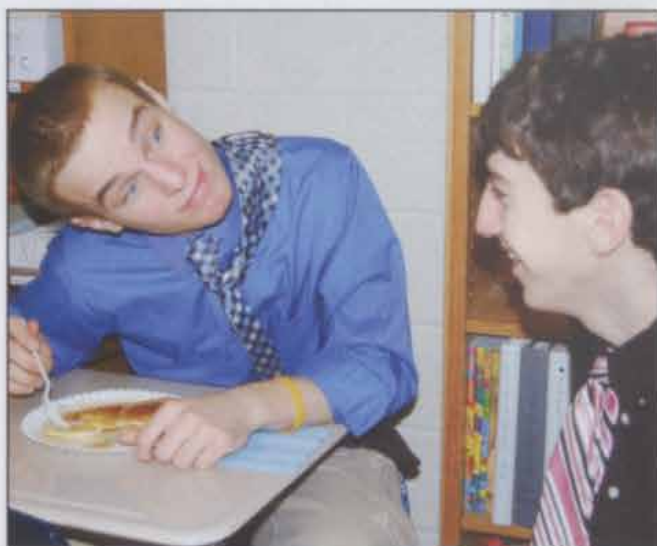

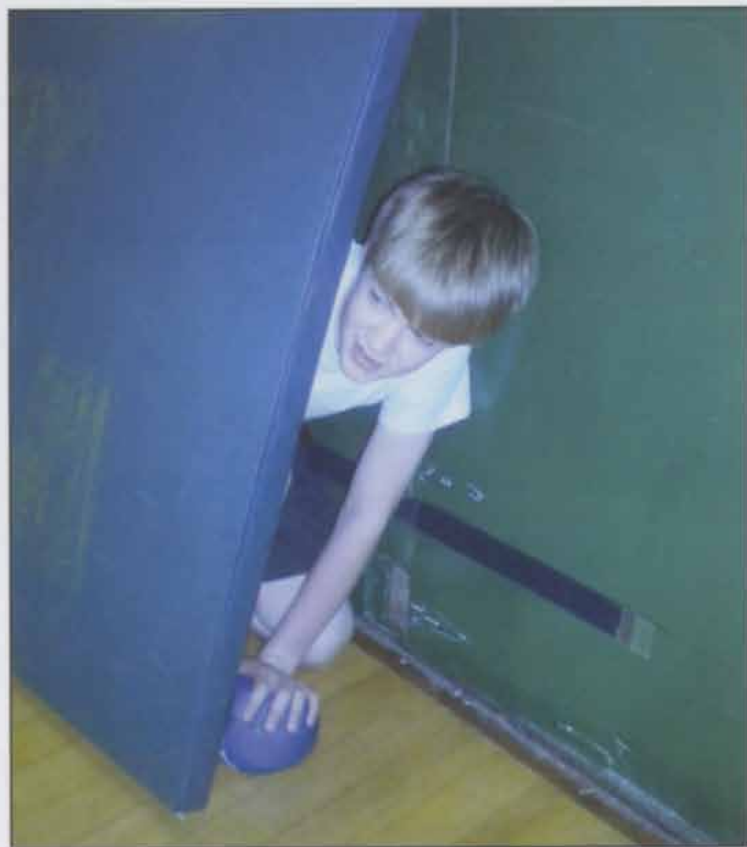

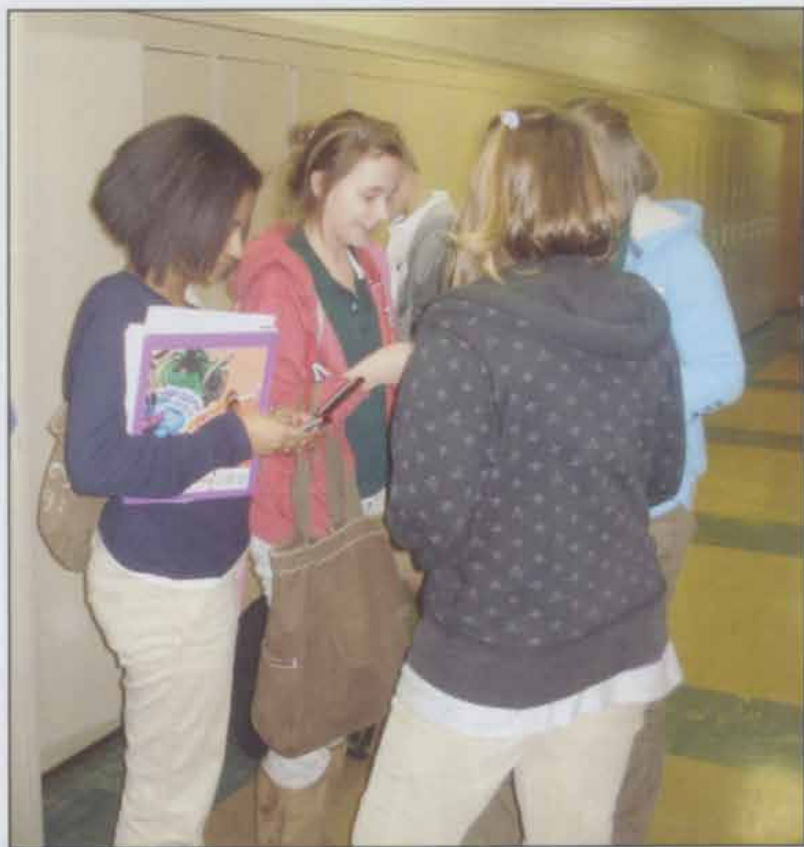

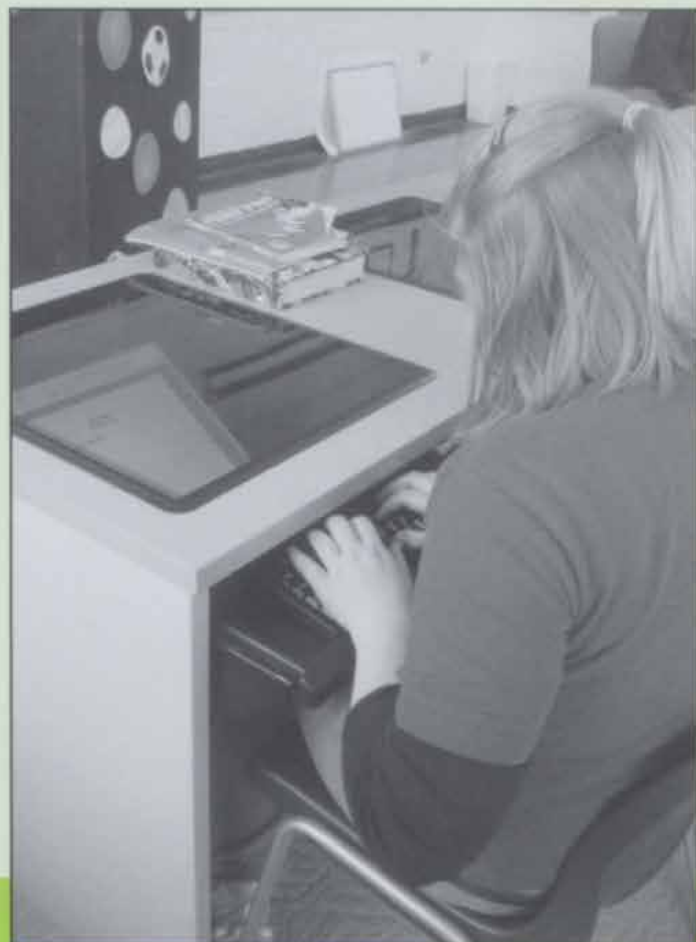

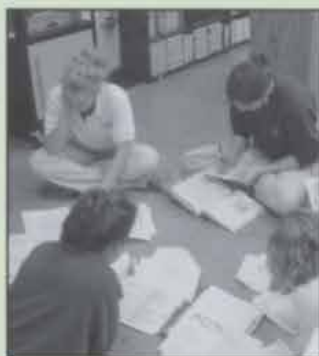
# Social Studies Soar

Ms. Emily Kugler came into the history department as well, teaching a world history



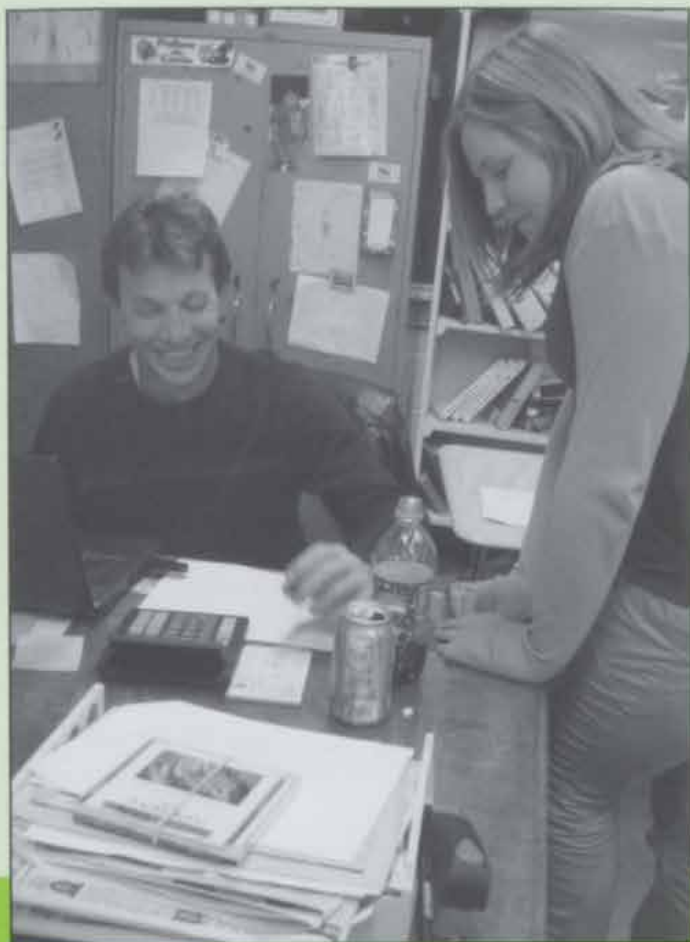

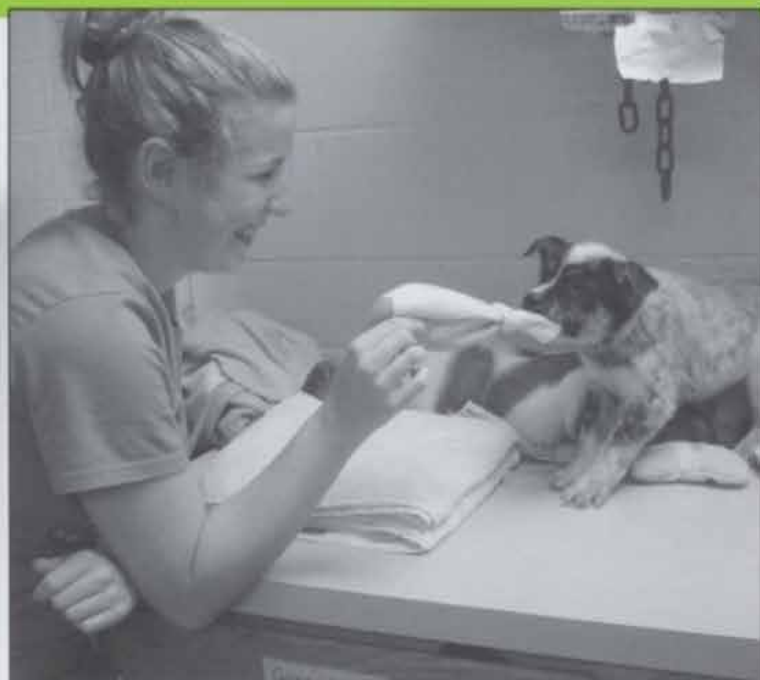

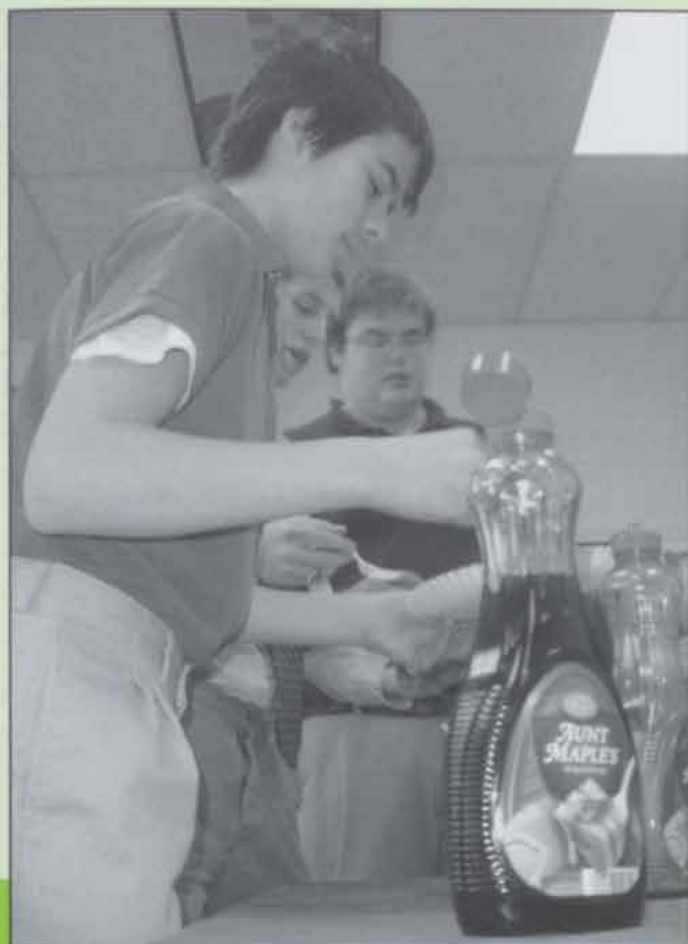

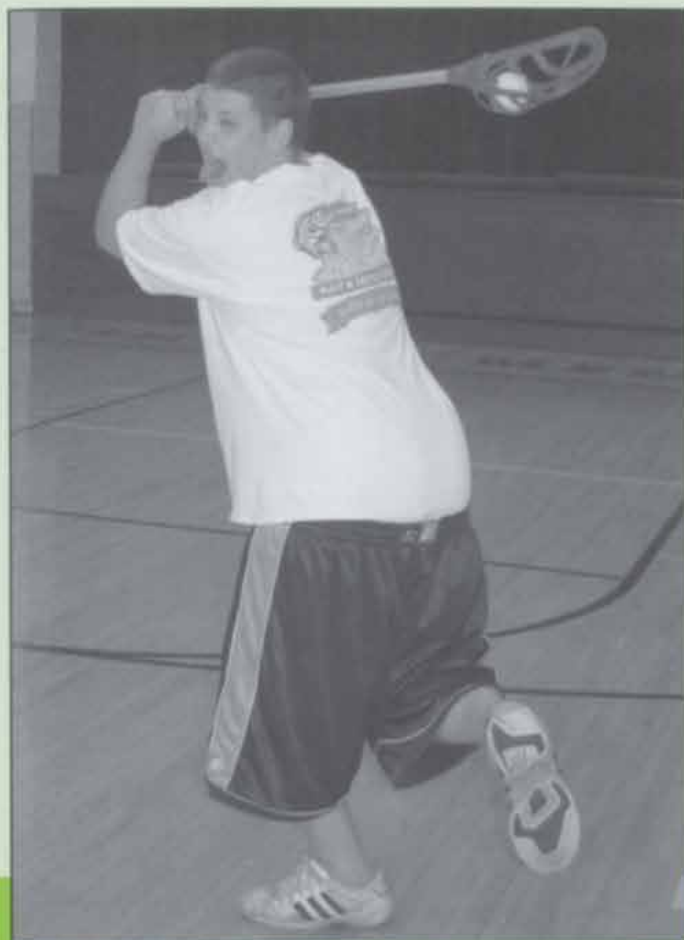

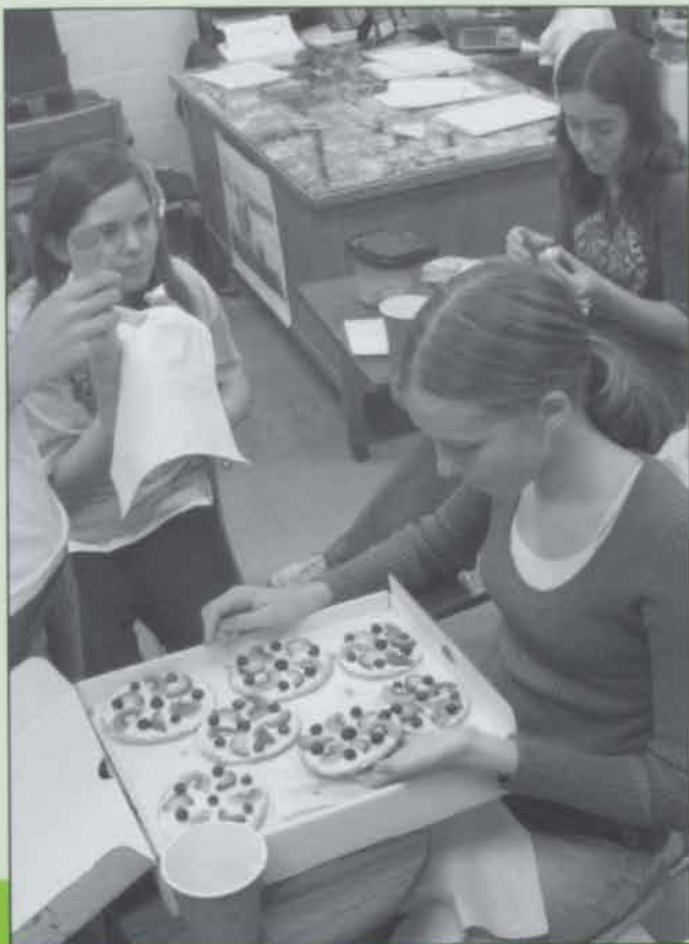

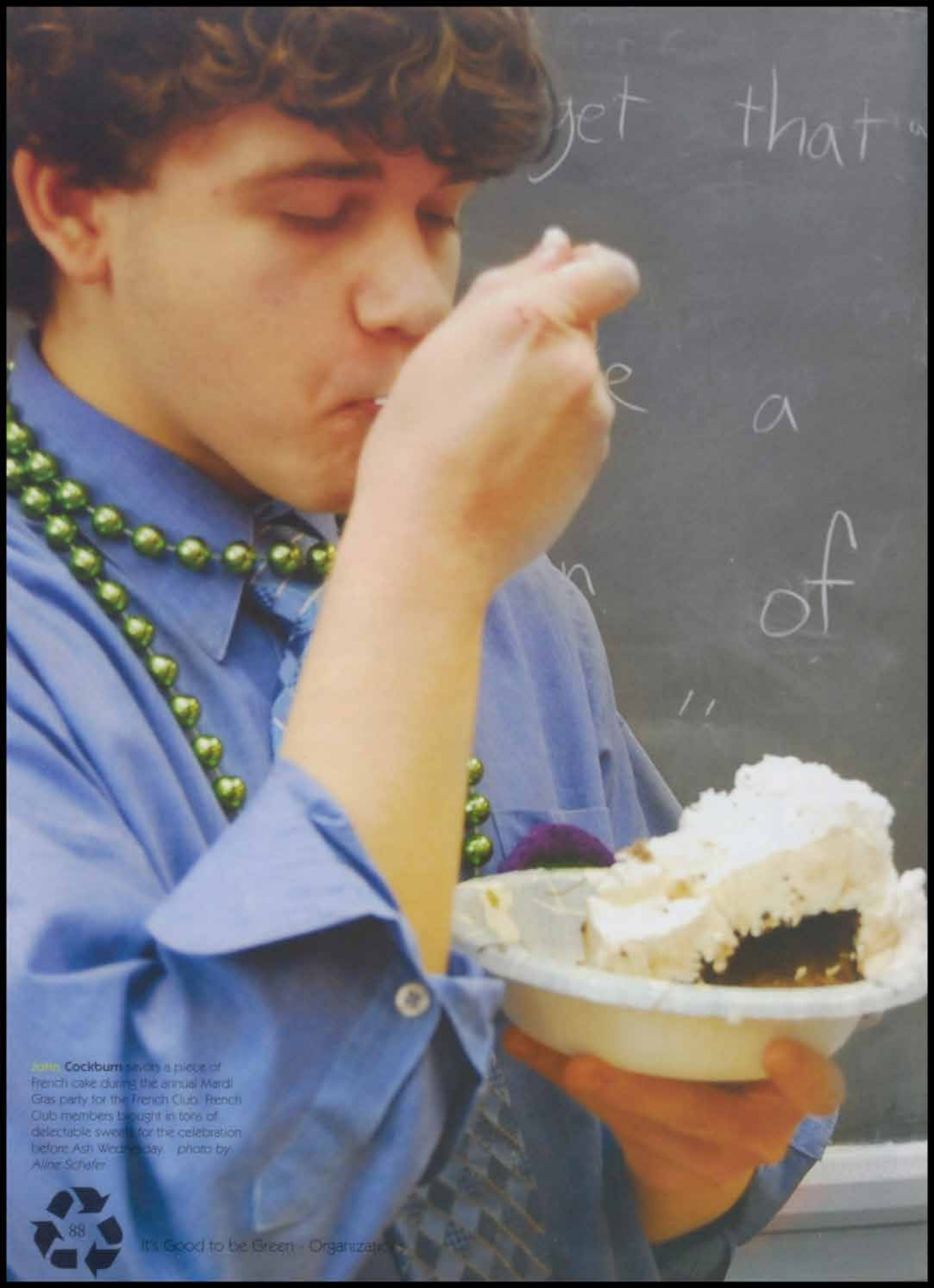

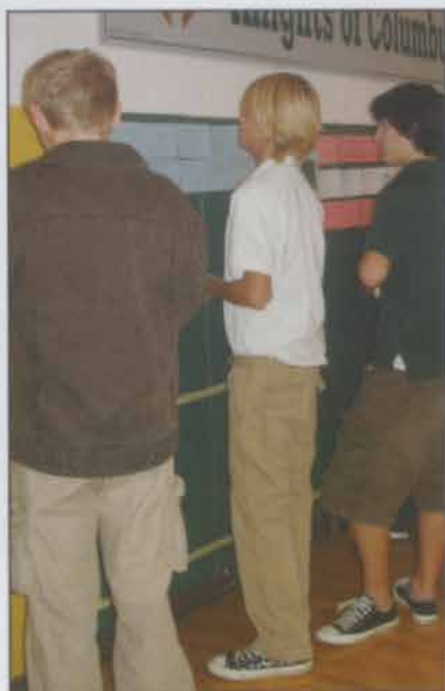

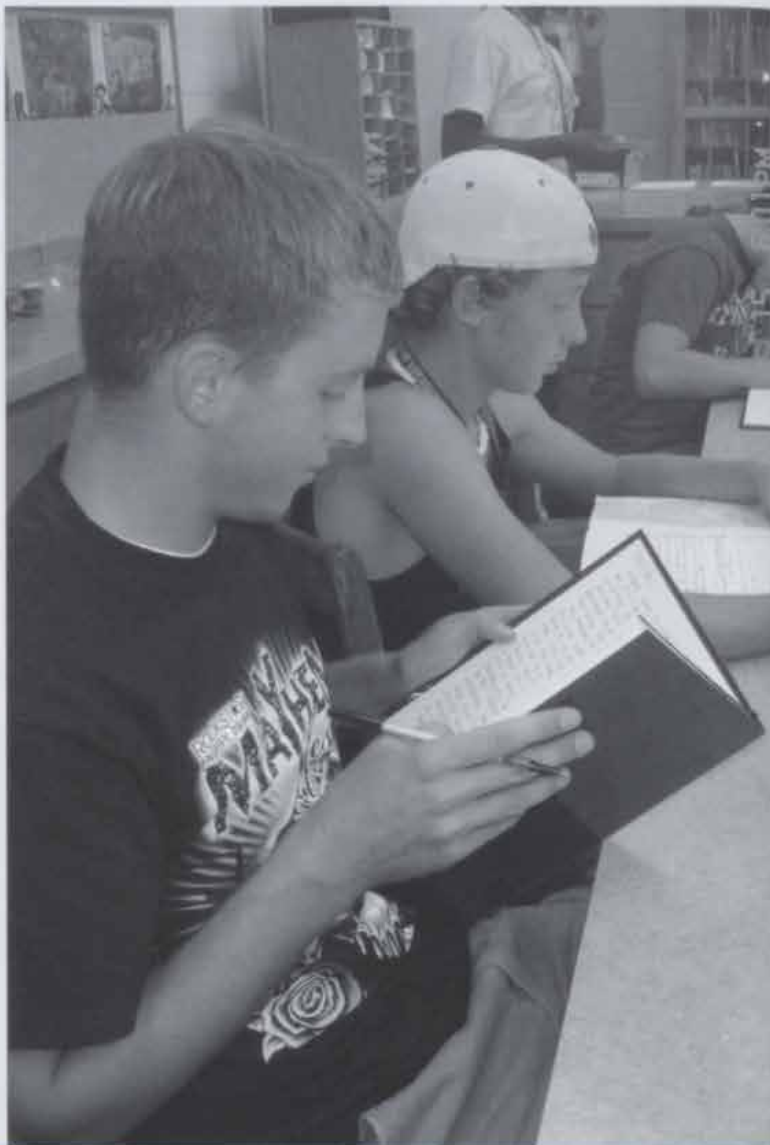
## Rewrites Often Needed

Staff members worked together to complete many pages and meet the set deadlines. However, at times doing pages turned into goofing off. -*Abby Lare*



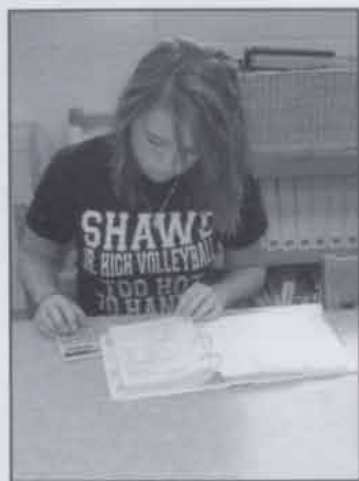

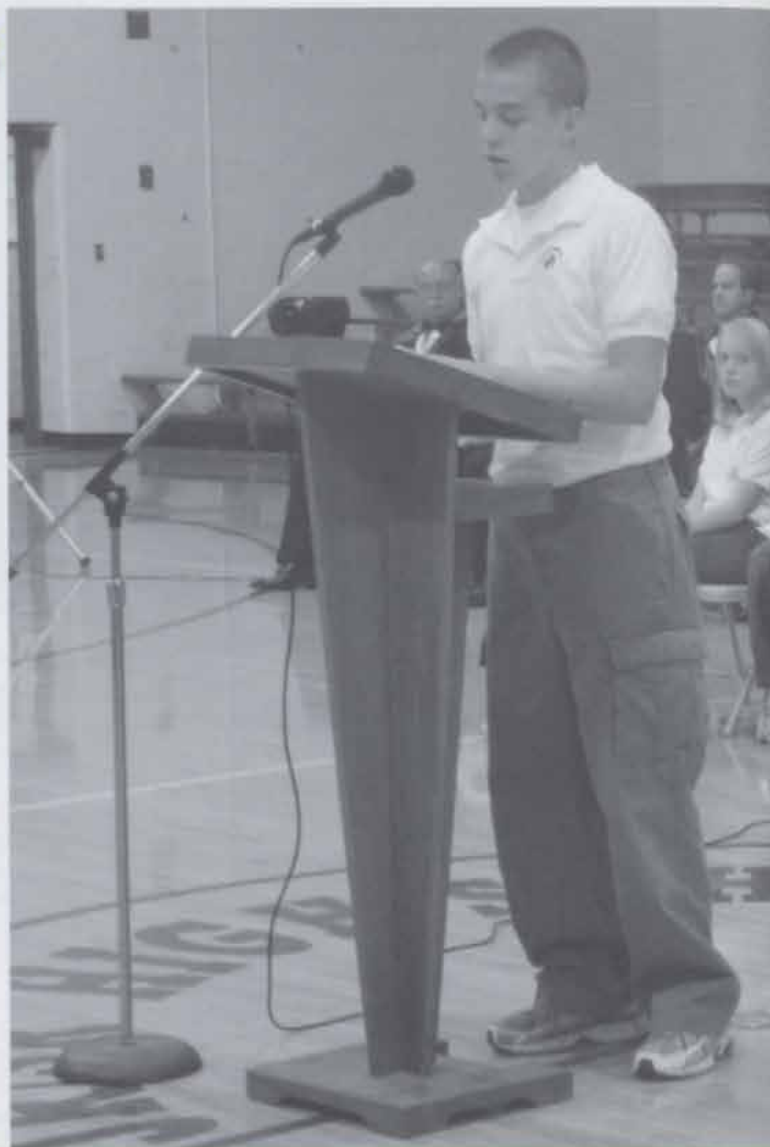
## Projects teach skills

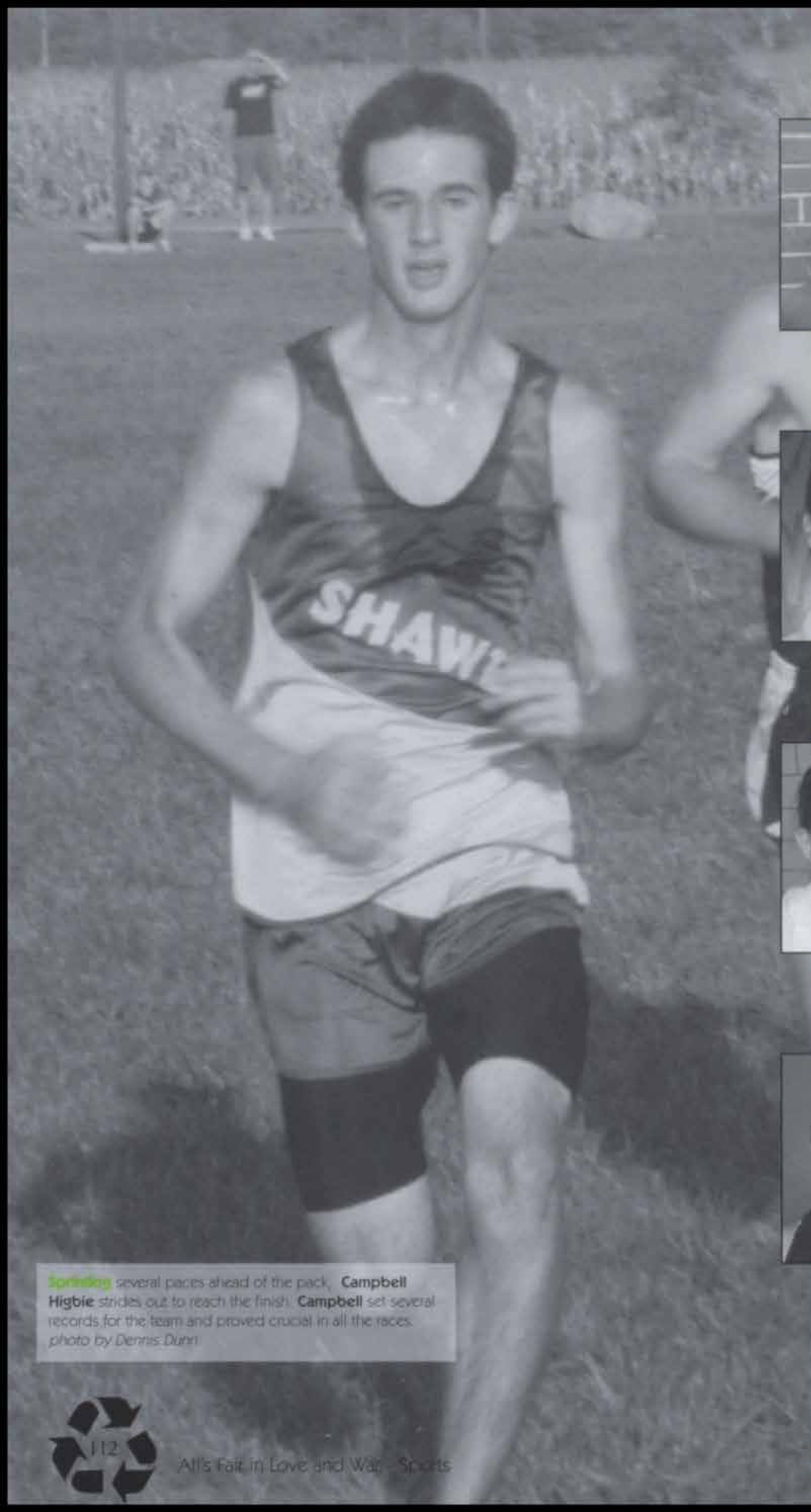

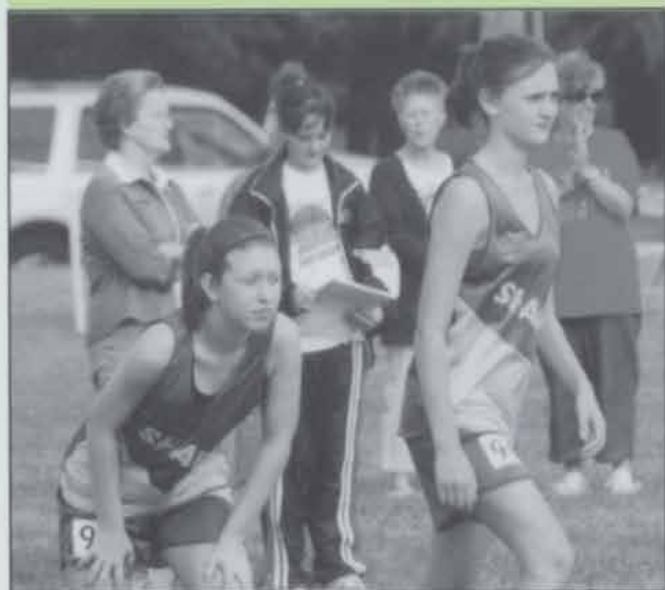

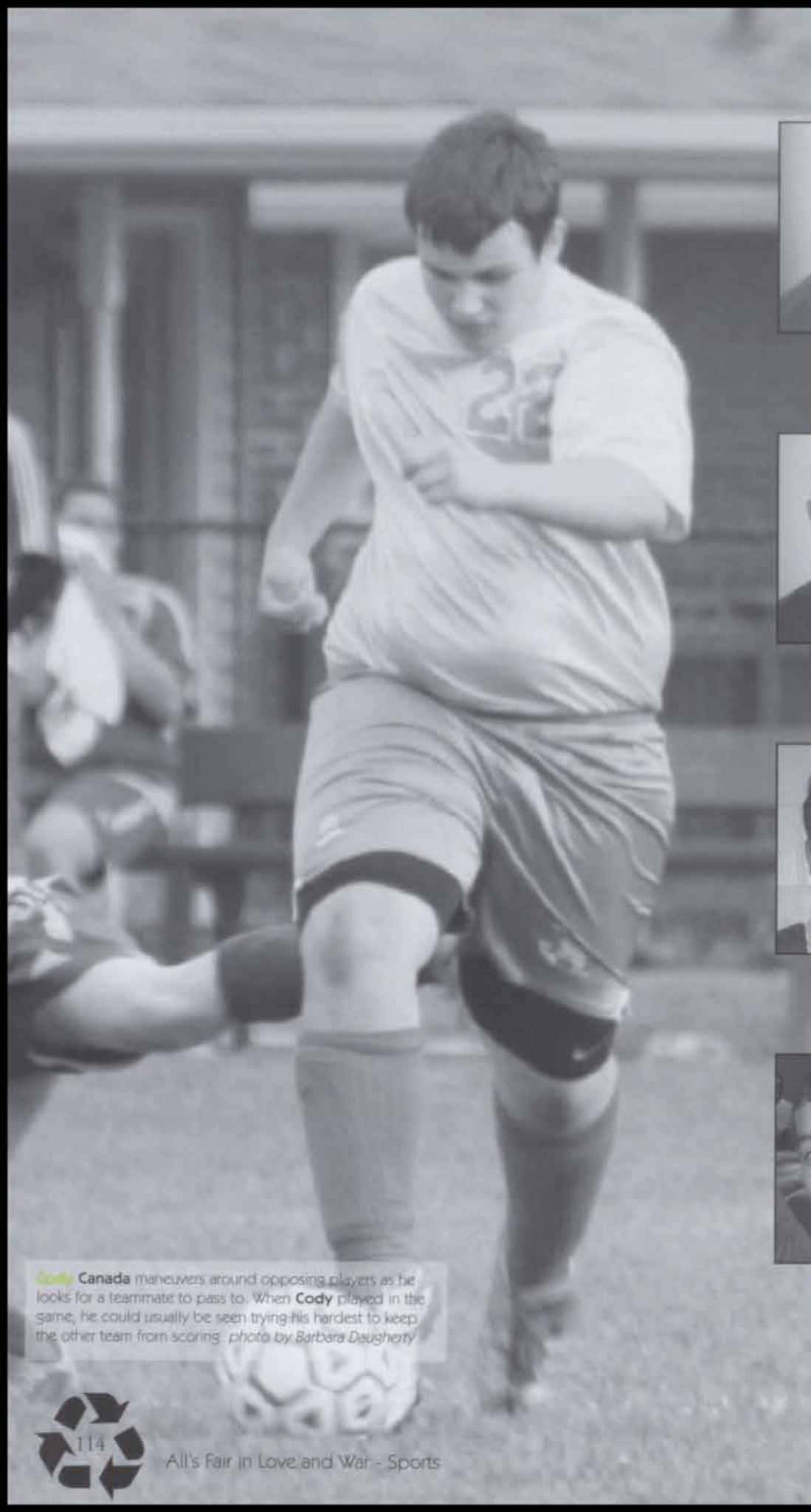
# Runners Excel

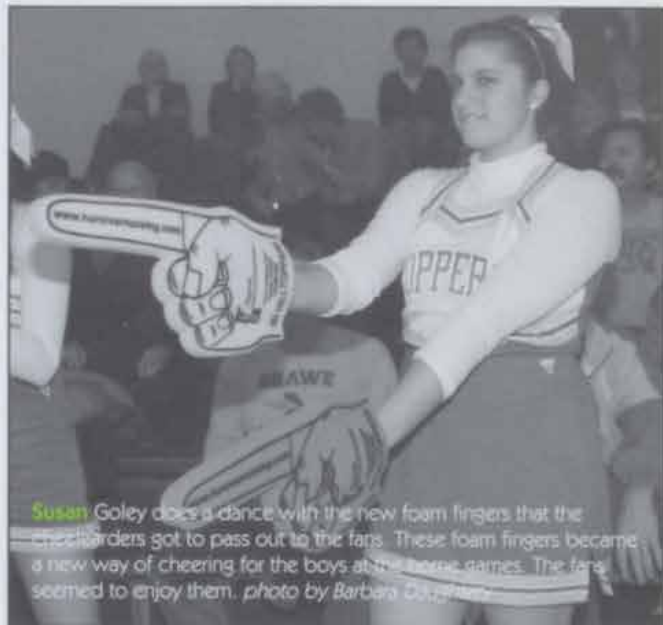

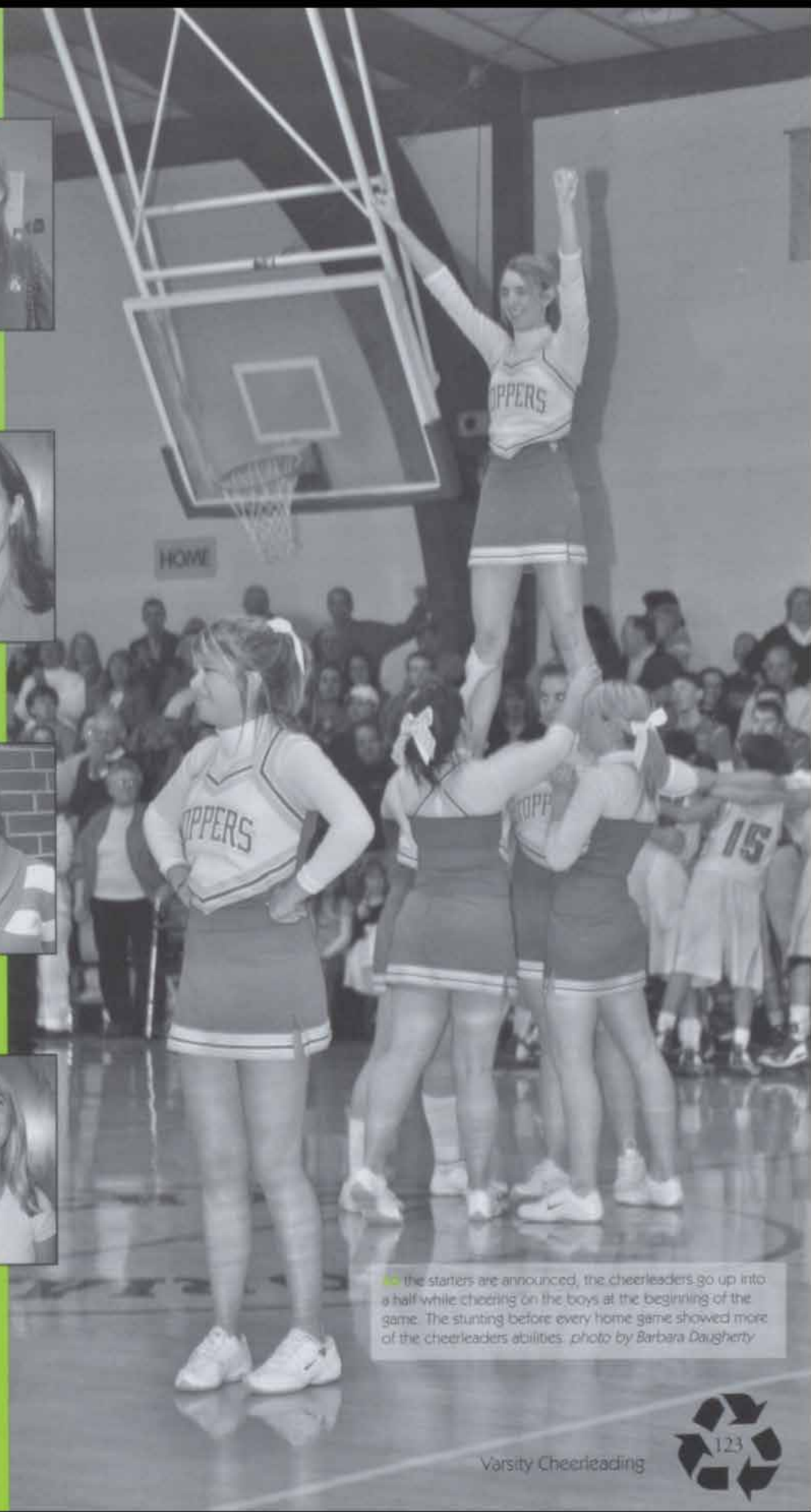

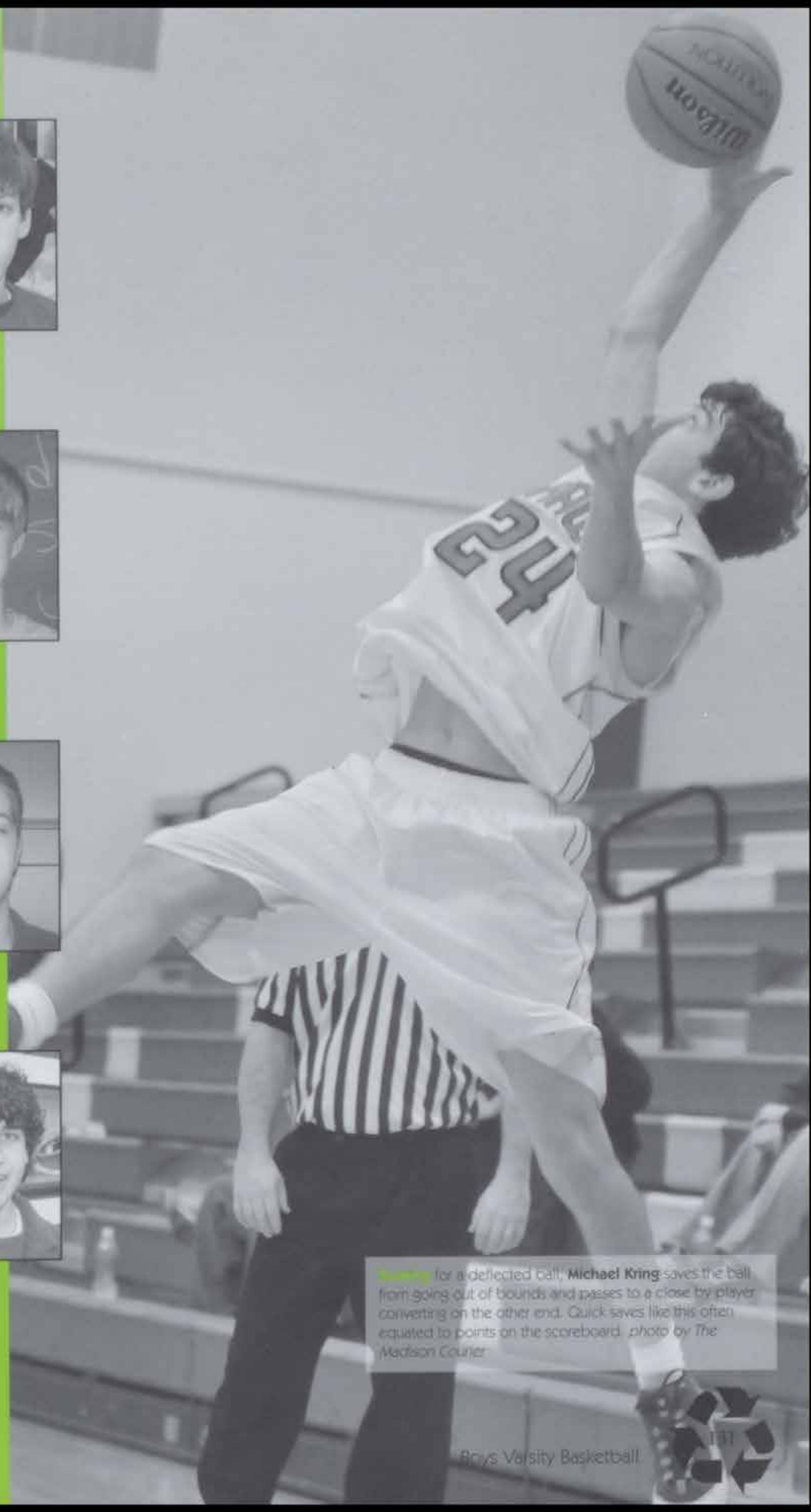

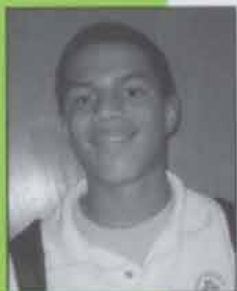

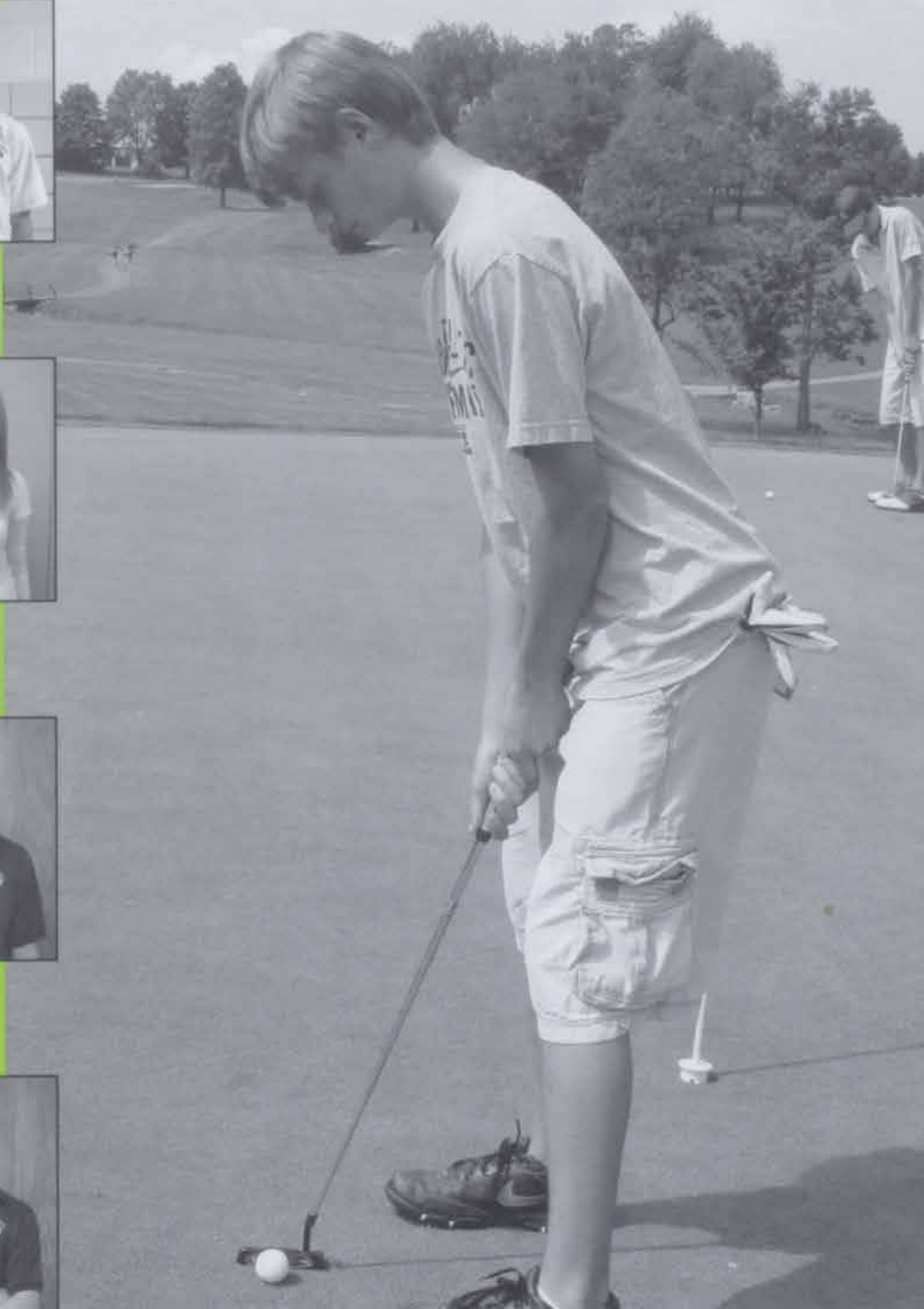

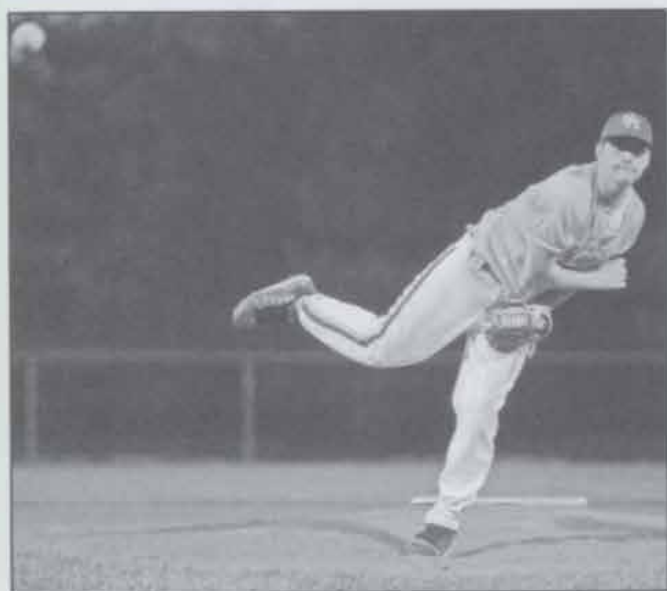
